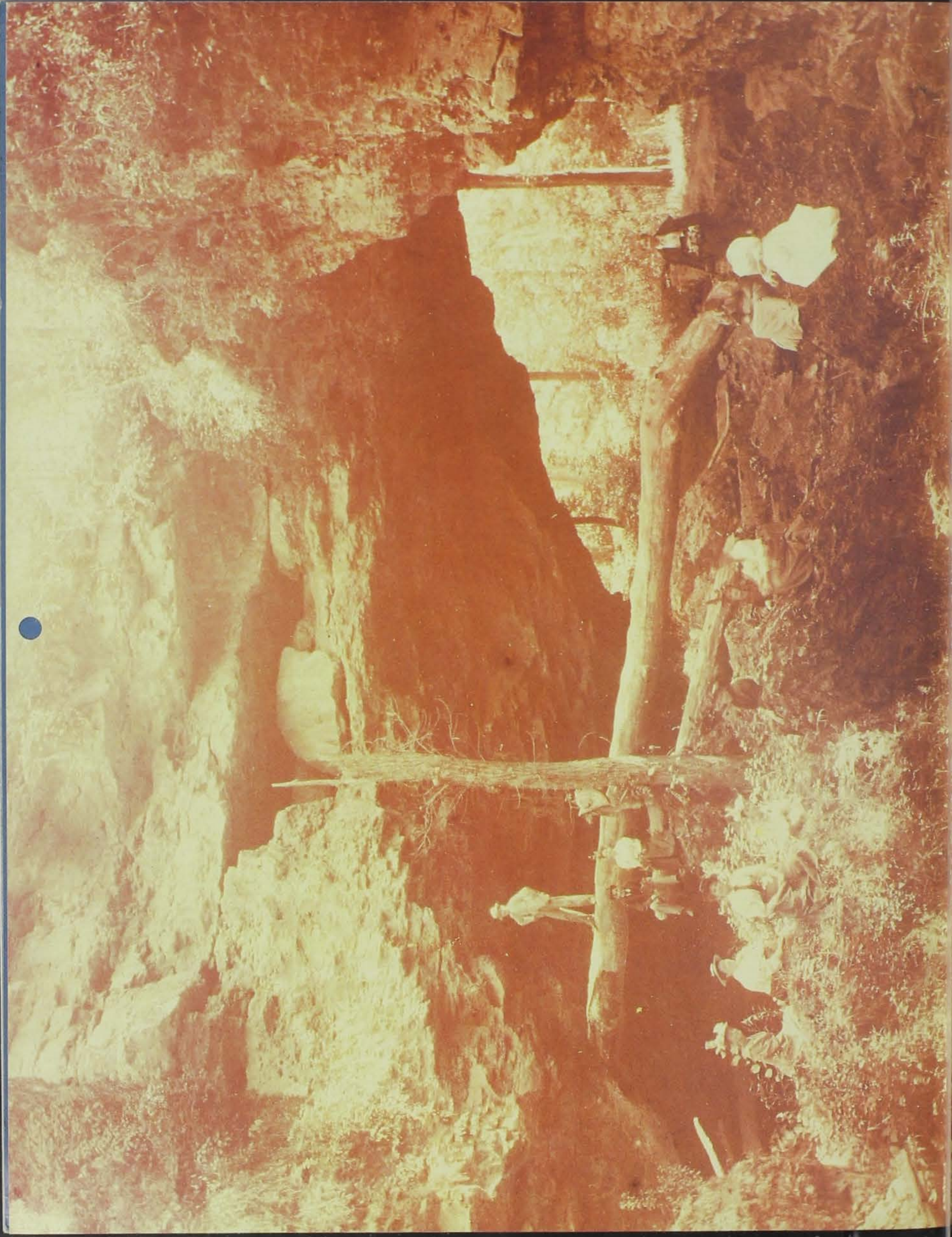

Available beginning January 3, 1995, Iowa's *newest* license plates will not only dress-up your vehicle with our state bird and flower (American goldfinch and wild rose), it will also improve a vast array of our most precious natural resources, many very close to your home.

The money raised from the natural resources plates will go to the Resource Enhancement And Protection Fund, better known as REAP – Iowa's nationally acclaimed program for improving city, county and state parks, fish and wildlife, soil and water conservation, historic resources, roadside vegetation management, and environmental education.

To buy a set of the standard, sequentially numbered natural resource plates, take your current plates and registration to your county treasurer and request the natural resource plates. These plates display two letters followed by three numbers. The initial cost of the plate is \$35 in addition to your regular registration fee; and in following years there is a \$10 annual renewal cost in addition to the regular fee.

Gift certificates for sequentially numbered natural resources plates will be available after December 1, 1994 and may be purchased from your county treasurer for \$35. Recipients of the gift certificates may exchange their regular plates and registration for the natural resources plates, after January 3.

You can also buy *personalized natural resource plates or gift certificates* for an initial fee of \$80 in addition to the regular registration fee. The annual renewal is \$15 in addition to the regular fee. All of the cost of the sequentially numbered natural resources plates, and \$35 of the

cost of personalized plates, and the \$10 annual plate renewal fee go into the REAP fund for improved natural resources for all Iowans.

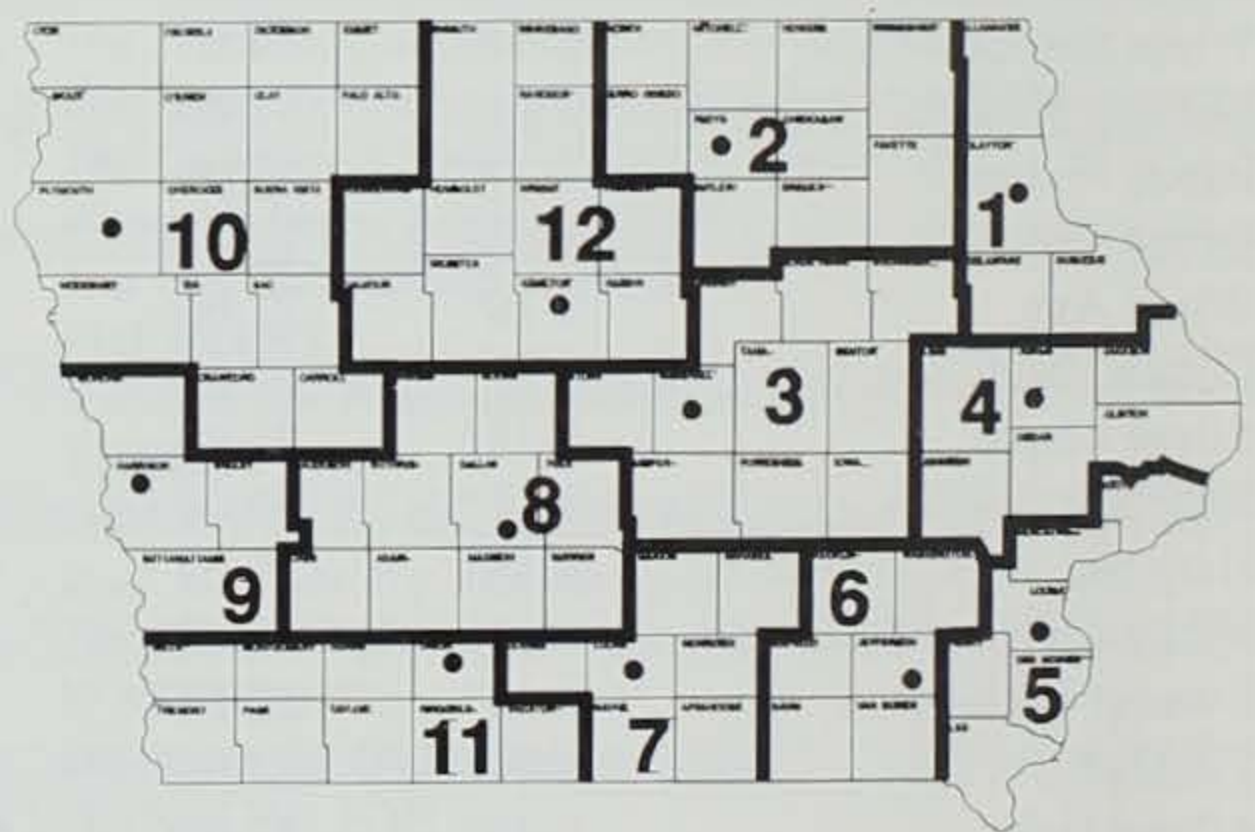

- Mail Orders** To mail, send your order to State Forest Nursery, 2404 S. Duff, Ames, IA 50010.
- Payment** For orders more than \$500, the nursery will bill you for 20 percent of the cost with the remainder to be paid by March 1. **DO NOT** send money with your order.
- Spring Delivery** Orders are shipped via a state refrigerated truck to a drop-off point in each county in April.
- Claims** Claims for any cause must be made within 10 days after receipt of plants. We give no warranty, expressed or implied, as to the productiveness or life of the material, and we will not be in any way responsible for results or economic losses incurred or claimed by the customer.
- Restrictions** The nursery stock must be planted and used for establishing or improving existing forest, erosion control, game or water conservation. These restrictions apply: Nursery stock cannot be resold or given away with roots attached, to any person, firm, corporation or agency or planted for new windbreak, shade or ornamental purposes. All plantings must be protected from fire and domestic livestock grazing. All trees planted or used in violation of the above restrictions are subject to forfeit for destruction.
- Refunds** No refunds after March 1.
- Suggested Spacing** Conifers -- rows 8 feet apart; plants within rows 6 feet apart = 908 plants per acre
Walnuts and other hardwoods -- rows 8 feet apart; plants within rows 8 feet apart = 681 plants per acre
Shrubs -- rows 8 feet apart; plants within rows 3-5 feet apart

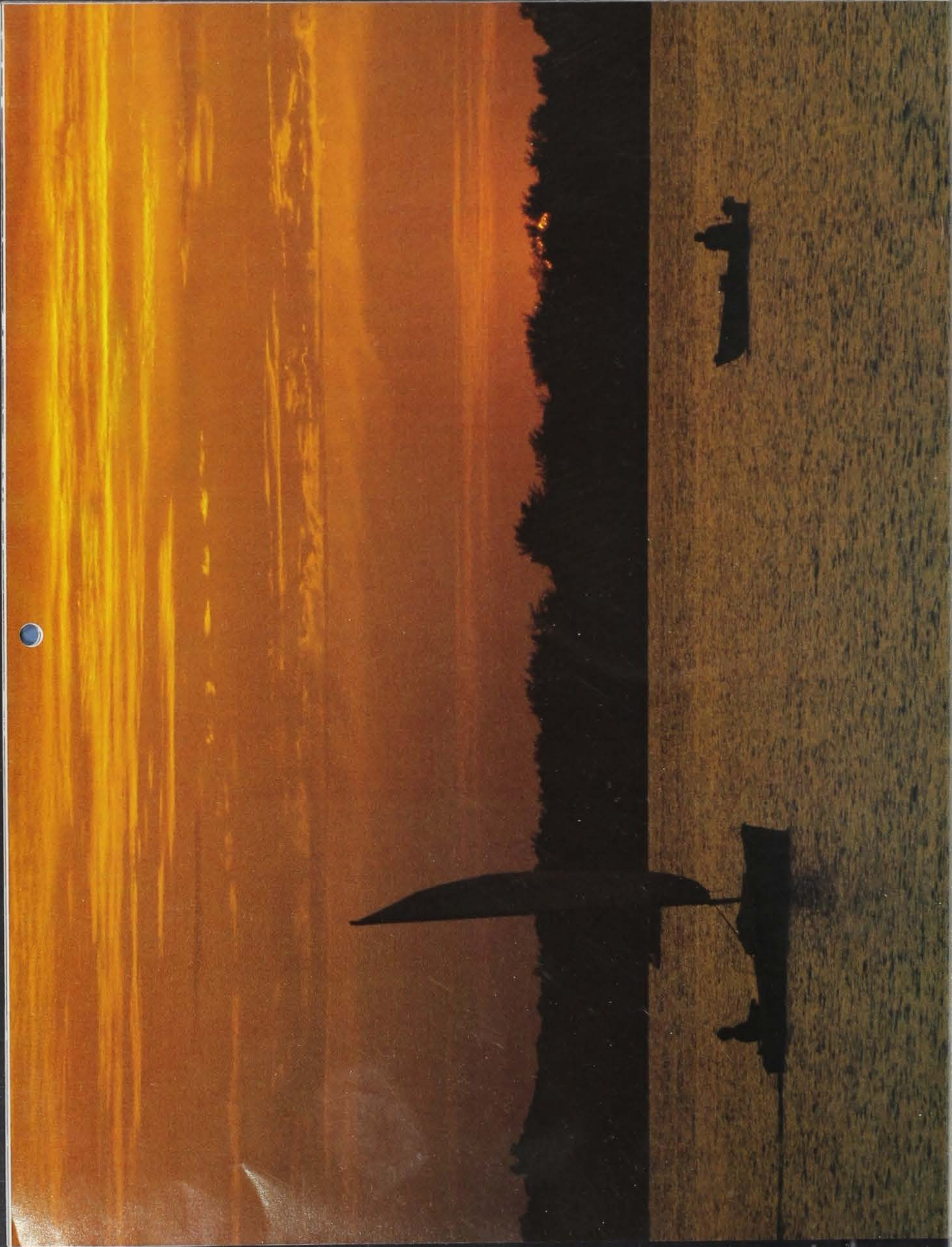

Hunters Against Hunger

The following Iowa meat processors (lockers) are participating in the Hunters Against Hunger program for the 1994-95 season. The program enables deer hunters, with the help of commercial meat processors, to donate venison to the needy. Only 100 percent pure deer meat and tallow, commercially prepared by a certified food processor, can be used. Food pantries, soup kitchens and missions using the meat prefer it ground, frozen and in one- to two-pound packages. Donated meat will be transported to local needy by Pheasants Forever, Ducks Unlimited and Wild Turkey Federation volunteers. Deer hunters can donate meat to the program through one of the following meat processors.
