During the 11 days of the Iowa State Fair, count on the Iowa DNR to have a fun-filled, family-friendly, educational and entertaining packed daily schedule for all fairgoers to enjoy.

Inside the DNR building, DNR experts will be on hand daily to answer any questions you may have related to lowa's natural resources. Take time to browse around the many exhibits within the DNR, including the Hike, Bike and Paddle zone, Watch and Learn zone, Stay and Play zone, In Your Home zone and meet many DNR staff and experts. Take a peek at the live fish, ducks and turtles and get an up-close look at the mounted wildlife that are native to lowa.

DES MOINES – DNR staff work with individuals, businesses and communities to help them protect our natural resources by complying with state and federal laws. This approach is very effective. In the few cases where compliance cannot be achieved, the DNR issues enforcement actions. The following list summarizes recent enforcement actions. Consent Orders

A consent order is issued as an alternative to issuing an administrative order. A consent order indicates that the DNR has voluntarily entered into a legally enforceable agreement with the other party.

Johnson County

Central States Coatings, Inc.

Cease unauthorized discharges of pollutants to municipal storm sewers or waters of the state and pay \$7,500 penalty. Rescinds Order No. 18-WW-05.

Administrative Orders

Responsible parties have 30 days to appeal the order or 60 days to pay the penalty.

Dubuque County

Troy Budde

Complete annual site monitoring and submit report to DNR and pay \$7,000 penalty for violations of the state's underground storage tank requirements.

Air quality permits under review

DES MOINES – The DNR Air Quality Bureau has the following draft permits up for review. The permits help protect Iowans' health and the air where we live. DNR's permitting staff review the applications to ensure facilities comply with state and federal air quality standards. The public has the right and is encouraged to comment on draft permits. DNR considers <u>public comments</u> before finalizing the permits. Submit comments in writing to the assigned permit writer before 4:30 p.m. on the last day of the public comment period.

Title V Operating Permits

Title V Operating permits are reviewed and re-issued every five years. Facilities with a Title V permit have the potential to emit large amounts of air pollutants compared to

other facilities. The five-year reviews are a federal requirement and ensure adequate monitoring is included in the permit. The DNR plans to issue Title V Operating Permits for the following facilities. Find permit details at www.iowadnr.gov/titlev-draft.

Howard County

Industrial Energy Applications, Inc. located at 111 Donaldson Ct., Cresco The application was submitted to operate their existing Electric Services facility. The public comment period ends Sept. 1.

Dickinson County

Green Plains Superior LLC located at 1495 320th Avenue, Superior The application was submitted to operate their existing Industrial Organic Chemicals/Ethanol Production facility. The public comment period ends Sept. 1.

Construction Permits

DNR engineers review and issue construction permits to facilities before they build new or modified sources of air pollution. The public may review the following air quality construction permits available online at www.iowadnr.gov/airpermitsearch.

Linwood Mining & Minerals Corporation, located at 401 East Front Street, Davenport

Project 18-017, Modification of existing air construction permits for East Barge Loadout (EP BL01), West Barge Loadout (EP BL02), Quarry 3P equipment and Pile 9 (EP Q-3P), Quarry 1 equipment and Pile 6 (EP Q-1), and issue new permits for Paved Haul Roads (EP HR-P), Unpaved Haul Roads (EP HR-U), Material Storage Piles (Pile 2, Pile 3, Pile 5, Pile 10, Pile 12, Pile 13, Pile 15, Pile 16, Pile 17, Pile 18) (EP Piles), Q11C Equipment & Pile 1 (EP Q11C), Quarry 2 Lower Plant Equipment and Pile 7 (EP Q-2LP), Quarry 2 Top Plant Equipment and Pile 4 (EP Q-2TP), Material Storage Piles 1 and 11 (EP Pile 1, 11), Material Storage Pile 8 (EP Pile 8), Material Storage Pile 14 (EP Pile 14), Material Storage Pile A (EP Pile A) to establish potential PM10 fugitive emission reductions by utilizing control measures and enforceable permit limits.
