Come on in: The State Historical Museum of Iowa is open!

We're delighted to announce that the State Historical Museum of Iowa reopened this morning, three months after closing amid the coronavirus outbreak. During this first phase of reopening, the museum's new visiting hours are **9 a.m. - 4:30 p.m. Tuesday through Friday.** (The State Historical Society's Research Centers in Des Moines and Iowa City and the State Historic Sites remain closed to the public.)

The health and safety of visitors, volunteers and staff top our list of priorities, and we've developed a plan to minimize risk. Visitors are encouraged to wear masks and to follow the health and safety instructions posted throughout the building. Staff are following the latest protocols from the Iowa Department of Public Health and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

Today is a turning point for the museum, just as this year is a turning point for Iowa. Working for Racial Justice

As America's march toward racial justice gathers momentum, especially in these last few weeks since the death of George Floyd in Minneapolis, the State Historical Society of Iowa continues to support equity, diversity and inclusion in communities across the state.


There are lots of ways to learn more, including an online guide to “[Talking About Race](#)” that the Smithsonian’s National Museum of African American History and Culture designed specifically for parents and teachers. The State Historical Society of Iowa’s social media accounts often feature Iowans of color, including this video about [the pioneering filmmaker Oscar Micheaux](#), who lived in Sioux City.

Along those lines, the State Historic Preservation Office continues its federally funded efforts to document Iowa’s struggle for [African American Civil Rights during the 20th Century](#). This past weekend, we teamed up with the Iowa Architectural Foundation and Pyramid Theatre to virtually celebrate [the grand reopening of the Edna Griffin Building](#), the site of a successful integration protest in 1948 in downtown Des Moines. Emergency Grants Top \$1 Million

Earlier this month, the Iowa Department of Cultural Affairs awarded [\\$1.1 million in CARES Act grants](#) to help [173 of Iowa's arts, history and culture nonprofits in 51 counties](#) rebound from the coronavirus pandemic. These grants, added to an earlier round in April, brings the department’s sum of emergency relief to more than \$1.3 million, thanks to funding from the Iowa Legislature, National Endowment for the Arts, National Endowment for the Humanities – and *unanimous* support from Iowa’s congressional delegation.



Women's Suffrage, for ALL Women

A traveling exhibit called “[Toward a Universal Suffrage: African-American Women in Iowa and the Vote for All](#)” opens June 30 and remains through July 31 at the State Historical Museum of Iowa. Both the exhibit and a [related webinar](#) at noon July 7 examine the particular struggles and victories of non-white women in the broader march toward full suffrage. These programs are part of our ongoing celebration of the [19th Amendment Centennial](#).

Preserve Iowa Summit

The first-ever virtual [Preserve Iowa Summit](#) earlier this month was a resounding success. In all, nearly 500 people tuned in from 15 states to hear 66 presenters share their expertise during 32 sessions. All for one important cause: to preserve and share history.

The State Historic Preservation Office extends its gratitude to this year’s co-hosts with the city of Dubuque and looks forward to next year’s summit, June 3-5, 2021, in Council Bluffs.
