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1) EBSCOHost Buying Groups: This news release comes from Jay Peterson—the State Library is again offering buying groups for public libraries allowing access to great products from **EBSCOhost**. **Important note:** libraries **NEW** to **EBSCO Buying Groups** have until **May 30th** to contact Jay and get in on this action ☺

For libraries **NEW** to these additional databases, this is the chance to take advantage of the great deals that **EBSCOhost** is offering for products like **Auto Repair Reference Center** database (you can replace those Chilton manuals on your shelves!) and our new offering **Library Aware** that will help with library program marketing. The subscription extends **July 1, 2016** through **June 30, 2017**.

There are 8 database packages and products to choose from. All of these databases require that your library has a basic EBSCOhost account. Here's a look at the 8 products:

2) Digitizing With Help From Iowa Heritage Digital Collections: This article comes from Barb Corson with the State Library. Barb is the Program Director of Specialized Library Services and in that capacity, supervises digitization projects through Iowa Heritage Digital Collections (IHDC) Barb has more about digitization services through IHDC: *"...this is a free online resource provided by the State Library for Iowa libraries and museums. IHDC allows documents, images and memorabilia of historical significance to be digitized and accessed online by the public. Take a look <http://www.iowaheritage.org/> So if you have historical items and are interested in creating a collection, State Library staff can help you get started using IHDC! Digitizing your local historic collection allows you to keep the original in a safe place while granting public access without the worry of wear and tear or damage..."*

Are any of these challenges holding you back?

- ✓ Your library or museum does not have a scanner == **Solution:** In many cases, State Library staff can assist with digitizing your materials. We have scanned materials for several contributors including the Ruth Suckow Memorial Association

- ✓ You don't know where to begin == **Solution:** State Library staff can come to help you assess your collection and determine a good place to start. Often it is with a small group of photos or other items that have a common theme. Once you get started, you can add more as you have time.
- ✓ You don't have enough staff to work on a project == **Solution:** Collaborate with another group. The Kalona Public Library and the Kalona Historical Village worked together to create their collection <http://bit.ly/1OAKgzo>. They also used that magic group: volunteers! Over several months the volunteers have been able to add more than 65 photos to their collection.

4) Tech Conference in Storm Lake: Northwest and Prairie Lakes AEA team up again in June for their 8th annual TICL Conference. TICL stands for Technology Integration for the 21st Century Learner and takes place June 20-22 at Buena Vista University campus in Storm Lake. Public library reps can plan on attending the first two days; teachers and faculty typically attend the third day (6/22) for work-group meetings with colleagues.

Without question, this tech conference is aimed at classroom teachers and principals. But it's also a very worthwhile event for public library staff as well. This conference offers exposure to national keynote speakers, raises awareness of new educational software and apps, and sets up public library staff to network with their school colleagues. Plus, Storm Lake is a close-to-home location for Northwest Iowa, closer than most regional and state conferences—that's a bonus!
