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## SharePoint® at Iowa DOT

**T**he Iowa DOT accomplishes coordination of the entire state transportation system, but do we do a good job of coordinating with each other?

Because of the wide-reaching nature of what we do, precision and accuracy are essential when completing a task. Often that means many people have the opportunity to review, comment and add to documents and other data.

Tracking those changes over time and documenting who commented on what has, for the most part, been a manual process. The Iowa DOT is seeking to minimize the manual tracking of edits and comments by moving to a Web-based collaboration platform called SharePoint®. Karla Hocker, information technology specialist 4 in the Information Technology Division, said, "We envision the use of this tool for anything that would be routed using a buck slip."

Hocker has been part of a governance team that has researched and developed the tool. This committee studied ways to better coordinate work flows at the Iowa DOT before selecting SharePoint to help with that task. Once selected, the group developed guidelines for its use.

The committee selected four pilot projects to test SharePoint. They found that the tool would meet the needs at the Iowa DOT, but they also found that training was essential to success. "This tool is not just for IT people," said Hocker. "It has options and features that anyone with a few days of training can use to build their own SharePoint site."

Employee training on SharePoint began in April. Two different levels of classes are offered, a one-day user class and a three-day "power user" class. "We see the power user as someone who will build sites for their office, because IT will not be building sites for everyone. Each office or group using SharePoint will be responsible for building their own sites. The one-day class is for 'contributors,' people who will be using SharePoint to collaborate on the data, but won't be building any sites."

If the thought of building your own site on SharePoint sends shivers up your spine, never fear. Hocker says the tool makes building a work flow rather simple. "There is no coding or overly complicated processes to learn," she said. "The program is really intuitive. The three-day training will go over everything you need to know in the first two days and the third day is a workshop so you can build your first site with the guidance of the instructor."



Hocker says the governance committee anticipates up to 1,200 different Iowa DOT SharePoint sites. She says the system has been developed so that all sites are "read only," unless the settings are changed. Sites can also be marked as confidential. All sites are backed up and can only be deleted by the site owner, typically the employee or office that developed the site. There is no automatic archiving, so sites are active until the site owner deletes them.

The Highway Division is expected to be a major user of SharePoint. This group has programmed training dollars into their budget. All other divisions must come up with the cost of training from their existing budgets. The cost of the class is \$356 per person for the three-day class and \$133 per person for the one-day class. Highway Division employees wishing to take a SharePoint class should contact Dennis Peperkorn at 515-239-1188 or [dennis.peperkorn@dot.iowa.gov](mailto:dennis.peperkorn@dot.iowa.gov). Employees from all other divisions may register for the training from the Skills and Training menu in IDMS. Supervisor approval is required.

Hocker said, "Eventually we hope to build a community of 'experts' who can help each other. IT employees will provide support when needed, but the intent is for the power users to be the 'go-to' people for their offices."

To give even more information on SharePoint, Hocker says the governance committee hopes to implement monthly users group meetings starting in June. "We are planning to hold these meetings on the third Thursday of the month from 1-2:30 p.m. We'll begin with central complex users and then branch out using video conferencing to the districts as those users come on board."

## Iowa fifth grader wins national poster contest



**M**ore than 2,500 individuals from around the country voted to choose the winner for this year's Saris Cycling Group National Poster Contest. Isabella Gehrt, a fifth grader from West Bend-Mallard Elementary in Iowa, was selected as the winner of the second annual poster contest, which was held in partnership with bicycle advocacy groups nationwide to raise bicycle awareness.

Gehrt will be flown to Washington, D.C., for the 2013 National Bike Summit to celebrate bicycling and be recognized for her thoughtful artwork. Gehrt's school will receive bike parking for 20 bikes, and The Hub, a Web-based system that tracks and encourages active transportation.

"Iowa is such a great state for bicycling; and to ensure it remains that way, it's important for kids to learn good, safe and practical bicycling behaviors early on in life," said Iowa contest coordinator Nick Sobocinski. "The Saris poster contest really helps emphasize all the great ways in which a bicycle can be fun and rewarding, and encourages kids to ride regularly."

More than 6,300 students from 25 different states participated in the contest by submitting posters centered on the theme "Bicycling takes me places!" Winners were also selected at the state level. Each will receive a bike, bike light and helmet.

"Over the past 20 years in the bike industry, I have seen the bicycle positively change the lives of many individuals as well as communities," explained SCG President Chris Fortune. "We have already witnessed the tremendous impact this contest can have on our youth. It is one way we're able to engage kids to think about and become more aware of the bicycle and its many beneficial uses. We are hopeful this contest will encourage fifth graders to ride their bikes more frequently; and we are hopeful it will help shape lifelong, healthy active lifestyles."

## National Bike to Work Week May 14-18



**T**he Iowa DOT is encouraging employees to bike to work May 14-18 for National Bike to Work Month. Before you jump on two wheels and take to the road, please read over these tips from the League of American Bicyclists to prepare you for a safe and fun bike commute.

### Follow the law.

Your safety and the image of bicyclists depend on you. You have the same rights and duties as drivers. Obey traffic signals and stop signs. Ride with the flow of traffic on the right side of the road.

### Be predictable.

Make your intentions clear to motorists and other road users. Ride in a straight line and don't swerve between parked cars. Signal turns, and check behind you well before turning or changing lanes.

### Be conspicuous.

Ride where drivers can see you; wear bright clothing. Use a front white light and red rear light, and reflectors at night or when visibility is poor. Make eye contact with drivers. Don't ride on sidewalks.

### Think ahead.

Anticipate what drivers, pedestrians and other bicyclists will do next. Watch for turning vehicles and ride outside the door zone of parked cars. Look out for debris, potholes and utility covers. Cross railroad tracks at right angles.

### Ride ready.

Check to ensure that your bike's tires have sufficient air, the brakes are working, chain runs smoothly, and quick-release wheel levers are closed. Carry repair and emergency supplies appropriate for your ride. Wear a helmet.

### Keep your cool.

Road rage benefits no one and always makes a bad situation worse.



# Beginning a fitness walking program

The Iowa DOT's Wellness Champions are all about making the first steps toward fitness fun and easy. If you want to begin a fitness program, but don't know where to start, this could be the information you have been waiting for.



**W**alking is one of the easiest and most profitable forms of exercise. All you need is a good pair of shoes, comfortable clothing and desire. This following is a step-by-step process adapted from [www.thewalkingsite.com](http://www.thewalkingsite.com).

**How to start:** First of all, start out slow and easy. Just walk out the door. For most people, this means head out the door, walk for 10 minutes and walk back. That's it? Yes, that's it. Do this every day for a week. If this was easy for you, add five minutes to your walks next week (total walking time 25 minutes). Keep adding five minutes until you are walking as long as desired.

Watch your posture. Walk tall. Think of elongating your body. Hold your head up and eyes forward. Your shoulders should be down, back and relaxed. Tighten your abdominal muscles and buttocks and fall into a natural stride.

Be sure to drink plenty of water before, during and after walking. Incorporate a warm-up, cool-down and stretches into your routine. Start your walk at a slow, warm-up pace, stop and do a few warm-up or flexibility drills. Then walk for the desired length of time. End your walk with the slower cool-down pace and stretch well after your walk. Stretching will make you feel great and assist in injury prevention.

The toughest thing about starting a fitness program is developing a habit. Walking daily will help (a minimum of five days a week is a good goal). You should walk fast enough to reach your target heart rate, but you should not be gasping for air.

After you have formed the habit, you will want to evaluate your program and your goals. Here are some general guidelines.

If you are walking for the general health benefits, try to walk 30 minutes a day most days of the week, at a "talking" pace. (Talking pace means you have elevated breathing, but you can still carry a conversation.)

To improve cardiovascular fitness you should walk three to four days a week, 20 to 30 minutes at a very fast pace. At this pace you are breathing hard, but not gasping for air.

If you are walking for weight loss, you should walk a minimum of five days a week, 45 to 60 minutes at a brisk pace.

Once you can comfortably walk for 30 to 60 minutes five to six days a week, you may want to put more "umph" or speed into your routine. Visit [www.thewalkingsite.com](http://www.thewalkingsite.com) for more information and tips on walking.

*Notice:* If you are new to walking, start off with slow, short sessions and build your way up gradually. If you have any health concerns or medical conditions, be sure to check with your doctor for advice before you begin a routine.

# Nutrition Notes

## Quinoa – a new look at an ancient grain.

**Q**uinoa (pronounced keen-wah) is a recently rediscovered ancient “grain,” native to Central America. This tiny seed can be found in a variety of colors, although white is the most commonly consumed. The seeds are similar in size to millet, but are flat with a pointed oval shape like a sesame seed. Most often considered a grain, quinoa comes from the goosefoot plant, a relative of leafy green vegetables such as spinach and Swiss chard.

**A nutrition powerhouse.** This tiny seed is a powerhouse when it comes to nutrition. It is high in protein, around 12–18 percent, an unusual occurrence among plant foods. In fact, the protein in quinoa is considered to be a “complete protein,” as it contains all eight essential amino acids that are needed for building and maintaining muscle in humans. Just 4 ounces, about ½ cup, will provide a child’s protein needs for one day.

The quinoa seed is also high in calcium and iron, nutrients essential to a woman’s health. Naturally gluten-free, quinoa also makes a nutritious and flavorful alternative grain for those with gluten sensitivity. Providing 3 grams of dietary fiber per serving, quinoa would be a worthy addition to anyone’s diet.

**Simple to Use - tips for preparing quinoa.** The first step is to remove the saponins, a natural bitter coating, by soaking the ancient grain in water. While most boxed quinoa has been prerinsed for convenience, it is still a good idea to wash the seeds and remove any remaining saponin residue. Simply run cold water over quinoa and gently rub the seeds together. To ensure that the saponins have been completely removed, taste a few seeds. If they still have a bitter taste, continue the rinsing process.

A common cooking method is to treat quinoa much like rice. Bring 2 cups of water to a boil and add 1 cup quinoa. Bring the mixture back to a boil, covering the pan with a lid, and continue to cook over medium heat for 12-15 minutes. Remove from heat, fluff, cover again and let stand for 15 minutes. This should yield around four servings.

### A few quick serving ideas

Quinoa will produce a fluffy, creamy and slightly crunchy consistency with a mild and somewhat nutty flavor when cooked. Try incorporating quinoa into your next meal using one of these quick serving ideas.

- Substitute quinoa for rice in any entree, soup or salad recipe.
- Create a side dish with a kick of flavor by substituting water with chicken or vegetable stock when cooking quinoa.
- Mix quinoa with honey, almonds or berries for a high-protein hot breakfast cereal.
- For a twist on your favorite pasta recipe, use noodles made from quinoa.
- Ground quinoa flour can be added to cookie or muffin recipes.

## Hot Apple Quinoa

### All you need

- ½ cup Bob’s Red Mill whole grain quinoa
- ½ cup instant brown rice
- 1 apple, cored and chopped
- 1 tsp ground cinnamon
- 2 cups water
- 2 Tbsp raisins
- 2 Tbsp dried cranberries
- 2 Tbsp chia seeds
- 2 Tbsp light agave nectar



### All you do

1. In a 4-quart microwave-safe bowl, combine quinoa, rice, apple, cinnamon and water.
2. Microwave on high power for 12 minutes.
3. Stir in raisins, dried cranberries, chia seeds and light agave nectar.



# Memorial Day – so much more than the kick-off for summer



**T**he last Monday in May is often spent outside with the barbeque grill blazing. But Memorial Day was always meant to be so much more than the unofficial start to the summer season.

Memorial Day began as an event to honor Union soldiers who had died during the American Civil War. It was inspired by the way people in the Southern states honored their dead. After World War I, it was extended to include all men and women, who died in any war or military action.

Memorial Day was originally known as Decoration Day. The current name did not come into use until after World War II. Decoration Day and then Memorial Day was observed May 30, regardless of the day of the week, on which it fell. In 1968, the Uniform Holidays Bill was passed as part of a move to use federal holidays to create three-day weekends. Since its effective date in 1971, the Memorial Day holiday has been officially observed on the last Monday in May.

The Iowa DOT fully supports the efforts of our military members and encourages all employees to observe a National Moment of Remembrance by pausing for one minute at 3 p.m. May 30 to reflect on the sacrifices made by so many to provide freedom for all.
