Results Accountability

Accountability at the state, local and community program delivery level have been a hallmark of Community Empowerment since its inception in 1998.

Essentially state and local policy makers are encouraged to ask the following questions:

- What are the results we want for young children and their families?
- What does data tell us about how the well-being of young children and their families?
- What will work to improve the results?
- How will we know if a specific service, product or activity is working?

Results accountability is about the first two questions. What are the results, or bottom line conditions desired for all the young children and families at the state or community level? Where do we want to go?

The desired results for Community Empowerment, through legislation are:

- Healthy Children
- Children Ready to Succeed in School
- Safe and Supportive Communities
- Secure and Nurturing Families
- Secure and Nurturing Child Care Environments

Using data at the statewide and community level, indicators are used to measure progress toward the desired results for all of lowa's young children and their families. These measures directly or indirectly quantify achievement of a result. In 2000, the lowa Empowerment Board approved the following indicators to track statewide progress, by result area:
