The first American Indian Day was celebrated in May 1916 in New York. In 1990, President George H.W. Bush signed a joint congressional resolution designating November 1990 as “National American Indian Heritage Month.” Similar proclamations have been issued every year since 1994.

The estimated number of Native Americans and Alaska Natives in Iowa in 2013. Census Bureau estimates a 64.0% increase in population between 2000 and 2013.

13,784

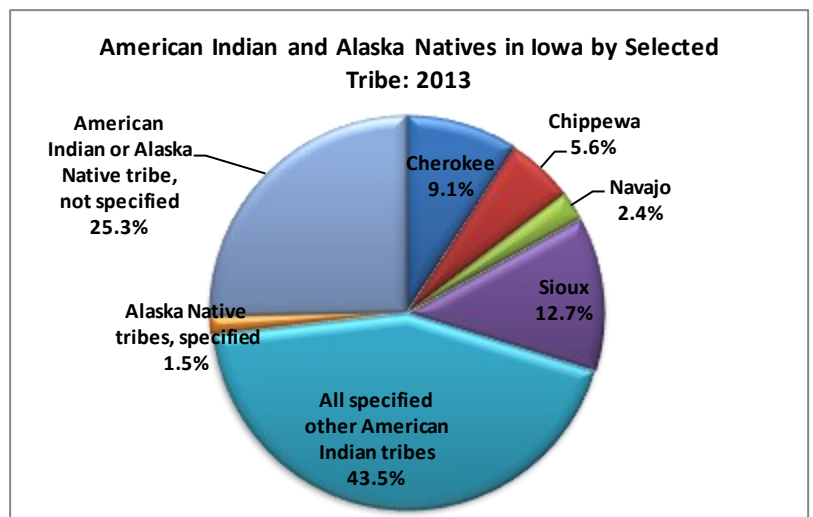
The projected Native American population of Iowa in 2040. According to Woods & Pool Economics Inc., Native Americans will constitute 0.4 percent of the states total population on that date.

The average household size for American Indian and Alaska Native households in Iowa. The average household size for the state of Iowa is 2.4.

Education

The percentage of Iowa American Indian and Alaska Natives age 25 and over, who had at least a high school education in 2013.

Number of Iowa American Indian and Alaska Natives 25 years and older with an advanced degree in 2013. (e.g., master's, professional, doctorate.)

Percent decrease in Native American enrollment between the 1999-2000 school year and 2013-2014.

56.0%

The percentage of American Indians and Alaska Natives in 2013 who were born in Iowa. This compares to 74.8% of the total population in Iowa who were born in the state.

73.8%

The percentage of American Indians and Alaska Natives in 2013 who lived in the same house last year. For the entire state of Iowa, that percentage was 84.7%.

Housing

35.2%

The percentage of American Indians and Alaska Natives in Iowa who own their home in 2013. This compares with 70.8% for the state of Iowa.

67.8%

The percentage of American Indians and Alaska Natives in 2011 who live in an urban area. This compares with 58.5% for the state of Iowa.

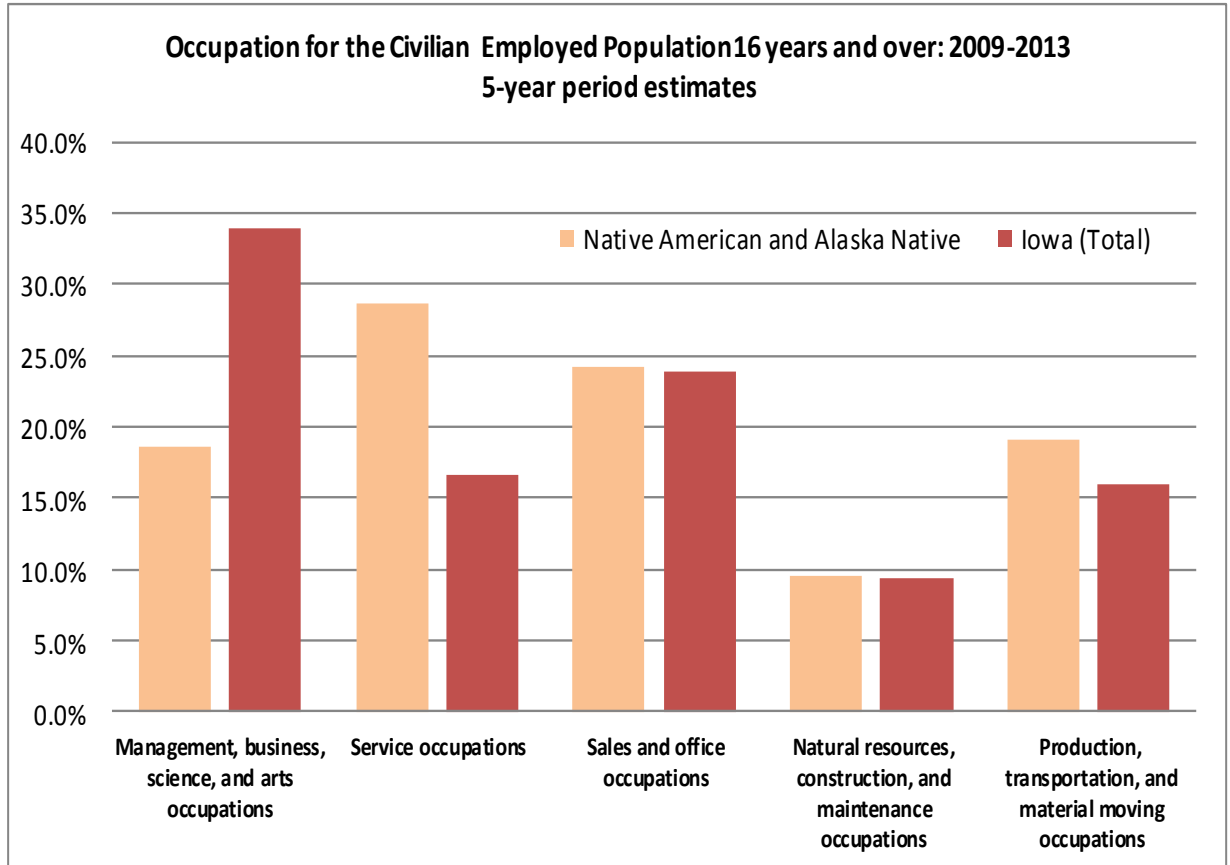
The unemployment rate for Iowa American Indian and Alaska Natives in 2013. The Iowa unemployment rate at that time was 5.8%.

Counties and cities

The number of American Indian and Alaska Natives in Woodbury County in 2013, making it largest population of American Indian and Alaska Natives in any Iowa county.

40.3%

Nearly half of the total American Indian and Alaska Native population live in Woodbury, Polk and Tama counties.

53.6%

Over one-half of the growth in Iowa's Native American population from 2000-2013 occurred in seven counties: Woodbury, Polk, Pottawattamie, Tama, Dallas, Black Hawk, and Linn.

7.7%

The percent of total population in Tama County who are American Indian and Alaska Natives in 2013. The next county with high percentages of American Indian and Alaska Natives is

Woodbury with 2.6%.

2,134

The number of American Indian and Alaska Natives in Sioux City in 2010, making it largest population of American Indian and Alaska Natives in any city in Iowa.

The percent of total population in Vining who are American Indian and Alaska Natives. The other two Iowa cities with a high percentage

is Tama and Toledo with 5.8%, respectively.
