All Iowa Reads Titles For 2021 Revealed



The **2021 All Iowa Reads** (AIR) titles were announced last week. And for the second year, the selections were announced on Iowa Public Radio's *Talk of Iowa*. IPR host Charity Nebbe was joined by State Library staff Angie Manfredi and Jillian Rutledge with Waterloo Public Library who introduced each of the three choices:

<u>Little Faith</u> by Nickolas Butler is the 2021 adult title. From Good Reads "In this moving new novel from celebrated author Nickolas Butler, a Wisconsin family grapples with the power and limitations of faith when one of their own falls under the influence of a radical church...Set over the course of one year and beautifully evoking the change of seasons, <u>Little Faith</u> is a powerful and deeply affecting intergenerational novel about family and community, the ways in which belief is both formed and shaken, and the lengths we go to protect our own."

Patron Saints of Nothing by Randy Ribay is the teen title. From Amazon: "a powerful coming-of-age story about grief, guilt, and the risks a Filipino-American teenager takes to uncover the truth about his cousin's murder. [when Jay Requero] discovers that his Filipino cousin Jun was murdered as part of President Duterte's war on drugs, and no one in the family wants to talk about what happened, Jay travels to the



Philippines to find out the real story. As gripping as it is lyrical, <u>Patron Saints of Nothing</u> is a page-turning portrayal of the struggle to reconcile faith, family, and immigrant identity..."

And Pie in the Sky by Remy Lai is the book for kids, suggested ages 8-12. Chosen



by Parents Magazine and NPR as the Best Kids Book of the Year in 2019, here's more from Amazon "...In her hilarious, moving middle-grade debut, Remy Lai delivers a scrumptious combination of vibrant graphic art and pitch-perfect writing. When Jingwen moves to a new country, he feels like he's landed on Mars. School is torture, making friends is impossible since he doesn't speak English, and he's often stuck looking

after his (extremely irritating) little brother Yanghao.

To distract himself from the loneliness, Jingwen daydreams about making all the cakes on the menu of Pie in the Sky, the bakery his father had planned to open before he unexpectedly passed away. The only problem is his mother has laid down one major rule: the brothers are not to use the oven while she's at work. As Jingwen and Yanghao bake elaborate cakes, they'll have to cook up elaborate excuses to keep the cake making a secret from Mama..."

Resource Guide Available To Download

But this is timely news: for the **2021 Summer Library Program**, every lowa public library will be given access to download the **iREAD** resource guide from the **iREAD** website. As you know, **iREAD** is the new vendor

behind the State Library's support of summer programming, beginning next year when the theme will be "Reading Colors Your World."

Please Note: access instructions for the resource guide are expected to be emailed to **library directors today--November 16.** Each library may redeem their code ONE TIME to download the resource guide.

Youth Services Consultant Angie Manfredi explains: "Once your library has your code, you can redeem it at any time and will then have immediate access to the 2021 resource guide. From there, you and your library can do whatever best suits your needs—save it to a thumb drive, store it on a shared drive for multiple staff to access, print it if you like (but it is lengthy)

Youth librarians, please consult with your director today about who will be responsible for the single download for your library. Please let your directors know to keep an eye on their email today for detailed instructions. By this time next year, everyone will be saying 'I can't believe we EVER got the manuals mailed to us in 3-ring binders or on USB drives, downloading is the only way to go!' Stay tuned for more training opportunities, including webinars and online hangouts where we will explore the resource guide and start brainstorming together! "

From building balanced collections on opposing viewpoints to planning more diverse programming, we're looking for sessions that will speak to a theme of equity and inclusion.

A "Call for Presenters" form is ready and accessible at the button below. Interested speakers must submit their proposal by **November 30**; selected speakers will be notified by **December 7**.

Additional Information

- Presentations need to be **45 minutes in length, which** allows time for introductions and Q&A during the session. Presentations may be done solo or as a panel; however we recommend that no more than three people participate in any one panel.
- Presentations should be adaptable for use in libraries of all sizes
- If accepted, proposals will need to be presented online in a ZOOM Room; using PowerPoint, Prezi, or similar presentation software is required.

 Presenters have access to ZOOM's "Share My Desktop" feature which enables sharing a website or Word document in addition to their slides.
- An online dress rehearsal will be required of everyone selected as presenters. Dress rehearsals will be arranged by the ILOC Team member assigned to you.
- Presenters must agree to be available the entire day of January 21, 2021, have good Internet and computer connectivity, have a headset with microphone, and ideally have access to quiet space within an office or study room.
- Presenters receive no compensation for speaking, but they will receive 2 CE credits for each presentation given.

A PLA Survey

This message is from our partners at the Public Library Association. If your library received an email from PLA recently regarding the 2020 Public Library Technology Survey, we urge you to complete that survey. Selected libraries that have been invited to participate should have already received two letters and several emails, along with a direct link to access the survey.



Here's the back story: the most recent national data available regarding public libraries' technology infrastructure dates back to the Digital Inclusion Survey from 2014. For a look at where public libraries stand today, PLA is collaborating with the American Institute for Research to conduct the 2020 Public Library Technology Survey. This survey gathers information about the public access technology infrastructure, technology-related programming, and technology-

related funding streams—including E-rate. PLA hopes to get representative data on hotspot lending, recent technology upgrades, emerging technology, and how libraries prioritize network security.

PLA will share the results widely and participating libraries will receive a personalized report. So if your library was among the invited the State Library urges you to take some time to complete that survey as PLA is looking at a November 20th deadline and they are lagging behind in responses. Every completion will be much appreciated. We can't send the survey link, but we can send our thanks!
