Marketing initiative asks for new project ideas

The Leopold Center's Marketing and Food Systems Initiative has issued a request for pre-proposals (RFP) for research and education projects. The RFP invites researchers and educators at educational or nonprofit organizations in Iowa to submit a brief concept paper describing their project by August 24.

The RFP lists directed research and education topics that will be priorities in selecting projects to fund. Areas of inter-

est include documentation of the benefits of local and regional food production in Iowa, consumer understanding of ecolabels, and case studies in which farmers share equally in the rewards across a value chain.

2004 Spencer Award goes to Thompsons during Iowa State Fair

You're invited to join the Leopold Center in honoring Dick and Sharon Thompson when they receive the 2004 Spencer Award for Sustainable Agriculture on August 14 during the Iowa State Fair.

The Thompsons, who have a 300-acre crop and livestock operation in Boone County, are pioneers in sustainable agriculture. They began experimenting with alternative farming methods in 1968 and in 1985 helped start Practical Farmers of Iowa. They have traveled extensively to share their results.

They will receive the award at 4 p.m., August 14, in the Pioneer Livestock Pavilion on the Iowa State Fairgrounds. The short ceremony precedes the Iowa Governor's Charity Steer Show in the same location.

The Spencer Award recognizes farmers, researchers and educators who have made a significant contribution toward the stability of mainstream family farms in Iowa. The award honors Norman A. and Margaretha Geiger Spencer, who farmed near Sioux City for 40 years, and includes a \$1,000 gift. The award has been presented annually since 2002, and is funded by an endowment from the Spencer family.


Hoop Group plans international conference September 14

Iowa State University's Hoop Group, that began nearly a decade ago as a Leopold Center-funded research team to explore alternative swine production systems, has gone international. The group is planning an international conference September 14 about using hoop barns and bedded systems for hogs as well as dairy and beef cattle and other animal species.

At the conference, participants will have the opportunity to step inside a virtual hoop structure developed at ISU as a tool for housing design. Speakers from Australia, Canada, England, The Netherlands and Ukraine will share how hoops and bedded systems are used in those countries. Other sessions will cover animal welfare, process-verified or niche market livestock production using hoop structures and other bedded systems.

The conference will begin at 7:30 a.m. at the Gateway Center, located at U.S. Highway 30 and Elwood Drive in Ames.
