Libraries & Voter Registration Day



September 25th

Public libraries are information portals and recognized as partners in building digital, financial, and consumer literacy throughout their communities. Public libraries can also be partners in strengthening voter literacy and there's no better time to demonstrate that than **National Voter Registration Day** on **September 25**.

First observed in 2012, **National Voter Registration Day** is endorsed by the National Associations of Secretaries of State (NASS) the National Association of State Election Directors (NASED) and the American Library Association. ALA believes that public libraries are an important community location for voters to access needed information ahead of the vote. From **American Libraries Magazine** "... whether your library has a longstanding voter engagement effort underway or you're just getting started, here are some tips for getting the most out of your voter outreach campaign this year..."

- Inform people who have recently moved: Many people don't realize they need
 to update their voter registration if they move to a new state, a new city, or
 even an address in the same city. Post signs pointing people who have
 recently moved to your voter registration information resources.
- Cover the basics: Voters, especially newly registered ones, need basic
 information in order to successfully cast a vote. Provide succinct details at
 your library specifying when Election Day will take place, how to locate polling
 places, who will be on the ballot, and any other details (such as an
 identification requirement to vote or whether early voting is an option in your
 state). Again, election officials or local League of Women Voters can be an
 excellent source of information. Check out the league's
 site www.VOTE411.org, for easy-to-find information about voting in all 50
 states.
