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1) Scholarships to ARSL Fall Conference: This news comes from Tena Hanson, Estherville PL Director and Past President of ARSL—Association for Rural and Small Libraries. ARSL is offering 3 scholarships for first-time conference attendees to attend its annual fall conference in Little Rock (AR) October 1-3, 2015.

As Tena explains "...the scholarships vary, but provide for conference membership, a travel stipend, and hotel accommodations. All are welcome to apply including students, paraprofessionals, and MLS-degreed librarians. Applications must be received by **5:00PM CST on June 19, 2015 to be considered**.

The ARSL conference is entirely dedicated to libraries that serve smaller and or rural populations. Last year, well over 300 library professionals gathered; this year's goal is 500 small and rural professionals together to gain support from, learn from, and most importantly build connections with each other. You may wonder what small is defined as; well we have long said that if you think your system is small or rural, it probably is !..."

Among the pre-conferences available: a session on emergency planning, accidental leadership, apps, and more. Two planned tours are also available: one is a walking tour of the Riverwalk area, the second is a stop at the Clinton Presidential Center Library.

Registration costs for ARSL 2015 begin at \$263.50 (member rate) slightly more for nonmembers. This fee includes 3 days of learning, access to the welcome reception, breakfast (Thurs/Fri) lunch (Thurs/Fri) and a Saturday brunch. This year's conference also includes access to all speaker events, including Friday's featured author P.C. Cast. 

3) Pulitzer Prize Winner in Fiction: The 2015 Pulitzer Prizes were announced in late April, awarding the NY Times best-selling novel <u>All the Light We Cannot See</u> as the 2015 Pulitzer Prize winner for fiction. Written by Anthony Doerr, this novel is the story of a blind French girl and a German boy whose paths collide in occupied France during the chaos of WWII.

Named for Joseph Pulitzer and "honoring excellence in journalism and the arts since 1917," the Pulitzer Prize is among the most notable achievements in journalism, literature, and drama. Today, there are 21 awards that also include outstanding achievements in poetry, music, and photography. No doubt, <u>All the Light We Cannot See</u> doesn't sit on your shelves for long! Given its popularity, this would make a logical choice for book discussion groups. For collection development purposes, libraries can accompany this year's fiction winner with this year's non-fiction titles. Here are a just few:

- Winner in general non-fiction = <u>The 6th Extinction</u>: An Unnatural History by Elizabeth Kolbert
- Winner in poetry = <u>Diges</u>t by Gregory Pardlo
- Winner in history = <u>Encounters at the Heart of the World: A History of the Mandan</u> <u>People</u> by Elizabeth Fenn
- Winner in biography = <u>The Pope and Mussolini: The Secret History of Pius XI and the</u> <u>Rise of Fascism in Europe</u> by David I. Kertzer
