

WOMEN IN IOWA: 2009

In 1981, the U.S. Congress passed a resolution establishing National Women's History Week. The week was chosen to coincide with International Women's Day, March 8. In 1987, Congress expanded the week to a month. Every year since, Congress and the Iowa General Assembly have passed a resolution for Women's History Month, and the U.S. president and Iowa's Governor have issued a proclamation.

1,513,505

The estimated population of females in Iowa as of July 1, 2007. That exceeds the number of men (1,474,541). Males outnumber females in every five-year-age group through the 55-to-59 age group. Starting with the 60-to-64 age group women outnumber men. At ages 85 and over there are more than twice as many women as men.



1,696,080

The projected female population of Iowa as of July 1, 2030. According to the U.S. Census Bureau, women will constitute 50.4 percent of the states's total population on that date.

39.4

The estimated median age for the female population in Iowa in 2007 . The estimated median age for the state of Iowa was 38.0. The male estimated median age was 36.6.

Families and Children

19.1%

The percent of children under 18 in 2007 living with their mother compared to 74.9 percent living with both parents and 6.1 percent living with their father.

110,471

The number of Iowa families with a female householder, no husband present in 2007. In 1970 there were 52,025 families with a female head of household.



677,551

Number of married women in 2007 (including those who are separated or have an absent spouse).

52.8%

Percent of unmarried lowans who are women in 2007. There are 552,384 unmarried (widowed, divorced or never married) women.

EDUCATION

253,933

The number of girls enrolled in the state's elementary and high schools during the 2007-2008 school year.

91.8

The graduation rate for girls during in 2007. The graduation rate for boys was 89.2.

The percentage of women in Iowa age 25 and over who had at least a high school education in 2007. This compares to 61.8 percent of women who had completed 4 years of high school or higher in 1970.

24.1%

The percentage of women in Iowa age 25 and over with a bachelor's degree or higher in 2007. This compares to 7.5 percent of women who had completed 4 years of college or higher in 1970.

67,770

Number of women in lowa 25 years and older with an advanced degree in 2007. (e.g., master's, professional, doctorate.) The number of men in lowa with an advanced degree in 2007 was 81,166.

170,761

Enrollment of women in lowa's universities and colleges in 2008. Women make up 59.3 percent of the total enrollment in 2008.


The number of Iowa women in 2007 who are veterans of the U.S. armed forces.



The number of womenowned firms in 2002. These firms account for \$7,398,962,000 in sales and receipts.

The unemployment rate for women in Iowa in 2007. The Iowa unemployment rate at that time was 4.8%.

63.3%

The percent of Iowa women age 16 years and over in the labor force in 2007. The percent of men in Iowa age 16 and over in the labor force was 74.7%.

Earnings \$30,925


The median earnings in 2007 inflation-adjusted dollars for full-time, yearround women workers in lowa. Men in Iowa had median earnings of \$41,375.

Industry 269,329

The number of Iowa women in the education, health, and social services industry in 2007. More women, 37% of Iowa's total female labor force, work in this one industry group than in any other.

12.2%

The percent of women who work in the retail trade industry in 2007, the second highest industry for the female labor force. Approximately 9.8 percent work in the finance and insurance, and real estate and rental, 8.9 percent in manufacturing, and 8.5 percent work in the arts, entertainment, and recreation, and accommodation and food services industry.




Occupation 35.5%

The percent of women in Iowa in management, professional, and related occupations in 2007. This is the largest occupation group for women in the state.

169,557

The number of Iowa women in office and administrative support occupations in 2007. Women represent a wide variety of occupations in Iowa. For instance. there are about 59.437 women in healthcare practitioner and technical occupations, 48,808 in management occupations and 37,641 primary, secondary and special education teachers.

The 2007 birth rate per 1,000 women age 15-44 in lowa.





INCOME AND POVERTY

\$31,686

The median income for women in Iowa who worked full-time, year-round in the past 12 months in 2007. The median income for men in the state was \$42,163.

\$22,942

The median income for female householders, no husband present with own children under 18 years. The median income for married-couple families with own children under 18 years was \$72,086.

12.4%

The poverty rate in 2007 for women in Iowa. The corresponding rate for men is 9.6 percent.

52.1%

The percentage of female households, no husband present with related children under age 5, below the poverty level in 2007. The corresponding rate for married-couple families with related children under 5 years was 7.0 percent.
