# LATINOS IN IOWA: 2015

SEPTEMBER 2015

In 1968, Congress authorized President Lyndon B. Johnson to proclaim a week in September as National Hispanic Heritage Week. The observance was expanded in 1988 to a month-long celebration (Sept. 15-Oct. 15). During this month, the United States celebrates the culture and traditions of U.S. residents who trace their roots to Spain, Mexico and the Spanish-speaking nations of Central America, South America and the Caribbean. Sept. 15 was chosen as the starting point for the celebration because it is the anniversary of independence of five Latin American countries: Costa Rica, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras and Nicaragua. In addition, Mexico and Chile celebrate their independence days on Sept. 16 and Sept. 18, respectively.

#### 173,594

The estimated Latino population of lowa as of July 1, 2014, making people of Latino origin the state's largest race or ethnic minority. Latinos constitute 5.6 percent of the state's total population

#### 110.5%

The percent change in the Latino population from 2000 to 2014. This is an 91,121 increase for the period.

#### 450,321

The projected Latino population of lowa as of July 1, 2050. According to the 2014 Woods & Pool Economics Inc., Latinos will constitute 13.0 percent of the state's total population on that date.

## Families and Children

#### 33,047

The number of Latino families in 2014 who reside in Iowa.

#### 3,402

The number of Latino grandparents in 2014 living with their own

grandchildren. 57.7% of those are responsible for the own grandchildren under 18 years of age. This compares to 28.6% for the U.S..

#### 12.1%

Percentage of Latino population under age 5 as of July 1, 2014. Latinos have a higher concentration of preschoolers among the population than any other race or ethnic group.



The median age of lowa's Latino population in 2014. The median age for the state of lowa is 38.1.



The average family size for the lowa Latino population in 2010. The average family size in the state of lowa is 2.97.




#### Age Distribution



The median income of Latino families in 2014. The median family income for the state was \$67,771.



#### 32.0%


The percent of Iowa Latinos in 2014 who are foreignborn.

#### 41,224

Other Latin American areas of origin with a large foreign-born population are El Salvador (3,647), Guatemala (4,887), Panama (625), Ecuador (714), Columbia (665), Brazil (759), and Venezuela (656).

### **Iowa Counties**

#### 36,994

The number of Latinos in Polk County in 2014, making it largest population of Latinos in any county at 21.3% of the state-wide population.

#### 27.3%

The percent of total population in Crawford County who are Latino in 2014. Other Iowa counties with a high percentage of Latinos are Buena Vista (24.8%), Marshall (19.9%), Muscatine (17.2%). Louisa (16.2%).

#### 53.8%

Over half of the total 2014 Latino population live in Polk, Woodbury, Scott, , Marshall, Johnson, Muscatine, and Pottawattamie.

#### 52.7%

Over half of the growth in lowa's Latino population from 2000-2014 occurred in seven counties: Polk, Woodbury, Johnson, Marshall, Scott, Pottawattamie, Linn, and Crawford. The Latino population in Ringgold increased by 669.2% between 2000 and 2014.
