
voting process included over 3,000 kindergarten, preschool, and daycare children who voted for their favorite picture book; voting took place February 1--April 30.

Here's a sneak peak at the book in this review from Amazon: "Kids will be giggling through their own yawns as they enjoy this contagiously adorable bedtime story. Two best friends have big plans for their sleepover. They aren't going to go to bed at all--they'll stay up playing all night long. But then it happens: the YAWNS show up! And as much as they try to outrun and hide from them, it's no use, the YAWNS catch them. Maybe they could keep going anyway, but then a DOZE arrives, followed by the dreaded SNORES. Will our heroes escape the SLEEPIES?"

The purpose of the **Bridge to Reading Picture Book Award** is to promote early literacy and reading to children through the introduction of quality picture books nominated by a committee of librarians, teachers, preschool, and early literacy leaders. The award book is based on characteristics of a good "read aloud." This program engages children in developing a lifelong love of books and reading.

Adult Programming Opportunity

ARPA Grant Update



State Library staff are happy to report that last week ended with 100 public libraries across the state having submitted an ARPA Grant. As noted in previous issues of the *Eye-Opener*, public libraries meeting standards at Tier levels 1,2, or 3 are encouraged to apply for an ARPA grant in an amount up to \$5,000.00. Applications are due by July 2

This funding is provided to the State Library through the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) administered by the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS) These

are non-competitive grants and will be handled as a reimbursement; meaning that librarycity budgets will need to pay for any of the allowable purchases and the ARPA grant funding will then provide reimbursement.

Allowable Purchases

The State Library has prepared a list of allowable purchases, following national priorities set by IMLS. Priorities include materials or technology to support (a) digital inclusion efforts (b) education, community health and wellness projects or (c) workforce development needs. Grants can also be used as a continued response to the pandemic and to implement public health protocols.

Requests Coming In

Among allowable purchases: laptops, tablets, hotspots, routers, meeting room equipment such as PA systems, digital TVs, projectors, and much more. Among the 100 applications received so far, updating meeting room equipment and designing outdoor spaces are the trending projects! Here's a brief list of other things that lowa libraries are planning to purchase:

- Storywalk materials & equipment
- Wireless printers and scanners
- Color copiers
- New laptops / Chromebooks / iPads
- Security cameras
- Titles for OverDrive Advantage collections
- Self check-out stations
- · Permanent plexiglass screens for public service desks
- Air purifiers
