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

<u>Community</u> (2nd edition 2016) by Doug Griffiths. Canadian author Griffiths has been a teacher, a rancher, and a politician, having served in the Canadian legislature for 13 years. He now works as a "community therapist" with local governments looking to lead communities to success and prosperity. **This**

Griffiths writes with wry humor, but still makes serious points about key factors that lead to a community's success or failure. He writes *"the town that appears in this book is called Omegatown. It's not a real place, but a compilation of numerous towns big and small that really do exist and that have helped inspire <u>13 Ways</u>...they all have their own strengths and weaknesses, but all were unintentionally killing themselves in one way or another..."*

Wilson Core Collections

Now Available to Iowa's Public Libraries

Emily Bainter shared this news earlier this month, but it bears repeating. The State Library has purchased one year of access to **H.W. Wilson Core Collections Online** for Iowa public libraries. The Wilson Core Collections are authoritative, trusted guides to building and maintaining a well-rounded collection of the most highly recommended books in adult fiction, nonfiction, and children's literature.



About the Wilson Core Collections

These resources recommend the 'best of the best" in adult and children's literature, assisting with collection development and with making decisions weeding decisions. Entries provide complete bibliographic data including price, subject headings, a descriptive annotation, and evaluative quotations from a review. Book reviews, indicators for starred reviews, awards, and "Best Lists" are also included when available.

Included in the State Library's Subscription

- **Children's Core Collection** is ideal readers' advisory, curriculum support, and collection building resource for elementary age collections. It covers more than 50,000 fiction and nonfiction works recommended for readers PreK through fifth grade.
- Fiction Core Collection includes more than 20,000 librarianrecommended titles for a general adult audience. Highlighting the most popular and widely-read classic and contemporary works of fiction, Fiction Core Collection covers many genres including mystery, science fiction, fantasy, western, and romance.

How to Authenticate

The Wilson Core Collections is an EBSCO product. Earlier this month, EBSCO reps sent a direct URL to all Iowa public libraries. The email message included a unique user ID and password for access. EBSCO encourages libraries to set up IP authentication for use within the library; please note the URL provided by EBSCO will continue to work once IP authentication is set up.

EBSCO may already have your library's information for this authentication set up in their system, but if they don't and you are seeing a prompt for a login when you click on your URL, please contact <u>EBSCO Support Team</u> or call 1-800-758-5995.

In summer's heat and busyness, it's easy to set aside other library management tasks. So from the *"Gentle Reminder Department"* comes this encouragement to take note of program deadlines and needed website updates:

Enrich Iowa Program == Your library's <u>Enrich Iowa</u> reports indicating your library's Open Access and ILL

transactions and is due on July 31.

GALE Resources Invoice == Be on the lookout for a GALE invoice coming soon. This bills your library for its annual subscription to the GALE Resources for fiscal year 2020; prompt payment will be appreciated.

Speaking of GALE Resources == Review your own website to be sure that you've added buttons / logos for the GALE suite of products, including Credo Reference and Transparent Languages so that your patrons have ready access.

And These Things New On-The-Scene == Review your library's progress on making these new digital resources readily accessible on your website: Brainfuse, Opposing Viewpoints, Foundation Directory, and Wilson Core Collections. All of these need to be prominently displayed on your website so that your patrons can take full advantage. SLP Artwork == Scan your website for any Summer Library Program artwork from previous summers; keeping these images on your website past March 31 of the following year is a violation of the terms of use.
