Volunteer Promotion

Iowa has the third highest rate of volunteerism in the country with 40.3% of its adult population (age 16 and above) volunteering on a regular basis. In order to sustain this extraordinarily high level of volunteerism, Volunteer Iowa continues efforts to recognize and promote volunteer service through events, including the Volunteer Iowa! broadcast, the Governor's Youth Leadership Awards, the Iowa Volunteer Hall of Fame, the Iowa Celebration of Youth Service Day and the Annual Governor's Volunteer Awards.

Volunteer Iowa! Broadcast

Volunteer lowa partners with lowa Public Television to broadcast a volunteer drive for one-hour of live primetime television. During the February 2005 broadcast, thousands of lowans made a commitment to spend time volunteering in their communities. Callers pledged 1,554,017 hours, which are valued at nearly \$27 million.¹

Governor's Youth Leadership Awards

The Governor's Youth Leadership Award recognizes individual youth and youth organizations that exemplify positive leadership in their communities and schools. Nominated youth have demonstrated leadership and involvement in school and community activities.

Iowa Volunteer Hall of Fame

Each year, lowa inducts five individuals and organizations into the Volunteer Hall of Fame to recognize extraordinary donations of volunteer service to their communities. A special Hall of Fame induction ceremony is held in Des Moines.

Iowa Celebration of Youth Service Day

Each year, students in grades 1-12 gather to celebrate their volunteer service accomplishments. This year, over 600 students attended the event at the Knapp Center at Drake University.

Annual Governor's Volunteer Awards

This program gives state agencies and nonprofits a way to honor the volunteers who devote their time to benefit their agency. Last year, the Governor presented awards to nearly 500 recipients at three regional ceremonies held in Storm Lake, Marion and Des Moines.

The Iowa Training Conference for National Service

Volunteer lowa hosted a three day lowa Training Conference for National Service in October 2004. Over 150 participants from AmeriCorps*State and National, AmeriCorps*VISTA, and Senior Corps attended grant writing, resource development, conflict resolution, disability outreach, and poverty alleviation workshops The Iowa Training Conference provided the opportunity for participants to advance their careers while networking between service programs.

Fulfilling Iowa's Promise to Children and Youth

On December 13th, 2004, America's Promise named Iowa as a "State of Promise." The Iowa's Promise designation was a result of an effort by numerous state agencies, led by Volunteer Iowa, to uphold their responsibility to provide Five Promises to Iowa's children and youth:

Caring Adults: ongoing relationships with caring adults – parents, mentors, tutors or coaches
Safe Places to Learn and Grow
A Healthy Start and future
Marketable skills through effective education
Opportunities to Serve: opportunities to give back through community service.

To support lowa's Promise, Volunteer lowa administers lowa's Promise Youth grants, supports local Communities of Promise initiatives and has developed a State of Promise AmeriCorps planning grant. Volunteer lowa allocates \$8,000 to various youth groups throughout the state. Youth Grants are in the amount of \$250 used to pay for their service projects. To receive an Iowa's Promise Youth grant, local youth groups must partner with at least one other community group to plan and execute a community improvement or service project.

Volunteer lowa offers financial and technical assistance to communities as they plan and implement positive youth development initiatives in the process of becoming a Community of Promise. Programs and initiatives promoted by this partnership are specifically designed NOT to replace current programs, but to enhance and expand local efforts. They also develop a common positive youth development language and philosophy among youth service providers.

ISU Extension/4-H Youth Development is planning an AmeriCorps program that places members in communities to build and assist local youth development collaborations and to build a collaborative relationship with early childhood and local Empowerment Boards efforts.



AmeriCorps

AmeriCorps is a national service program that unites diverse Americans in improving our neighborhoods while strengthening citizenship, fostering the ethic of service, and helping communities. In addition to a living allowance while serving, AmeriCorps members are eligible for higher education scholarships upon completion of a term of service.

Iowa AmeriCorps Program Portfolio

AMERICAN RED CROSS AMERICORPS COMMUNITY DISASTER EDUCATION (Statewide)

- Conducted 476 school Masters of Disaster and Facing Fear presentations preparing 1,578 students for natural disasters
- Presented to 42 community groups reaching 850 people
- Responded to 41 local emergencies helping 364 people

HABITAT FOR HUMANITY (Statewide)

 Involved 1,367 community volunteers in 18 Iowa Habitat affiliates in building more 0% interest homes for families in need and educating more people about the housing issues of our state and nation

EASTERN IOWA CONSERVATION ALLIANCE (11 Eastern Iowa Counties)

- Re-established and/or managed 1,032 acres of local habitat
- Restored 27 miles of recreational trails
- Educated 7,500 lowans about our natural resources and the importance of environmental stewardship

PROJECT UNITE (Storm Lake)

Tutored more than 100 ELL students: 80% of the students increased their reading and math scores Recruited 667 non-AmeriCorps volunteers who worked at 50 sites for a total of 5,117 hours

YOUTH CONNECTIONS (lowa City)

- Provided 30 hours of mentoring to 49 youth served by Neighborhood Centers of Johnson County, including many lower income youth
- Assisted the Institute for Social and Economic Development with a job readiness/placement program for teens

UNITED NEIGHBORS AMERICORPS (Davenport)

- · Assisted with six after-school and summer programs benefiting more than 250 youth
- Supported homeland security efforts with the Citizen Corps Council by creating 15 neighborhood safety patrol aroups
- Monitored 25-30 local parks to assist law enforcement, and enrolled groups to adopt the parks for maintenance.

UPPER EXPLORERLAND (Northeast Iowa)

- Trained community members to identify and better address environmental issues and to increase participation in environmental education
- Assessed and maintained trails for recreational use

REACH-Rural Education and Community Help (Statewide)

- Made over 8,000 domestic abuse victim contacts and offered them referral services, crisis intervention, legal advocacy, and education programs
- Trained 35 new volunteers in providing culturally sensitive services including ٠ obtaining advocacy certification

KEEPERS OF THE LAND (Statewide)

- Provided 448 environmental presentations educating 10,171 people
- Restored, improved, and maintained 74 miles of trail for recreational use in State ٠ Parks
- Recruited 115 community volunteers that provided 1,900 hours of service to clean-up lowa's rivers

GOVERNOR'S AMERICORPS AFTER-SCHOOL INITIATIVE (10 Sites Statewide)

- Tutored 445 students resulting in homework completion rates increasing by 28%
- Assisted 284 middle school students in participating in 5,174 hours of service
- Assisted 99 high school and adult mentors in providing 2,708 mentoring hours to 153 middle school youth

PARTNERS IN LEARNING (Dubuque)

- Tutored/mentored more than 4,200 students at 10 schools, two community centers, and two local parks resulting in 70% of students showing an increase in math and reading scores
- Supervised cultural/recreational activities resulting in 70% of students showing an increase in positive social behavior

AMERICORPS SERVICE PROJECT (Des Moines)

- Organized summer camp program for 185 youth providing enrichment, recreation, and literacy activities through the Des Moines Parks and Recreation Department
- Created 60 community gardens ٠
- Recruited more than 1,000 community volunteers to assist with summer camp ٠ programs and provide educational presentations for the Partners in the Parks program



Iowa AmeriCorps

- Over the past five years, 1,200 AmeriCorps members have served 805,552 hours, valued at \$10.8 million (Source: Independent Sector – Dollar Value of Volunteer Time)
- Since 1999, AmeriCorps members have engaged an additional 58,313 community volunteers in providing 282,146 hours of service
- Every state dollar invested in AmeriCorps programs leverages more than \$22.70 in federal funds ٠
- More than 400 AmeriCorps members are expected to serve in Iowa this year

2004 Accomplishments

Education

- 5.431 K-12 students were tutored or mentored
- 2,068 participated in after-school and summer activities
- 70% of participating students' grades improved
- 75% of mentored students reported increased self-esteem
- 60% reported improved performance and attitudes about school

Public Safety & Homeland Security

- 590 students received training in disaster response and preparedness (Masters of Disaster & Facing Fear)
- 6,177 people received anti-victimization and violence prevention training and counseling services
- 3,000 elderly individuals received donated cell phones
- Responded to 20 local emergencies, benefiting 208 people

Environment

- 44,241 citizens trained in environmental awareness & protection
- 7,513 students received environmental enrichment programming
- Planted 25.5 acres of native trees in public parks
- 140 miles of trails maintained and restored
- 93 acres of public land conserved or restored


Other Human Needs
