NOT ALL PHONES COMPATIBLE WITH TDD

If you ever purchase a telephone, be sure it's compatible with TDD. I had 2 telephones, one worked with TDD the other didn't. After struggling I discovered that one had a magnetic or mechanical bell; the other was electronic. The one with the mechanical bell or magnet worked, but not the electronic. It also depended on the telephone signaler. Some signalers require a telephone while others just plug into a modular phone jack. Whenever you purchase a telephone, ask for the one with a magnetic or mechanical bell. If the merchant isn't sure, ask if it could be returned.

National Captioning Institute (NCI) has released a resolution from its Corporate Advisory Council calling for television manufacturers to build closed caption decoding capability into new television sets by 1991.

Are you aware that the cost to have a one-hour videocassette closed or opened captioned could range anywhere from \$1,500 to \$2,000?

IOWA ASSOCIATION OF THE DEAF (IAD) CONVENTION

IAD held it's 43rd annual convention in Iowa City August 10-August 13th. It was a huge success with 300 attending from Maryland to Hawaii. Three shows were held on Thursday evening & the Miss Deaf Iowa Pageant on Friday evening.

Banquet speakers were Senator Tom Harkin and President King Jordan of Gallaudet University. Tom Harkin spoke about the Disabilities Act of 1990. He said all TV sets sold in the U.S. should be capable of receiving & displaying closed caption, at a cost of \$5.00 to \$10 per set. (Editor's Note:

On August 15, 1990 Senator Tom Harkin reported that the Senate Labor & Human Resources Committee passed ADA by a unanimous bipartisan vote 16-0, & President Bush announced he would give his full support to the bill. ADA extends civil rights protections for people with disabilities to cover such areas as employment in the private sector, public accommodations (such as theaters, hotels, restaurants, shopping centers, & grocery stores, as well

as services provided by state & local governments, transportation and telecommunication relay services).

Four contestants participated in Miss Deaf Iowa Pageant. Kelly Stephens of Des Moines won Miss Deaf Iowa. She will be one of the contestants to compete in Miss Deaf NAD at Indianapolis, IN during the National Association of the Deaf Convention in July of 1990.

Dr. Bowe, professor of Hofstra University and editor for TJ Publishers of Silver Spring, MD gave an update on the recommendations of

COED, Commission on Education of the Deaf. Bowe serves as the COED chair

COED'S Recommendation 1 called for the creation of a new research institute. Just six months later, the National Institute on Deafness and Other Communication Disorders was formed. The budget exceeds \$90 million this year.

Recommendations 3-16 addressed better education for deaf children. New OSERS Assistant Secretary Robert R. Davila, who is deaf himself, has promised to act vigorously on these recommendations. He took office July 24, 1989.

Recommendations 17-20 said that Regional Postsecondary Programs for the Deaf, such as the St. Paul St. Paul Technical Institute, should be funded for five years and given a bigger job to do. These recommendations have been implemented.

Recommendation 20 called for new centers to serve low-functioning deaf youth and adults.

Recommendations 25-26 called for Gallaudet and NTID to involve Deaf people more in their governance. Both Boards now are close to 51% deaf.

One of the final items of convention business was the selection of the 1991 IAD convention site. Council Bluffs was chosen.

RESOLUTION

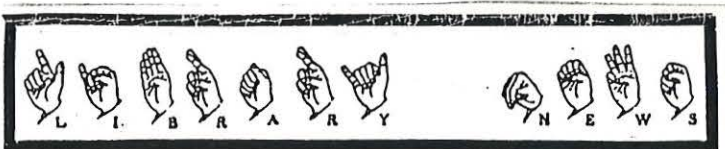
