
Iowa legislative party affiliations over the years

## **BACKGROUND:**

This information is compiled from *The Iowa General Assembly: Our Legislative Heritage 1846-1980*. By Frank J Stork and Cynthia A Clingan.

Since 1846 when the First General Assembly convened, there have been hundreds of Democrat and Republican legislators. There have also been several other parties represented in the Iowa legislature. During the 1<sup>st</sup> through the 5<sup>th</sup> general assemblies, it was not surprising that there were several members of the Whig party. The 15<sup>th</sup> General Assembly consisted of 12 Democrats, 84 Republicans, and 54 Independents. The 17<sup>th</sup> General Assembly had two members from the Greenback party. There were six members of the National party in the 18<sup>th</sup> General Assembly. In 1886, the 21<sup>st</sup> General Assembly had no Democrats but 59 Fusion-Democrats. By 1890, the Union-Labor party had one member in the Senate and one member in the House of Representatives. In 1898, the House of Representatives had 31 Democrats, 62 Republican members, four Silver Republicans, and three Populists party members. The 64<sup>th</sup> General Assembly had one member with no party affiliation. Representative Richard Radl was serving his 4<sup>th</sup> term and had listed his party affiliation as a Democrat until his last term in 1971-1972.

Although collective information regarding the 64<sup>th</sup> Iowa General Assembly lists one person with no party affiliation in the book *The Iowa General Assembly: Our Legislative Heritage 1846-1980*, subsequent information in the book next to Representative Radl's name lists him as a Democrat. Furthermore, the Legislative website also lists Representative Radl as a Democrat, and his photo caption in the 1971-1972 *Official Register* lists no party affiliation.
