## Grant Money Available for Death Investigation Training!

The Iowa Office of the State Medical Examiner is once again fortunate to have received Paul Coverdell Forensic Science Improvement Act Grant funding through the Governor's Office of Drug Control Policy.

For 2009, we again would like to send 10 individuals to the Medicolegal Death Investigator Training Course, which is to be held during the week of April 20-24. This course is hosted by the Saint Louis University School of Medicine's Division of Forensic and Environmental Pathology in St. Louis, Missouri. Grant funds to attend this course will be given to six county medical examiner investigators and four county medical examiners or deputy medical examiners. The application and instructions for the Paul Coverdell Forensic Science Improvement Act Grant are now available on the Iowa Department of Public Health's Web site. To download these materials please go to [www.idph.state.ia.us](http://www.idph.state.ia.us). Then click on "Grants, Bids and Proposals" and search for the grant by name. All applications are due into the Iowa Office of the State Medical Examiner by 4:00 PM on February 2, 2009.

If your county is selected, money from the grant will be reimbursed to the county after the individual has returned from the training course. The lump sum amount of \$2,190.00 will be reimbursed to the county for each individual that attends the course. This amount is to be applied toward the course registration fee, travel, lodging, and meals. Expenses over the allotted reimbursement amount need to be covered by the county or individual chosen to attend this training. Please carefully read and follow the instructions for completion of the grant application.

## Indemnification of County Medical Examiners and Staff

As stated in Iowa Administrative Rules 641-127.11, "A board of supervisors shall defend, hold harmless, and indemnify a county medical examiner and any *properly appointed* staff members to the extent provided in Iowa Code chapter 670." It is imperative that when county medical examiners add deputy medical examiners and/or medical examiner investigators they follow the appointment and approval process accordingly. Failure to follow the appointment/approval process may allow for an opportunity or an "excuse" to not indemnify medical examiner personnel. To appoint a deputy medical examiner or investigator, the county medical examiner must request approval of appointment of any new staff members by their county board of supervisors and then must ask for final approval of the new appointments from the Iowa Office of the State Medical Examiner. ## Scene Photographs

Scene photographs are an essential part of a thorough death investigation. They provide useful documentation and information about the body's environment, condition and position.

Basic scene photographs should have at least three kinds of images taken: overall, intermediate and closeup. It is an accepted rule of thumb to start general and end with the more detailed images. Try to take the photos as you approach the scene/evidence; don't just start with the body.

The overall photographs are used to show the entire area around the body. These are the most general photos. An example of an overall would a photo be showing the entire outside of a house or car, or a wide shot of a field.

As you get closer to the decedent, take intermediate shots that show the body in its immediate environment. An example of an intermediate photo would be showing a body in a trunk of a car, but not showing the entire vehicle.

The most detailed photographs are the closeup photos. These are usually things of evidentiary value like medications, weapons, trace evidence and injuries.

An investigation can be greatly aided through a systematic approach and proper documentation. Scene photographs allow others to see what the scene contained and further the understanding of those investigating.

## Iowa FACE Program Says "Thank You"

The Iowa Office of the State Medical Examiner works closely with Iowa Department of Public Health staff in Des Moines and Injury Prevention Research Center (IPRC) personnel at the University of Iowa in investigating work-related deaths. Most of you have received a call for information regarding a worker's death from me, Murray Madsen, Trauma Investigator for the Iowa Fatality Assessment and Control Evaluation (FACE) program at the University. I do follow-up investigations on all suspected **work-related trauma deaths** in our state, and I asked for space in this newsletter to say "THANKS" for your help and to wish everyone "Happy Holidays."

This year's toll of Iowa worker deaths will be the fifth year in a row at or above the average of 79 per year since 1995. Obviously, your cooperation and assistance are important for early awareness and fact gathering and are very much appreciated by all of us who collaborate in IA FACE. ## Death Investigator Skill Labs Scheduled for 2009

The Iowa Office of the State Medical Examiner (IOSME) would like to provide training opportunities to county medical examiners and investigators in hopes of increasing the number of certified medicolegal death investigators across the state. The IOSME will be hosting four death investigator skills labs. The dates of the labs are:

January 23, 2009

May 22, 2009

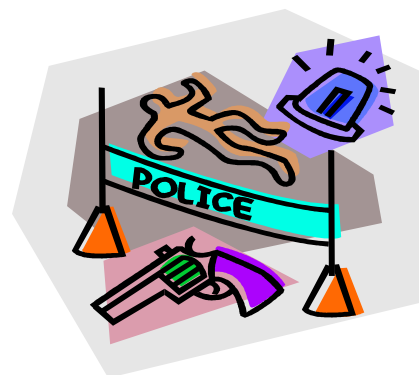
September 25, 2009

December 11, 2009

The goals of the skill labs are to help investigators complete the skills checklist required by the American Board of Medicolegal Death Investigators (ABMDI) in order to be eligible to sit for the Registry certification exam. Please remember, per Iowa Administrative Rules 127.7, county medical examiner investigators must attend a formal medicolegal death investigator training course **AND** obtain and maintain certification through the American Board of Medicolegal Death Investigators prior to or within three years of appointment.

Each of the above skill labs will occur at the State Medical Examiner's Conference Center in Ankeny, beginning at 8:00 am and ending at 5:00 pm. Topics covered in each of the labs will include: Overview of the American Board of Medicolegal Death Investigators (ABMDI) Registry Exam requirements and the ABMDI Skills Checklist; Drawing of specimens (blood, urine, and vitreous); Recognition of job-related stress; Ethical and legal issues and courtroom testimony; Collection and preservation of evidence; Basic death scene photography and body examination; Death scene investigation exercises (mock scenes); and an overview of mass fatality operations. Staff from the State Medical Examiner's Office, the Iowa Attorney General's Office and the Iowa Division of Criminal Investigation Criminalistics Laboratory will be providing instruction.

One of the goals of the IOSME is to assist investigators in achieving Registry certification through the ABMDI. The IOSME will schedule and proctor the ABMDI certification exam on April 9, 2009 and again in November 2009, immediately after the Iowa Association of County Medical Examiner's Fall Conference. 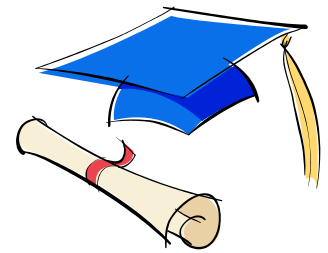
Dr. Jonathan Thompson began his duties as an Associate State Medical Examiner on December 12, 2008.
