

Poetry found in the Journal of the House in 1955. The Honorable Arch McFarlane, Senator from Black Hawk, recited the following:

Arch W. McFarlane served in the House of Representatives during the 36th, 37th, 38th and 39th General Assemblies. He served as Speaker of the House for the 38th and 39th (1919-1921) General Assemblies. He served as Lt. Governor and presided over the Senate during the 43rd and 44th (1928-1933) General Assemblies. He then was re-elected to the House and served in the 45th,46th,48th,49th,50th,51st,52nd, 54th, 55th General Assemblies. Mr. McFarlane finished his legislative career by serving as a Senator during the 56th and 57th General Assemblies.
