Earth Day 2020

April 22 marks the 50th anniversary of **Earth Day** and there are plenty of programming ideas for libraries to lean into. The theme for **Earth Day 2020** is "Climate Action." Earth Day partners have chosen this theme, with its challenges and opportunities, as the most pressing topic for the 50th anniversary.

Through an **Our Planet Earth** initiative via **Star Net.Org**, free resources are available to libraries to help communities learn about our changing planet. These resources include posters, STEM activities, and a video library. For instance, at the **Star Net** site you'll find links to the NASA Speakers Bureau, citizens science projects, social media graphics, and a downloadable publication titled <u>The Librarian's Guide to Citizen Science</u>.

The **Star Net** site has a collection of environmental impact videos, which can be used by libraries in programming, on social media, and to inspire learners of all ages. "This year, the **Star Net** team is focusing on citizen science and Earth science opportunities during the month of April. A video library and upcoming webinars discuss how to harness the power of teens in environmental advocacy, plus ways your library can be part of community conversations and take action for a sustainable world..."

Since 1970, **Earth Day** has always been celebrated on April 22nd. The first national event 50 years ago originated as a unified response to an environment in crisis — oil spills, smog, polluted rivers and waterways. From the **Earth Day** website "...On April 22, 1970, 20 million Americans took to the streets and college campuses in hundreds of U.S. cities to protest environmental ignorance and to demand a new way forward for our planet. The first **Earth Day** is credited with launching the modern environmental movement and is now recognized as the planet's largest civic event..."


ILA Legislative Day Tuesday March 10th

Tomorrow is **ILA Legislative Day** in **Des Moines**. The event begins with a legislative briefing delivered by members of ILA Governmental Affairs Committee, along with the ILA lobbyists. The briefing begins at 3:00PM at the State Library building (1112 East Grand Ave, across the street from the State Capitol)

Following the briefing comes a legislative reception from 4:00-6:00PM at the State Law Library inside the Capitol. This reception is an opportunity to meet in person with lowa lawmakers, a great time to thank them for their support and to explain funding issues affecting libraries, as well as other concerns.

ILA Legislative Day is an important advocacy event, open to library trustees, directors, staff, and Friends Groups from across the state. To assist with conversations, ILA Governmental Affairs Committee has developed a list of talking points on the ILA website. A few are reprinted below, click here to read the full 2020 Legislative Agenda

- Increased Funding for Enrich lowa: This statewide program helps public libraries modernize infrastructure, update technology, and provide innovative services. This is state money that flows directly to public libraries. Read the FY18 Enrich lowa Report for details
- Full Funding for the State Library of lowa: Every dollar invested in the State Library helps fulfill the Library's mission to partner with public libraries to improve service for all.
- Recognition of Teacher Librarians as School Instructional Staff: Direct the Department of Education to designate teacher librarians as instructional staff who provide student learning in school libraries, classrooms, learning commons, makerspaces, labs, and virtual learning spaces. Teacher librarians play a critical role within the educational team in each lowa school district to provide lifelong skills to help student navigate, use, and evaluate information across many platforms.
