LETTER OF TRANSMITTAL.

OFFICE OF THE COMMISSIONER OF LABOR STATISTICS, }
DES MOINES, IOWA, August 7, 1895. }

INTRODUCTORY.

Your Commissioner in taking charge of the Bureau of Labor Statistics did so with many misgivings, realizing the responsibility resting upon him, and knowing full well that the department had been hampered from the beginning by a lack of support both in a financial way on the part of the state and in a moral way by the class for whose especial benefit it was established.

Section 5 of the law creating the Bureau of Labor Statistics defines the duties of the Commissioner as follows:

"The duties of said Commissioner shall be to collect, assort, systematize and present in biennial reports to the governor on or before the 15th day of August preceding each regular meeting of the general assembly, statistical details relating to all departments of labor in the state, especially in its relations to the commercial, social, educational and sanitary conditions of the laboring classes, and to the permanent prosperity of the mechanical, manufacturing and productive industries of the state, and shall as fully as practicable collect such information and reliable reports from each county in the state the amount and condition of the mechanical and manufacturing and coal productions of the state; also sites offering natural or acquired advantages for the profitable location and operation of different branches of industry; he shall by correspondence with interested parties in other parts of the United States impart to them such information as may tend to increase the productions, and consequent employment of producers; and in said biennial report he shall give a statement of the business of the Bureau since the last report, and shall compile and publish therein such information as may be considered of value to the industrial interests of the state, the number of laborers and mechanics employed, the number of apprentices in each trade, with the nativity of such laborers, mechanics' and apprentices' wages earned, the saving from the same, with age and sex of laborers employed, the number and character of accidents, the sanitary condition of institutions where labor is employed, the restrictions if any which are put upon apprentices when indentured, the proportion of married laborers and mechanics who live in rented houses, with the average annual rental and the value of property owned by laborers and mechanics; and he shall include in such report what progress has been made with

schools now in operation for the instruction of students in the mechanic arts and what systems have been found most practicable with details thereof."

To carry out the provisions of that section would require a large clerical force and an appropriation many times in excess of that now given this department, for the duties as there defined are, practically, to take a labor and manufacturing census of the state every two years. Yet, for all that work, up to the time when the present Commissioner took his office an annual appropriation of but \$500 with which to meet all the contingent expenses of the Bureau is all that the legislature has seen fit to grant. The twenty-fifth general assembly increased the appropriation so as to allow the Commissioner to employ a clerk; but with only one clerk, and an appropriation of only \$500 annually, to attempt to make investigations along all the different lines mentioned in the statute would be to make the entire work much the nature of a farce. Especially is this true when is taken into consideration the fact that the Commissioner has absolutely no power to collect statistics from persons who are not inclined to furnish them.

Realizing the impossibility of doing all that was required of them, the previous Commissioners each adopted special lines of work, and to the best of their ability with the very limited means at their disposal, conducted their investigations along those special lines.

In order to outline a work that could reasonably be expected to be satisfactory to the working classes of the state, a meeting of representatives from nearly every trade or occupation in the city of Des Moines was held in the office of the Bureau soon after your Commissioner took possession, and the matter was discussed from all points of view. It was the unanimous opinion of those present that the subject for investigation should be the actual condition of the laboring classes of the state, and that the best method of ascertaining that condition would be to secure individual statements from the working men and women throughout the state. In accordance with this decision the following "individual statement" blank was drawn up:

WAGE EARNERS OF IOWA—INDIVIDUAL STATEMENTS.

(The object of these individual statements is to ascertain as nearly as possible the actual condition of the laboring classes in this state. While the facts are to be made public, the names of persons filling out the blanks will not, under any circumstances, be disclosed without express permission.)

What is your name?

Postoffice address?

In what state or country were you born?

Age?

Male or female?

Married or single?

How many dependent upon you for support—Adults? Children? Total?

What occupation do you follow?

Where did you learn your trade?

How many hours per day do you work—Summer? Winter?

How many weeks have you worked during the full year ending April 1, 1894?

If you have not worked full time, why have you not done so?

What wages do you receive per day? Per week?

How often paid?

Are any wages held back?

If so, what reason is assigned?

Any increase during the past year? What per cent?

Any decrease during the past year? What per cent?

How much is earned by other members of your family?

How much have you saved from your earnings during the full year ending April 1, 1894?

How much have your yearly savings averaged heretofore?

Do you work by piece or on time?

If by piece, what constitutes a piece?

How much are you paid per piece?

Do you consider piece work preferable to time work, and why?

What per cent of the members of your trade or occupation is out of employment in your locality?

Why?

Have any members of your trade or occupation been thrown out of employment during the past year by the introduction of labor-saving machinery?

If so, is the machinery operated by hand or by steam power?

Are you a member of a labor organization?

Do you regard such organizations as beneficial to wage earners generally, and why?

Does foreign immigration have an injurious effect upon your trade or occupation?

Are apprentices employed in your trade in your locality?

How many journeymen to each apprentice?

Are apprentices under contract to finish learning trade?

Do you own the house you live in?

Is it all paid for?

If not, how much do you owe on it?

If you rent, what do you pay per month?
 How many rooms do you occupy?
 Are the sanitary conditions in your vicinity good or bad?
 What in your opinion will most benefit the wage earners of the country generally?

These blanks were sent by mail to or personally placed in the hands of some 19,500 working men and women in the state. But of this whole number, only some 6,000 in round numbers, were returned to your Commissioner, and of these many were so carelessly or negligently filled out as to be of no value whatever, and only 4,160 could be used.

During the first few months after beginning his work, your Commissioner attempted to gather the statistics for his report by correspondence. In order to obtain a list of names of wage earners in the state, letters were addressed to the editors of all the newspapers in the state, requesting that a list of twenty-five representative wage earners in their locality be sent to this office. About seventy-five per cent of the newspaper men addressed sent in lists, and in this way the names of between 4,000 and 5,000 wage earners were secured and blanks mailed them, but the returns were discouraging. Only about 800 replies were received from this source. Seeing that it would be an impossibility to obtain any creditable or trustworthy statement of the condition of the working classes of the state by correspondence, your Commissioner determined to go personally among the wage earners and get their statements direct from them. Owing to the limited appropriation, it was of course impossible for him to go into all parts of the state, and he confined his investigations to the larger cities.

Many have been the obstacles thrown in the way of your Commissioner, to obstruct or prevent the successful carrying out of his work; among which might be mentioned the refusal of the working people to answer the questions contained in the blanks, some claiming that it was simply a scheme of capitalists to secure a basis for further reduction of wages, others that it was an attempt to find out their business that they might be taxed more successfully, others that it was an attempt to ascertain their financial standing for the purpose of weakening their credit, others that it was a scheme of organized labor, etc., etc., etc.

The ignorance shown by hundreds of people in regard to the duties and requirements of the Commissioner and the usefulness

of labor statistics is due largely to the inability of former commissioners, through lack of financial aid, to educate the working people up to the point where they realize how good a thing it is to "know thyself."

In visiting the larger cities and trade centers of the state, your Commissioner was greatly surprised to find the number who had never heard of his office or his work, and who had never been asked to give any information such as was sought to be obtained in the blanks distributed.

Another source of trouble was, that just about the time the work was commenced occurred the great railroad strike, and this caused many who otherwise, doubtless, would have answered freely, to be very reticent about answering questions put to them by a stranger, for fear that their answers might involve them in trouble with their employers. Railroad men were especially hard to approach, but nearly all classes of laborers were more or less affected by the spirit of unrest and suspicion caused by the labor troubles.

But it was not from the wage earners that the most serious obstacles were placed in the way of your Commissioner. In several instances employers have flatly refused to permit your Commissioner to enter their workshops or factories, and have placed every possible obstruction in his way to prevent him from obtaining any information from their employees; and as the law gives the Commissioner no power to compel any different treatment, it has very seriously interfered with his work in several cities, notably in Dubuque and Muscatine. In this connection your Commissioner wishes to state that from all that he could gather from outside sources, in those establishments where admission was refused him the wages were the lowest and the shop rules so autocratic and obnoxious that he was not at all surprised that the proprietors did not want any light thrown upon their methods. Unless the present law can be so amended as to give to the Commissioner or to any one whom he may deputize the power to enter workshops and factories and compel the furnishing of the information required, the office had better be abolished. To require an official to obtain certain information, and then give him no authority or power to obtain it places such officer in a false light, and subjects him to much unnecessary abuse and unjust criticism.

KELLEY'S ARMY.

The first notable event in the labor world which took place in the state of Iowa after the present Commissioner was installed in office was the march through the state of the so-called "Industrial Army," under the leadership of one "General" C. T. Kelley, of Oakland, Cal. The army arrived in Council Bluffs about the last week of April, 1894, on a Union Pacific train which the officials of the road allege to have been stolen, but as no effort had been made to stop the train in its long trip across the country, and as, so it is claimed, some of the officials of the road actually accompanied the train part of the way, it is but fair to presume that the theft, if it can be so called, was not accomplished without the connivance of some one connected with the road.

When the train reached Omaha, Neb., the authorities of that place refused to allow any of the soldiers to alight, but surrounding the cars with a cordon of police to prevent desertions, sent it on across the river into Iowa, where it was turned loose and began its march across the state. Considerable alarm was felt as to the possible results of this "invasion," and Governor Jackson sent several companies of militia to Council Bluffs to preserve order. For this the Governor was severely criticised at that time by political opponents and by a certain element in his own party, but it is pretty generally conceded now that his action had a good and salutary effect.

In order to prevent the march of from 1,000 to 1,500 penniless men across the state, Governor Jackson attempted to get transportation for the army into Illinois, but the railways would make no rates, and refused to transport the men for less than full fare, single trip rates, which would have entailed an expense to the state of something over \$15,000, which the Governor did not think advisable to incur. He then entered into negotiations with a boat line to get transportation for the army to St. Joseph, Mo., by boat, but "General" Kelley refused to go that way, and did not even submit the proposition to his men.

In view of the conflicting statements published in the newspapers and the general misapprehension existing in the public mind regarding the men and the movement, your Commissioner determined, by personal acquaintance with the men, to form his own opinion of the "invasion" and the invaders. Accompanied by his clerk, in the guise of tramp printers, they joined

Kelley's army at Adair, enlisting in Company E, Sacramento division. The army was some 1,200 strong, the men composing it being for the most part from the Pacific coast, and claimed to be going to Washington to present to congress a memorial and petition setting forth their grievances and demands. As regards many of the men, this claim should be well salted before eating; but there is no doubt in the mind of your Commissioner that a large percentage really started with the intention of going to Washington, and believed that good would result from the movement.

As a result of his investigations, your Commissioner is satisfied that a majority—say 60 per cent—of the men would work if they could get permanent situations at fairly remunerative wages. The men could not properly be classed as tramps and vagrants as those terms are generally understood, although they had no means of support, either visible or prospective, and subsisted on public charity, and their banding together made their long continued presence in any community both a burden and a menace. However, the army stopped nowhere long enough to make the possible danger of their presence even a reasonable probability, and the men while in this state were law-abiding, conducting themselves, both individually and collectively, in such a manner as to allay all apprehension and gain much sympathy and assistance. Especially was this true in the country and small villages through which they passed and among the laboring element in the larger cities. The opposition came principally from the capitalistic and corporate interests, which everywhere displayed not only a lack of sympathy for the men, but the most unrelenting and active hostility toward them.

But while your Commissioner is satisfied that the majority of the men comprising the army were honest, but unfortunate and deluded, he is just as well satisfied that "General" Kelley himself is neither. Kelley is a shrewd, insinuating sort of an individual, of rather pleasing address, having considerable personal magnetism and no little skill as a leader. He possesses just the right mental and moral contrasts to enable him to be all things to all men, always to his own advantage. The desperate straits the unemployed on the Pacific coast were in during the winter of 1893-94 enabled him to organize his industrial army, which he led on a wild goose chase to Washington, succeeding by the exercise of his varied talents in working

upon the credulity or sympathy of the public along the route sufficiently to support his men and gain considerable notoriety and cash for himself.

Additional evidence of the mountebank proclivities of "General" Kelley is offered at the present writing (July 1, 1895) by the press dispatches, which state that he is at this time seeking to turn his notoriety into cash by returning, accompanied by his wife, in a wagon over the same route as that taken by his army, and lecturing in the different towns along the way.

FREE EMPLOYMENT BUREAU.

In the Fifth Biennial Report of this Bureau the Commissioner of Labor very earnestly recommended the establishment of a free public employment office in connection with this Bureau; and in the Twenty-fifth General Assembly Senator Cheshire in the senate and Representative Dowell in the house introduced the following bill, having that object in view:

A BILL

FOR AN ACT TO PROVIDE FREE PUBLIC EMPLOYMENT OFFICES.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Iowa:

SECTION 1. That the Commissioner of Labor Statistics, and the county auditors of the several counties of the state, shall, within sixty days after the passage of this act, establish in connection with their offices a free public employment office.

SEC. 2. It shall be the duty of each county auditor to receive all applications for labor and those desiring employment and record their names in a book kept for that purpose and designate, beside the name of each applicant the character of employment or labor desired, the address of such applicant, and the names and address of any person or persons whom the applicant may give as reference.

SEC. 3. No compensation or fee shall, directly or indirectly, be charged or received from any person or persons seeking employment or any person or persons desiring to employ labor through any of said offices.

SEC. 4. It shall be the duty of the county auditors to make a weekly report on Thursday of each week to the Commissioner of Labor, of all persons desiring to employ labor and the class thereof, and all persons applying for labor through their respective offices and the character of employment desired by each applicant, and the names and address of persons given as references, and also of all persons securing employment through their respective office, and character thereof.

SEC. 5. The county auditors shall post a copy of said report on a bulletin board in a conspicuous place in the court house, and also send a copy of their weekly report to the clerk of all cities and to the recorder of all

incorporated towns, within the boundaries of their county having a population of five hundred (500) or more, according to the last state or national census, which report when received by the clerks of said cities and recorders of incorporated towns, shall be posted in the offices of such clerks and recorders, or in some other conspicuous place within the limits of said cities or incorporated towns. Each of said reports so posted, shall on the first page or sheet thereof, show in plain letters and figures the date thereof.

SEC. 6. The Commissioner of Labor Statistics shall cause to be printed semi-monthly, a list of all applications and the character of the employment desired by the applicants, and of those desiring to employ labor and the class thereof, together with the names and address of the person or persons to whom the applicants refer, which have been received by him through the respective county auditors aforesaid, and cause a true copy of said lists to be mailed to the several county auditors of the state, and also to the clerks of all cities and the recorders of incorporated towns within the state of Iowa, having a population of five hundred (500) or more, according to the last state or national census. Said lists shall be posted immediately on receipt thereof by the county auditors, clerks of cities, and recorders of incorporated towns, in a conspicuous place in their respective offices, subject to the inspection of all persons desiring employment and all persons wishing to employ labor.

SEC. 7. Any county auditor, city clerk, or recorder of incorporated town, as herein provided, who shall, either directly or indirectly, charge or receive any compensation from any person whomsoever in securing employment or labor for them as provided in this act, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and be fined in a sum not exceeding fifty dollars (\$50), and imprisonment in the county jail not exceeding thirty days.

SEC. 8. The board of supervisors of each county shall provide the county auditors, of the respective counties, with such additional clerical assistance as will be required to carry out the provisions of this act. The executive council shall provide the Commissioner of Labor such additional clerical assistance as shall be required to carry out the provisions of this act. Postage, stationery and other necessary office expenses to properly conduct the business of said employment office connected with the office of the Commissioner of Labor Statistics shall be paid by the state; the postage, stationery and other office expenses necessary to properly conduct the business of said employment office in connection with the auditor's office of the several counties, shall be paid by the counties respectively.

SEC. 9. Any person who shall deface, mutilate, destroy or remove any of the reports required to be posted by the provisions of this act, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and on conviction thereof shall be fined not less than five nor more than twenty-five dollars and costs and stand committed until such fine and costs are paid.

SEC. 10. This act being deemed of immediate importance shall take effect and be in full force from and after its publication in the *Iowa State Register* and *Des Moines Daily Leader*, newspapers printed at Des Moines, Iowa.

The legislature adjourned, however, without taking any action in the matter, though the bill stood first on the house

calendar at the time of adjournment. The Commissioner of Labor then, in hopes of being able to show by actual results the practical utility of such a measure, endeavored to enlist the assistance of the different county auditors of the state in the establishment in a small way of such a bureau as contemplated by the Cheshire-Dowell bill. A majority of the county auditors in the state agreed to do all in their power to help in the work, and the newspapers almost without exception gave the scheme generous support. But from some cause or other it did not meet with success. The bureau was maintained for five months, and during that time, although applications for situations were numerous, the Commissioner was unable to secure work for a single applicant, and abandoned the attempt. In Ohio, where a free employment bureau is established by law in the five principal cities, its results have been most gratifying, the reports from the Labor Commissioner showing that, in round numbers, 80,000 persons have been assisted in securing employment through the agency of the bureau. Whether the failure here was due to the hard times or to the indifference or distrust of employers who may have suspected that it was similar to the numerous private employment agencies which subsist on the credulity and misfortunes of working people, and which no self-respecting employer will patronize knowingly, the Commissioner is unable to say. Perhaps if such an office were to be established by law the result might be different. The Commissioner can see no reason why a law which has shown such exceptionally good results in Ohio should altogether fail in Iowa.

In his report for 1894, Hon. W. T. Lewis, Commissioner of Labor of Ohio, says, in speaking of the free employment bureaus: "In 1894 the five free employment offices of the state found work for nearly 10,000 people. Although this is a falling off of 3,000 compared with 1893, the showing is a very satisfactory one, when it is remembered that the dullness in all lines of industry has been more widespread this year than last. Every possible avenue of employment has been eagerly besieged by applicants in advance of vacancies, and, apparently, employers had no need of going beyond their own doors to secure all the help desired. But the fact that they have applied in such large numbers to the free employment offices, while help was so available at every hand, demonstrates most emphatically that they find the use of a labor exchange the most satisfactory

method of obtaining employees." During 1894 14,521 males and 14,616 females applied to the free employment offices in Ohio for situations, and 2,140 males and 7,626 females secured positions. The applications for help were for 2,426 males and 9,444 females.

THE LABOR BULLETIN.

The reports of the Bureau of Labor Statistics are published biennially. These reports may be valuable to the student and doctrinaire, who out of past conditions desires to spin theories to govern future actions; but to the man dependent upon his daily labor for his daily bread, a knowledge of what the condition of the laboring people was two years ago sinks into insignificance compared with a knowledge of how he can better his own condition now. The length of time which necessarily elapses between the completion of much of the work and the publication of the report greatly diminishes its practical value to those for whose main benefit the office was established. Labor statistics, in order to be of real value to laboring people, must be up to date and published at frequent intervals. Therefore your Commissioner obtained the consent of the Secretary of State for the publication of a monthly bulletin in which was reported the progress that was being made with the work, thus giving the wage earners whatever benefit a knowledge of the present condition of their fellow workmen throughout the state may be to them, and affording an opportunity for the correction of errors which would be impossible where the first intimation the public has of what the Commissioner is doing is that given in his official report. The *Bulletin* being a new venture, its reception by the laboring classes of the state was watched closely, and it is with much pleasure that your Commissioner records that his most sanguine expectations have been more than met. Letters on file in this office from working people who have been reading the *Bulletin* regularly would indicate that they appreciate and take a keen interest in the work that is being done in their behalf, and that they regard the method of issuing monthly bulletins a great improvement over the old system of waiting two years for the regular report. Your Commissioner earnestly recommends that the next legislature authorize the continuance of the *Bulletin* as a permanent part of the work of the Bureau of Labor.

THE PULLMAN STRIKE.

Very serious trouble occurred in the labor world during the summer of 1894 as a result of a difference between the Pullman Palace Car Company and its employes in the town of Pullman, Ill. The only class of laborers actually involved was the American Railway Union, an organization embracing in its membership all classes of railway laborers, though for a time it seemed as though all organized labor would join in the strike. In Chicago, and some other large railroad centers, riots occurred that were quelled only by the arrival of the United States troops. Here in Iowa, while the railway laborers were almost unanimously in sympathy with their fellow laborers in Pullman, and while for a few days it was an impossibility for some Iowa railroads to move their trains, no outbreaks took place. All were law abiding and peaceable. Labor leaders all counseled moderation, and agitators and incendiary speakers were given small audiences and less encouragement.

LABOR-SAVING MACHINERY.

One of the questions contained in the "individual statement" blanks sent out to the working people of the state was: "Have any members of your trade or occupation been thrown out of employment by the introduction of labor-saving machinery?" As the time covered by the question was the year ending April 1, 1894, the replies showed so few affected by the introduction of machinery that your Commissioner did not think them of sufficient importance to encumber the report. During the year 1894, however, in one trade especially, machinery has had a very noticeable effect. In the cities of Sioux City, Council Bluffs, Des Moines, Burlington and Dubuque, typesetting machines have been introduced, with the result that about 100 compositors have been forced to seek employment in other places or occupations. In no other trade or occupation has labor-saving machinery had so great a direct effect.

LABOR ORGANIZATIONS.

"Labor is honorable, and pluck wins." In this country, only the man who does not labor is thoroughly despised. In a country where every one labors it is to be expected that labor organizations would flourish, for the time has now gone by, happily, when the right of laboring people to band themselves

together for the purpose of benefiting their condition can be questioned. Organization is the watchword of the last quarter of the Nineteenth century, and trusts and combinations rule in every department of the business, labor and political world. Capital is thoroughly organized and firmly united, acting with perfect unanimity upon every proposition that will tend to increase profits or reduce expenses; but while labor organizations are rapidly growing in public favor, as yet labor is but partially organized and badly disunited, many organizations being positively antagonistic to each other and some being used merely as levers to raise designing leaders into positions of place and power. Still, in spite of all, labor has made great advances through the instrumentality of its organizations. The condition of labor to-day is incomparably better than it was but a few generations ago. It is a long step—a very long step—in advance in public sentiment from the time of Edward VI. of England, when, "if a man refused to work for the statute prices he was branded with the letter V, denoting vagabond, and reduced to slavery for two years. If he attempted to escape from that condition he was branded with the letter S, and became a slave for life. If he objected to that state he was hanged." From such a condition, it is a very long step to where a judge in that same England—the late Justice James Fitzjames Stephen—states as a clear proposition of law that "those who are so minded may combine to fix the price to be given or taken for labor;" and a judge of the United States Federal Court lays down from the bench the proposition that "laborers are entitled to the highest wage which the strategy of work or the cessation from work may bring." This change in condition, in custom, in sentiment, in law, has been brought about mainly through the effort of labor organizations. As the laborers became better educated they began more to respect themselves; then they began to band together to compel the respect of others. And as these bands of laborers have perfected their organizations and grown in strength and wisdom, so has the condition of labor, even of that outside the ranks of the organizations and perhaps antagonistic to them, improved. In Iowa, the best paid and most prosperous class of laborers are those belonging to some union or organization, as a study of the individual statement tables given in this report will clearly show. Of the laborers reporting to your Commissioner, 681 belong to labor organizations and 1,852 regard them as beneficial to laborers.

The great majority of those reporting say nothing in answer to the question, but of those who do reply, not more than 20 reporting as belonging regard organizations as other than a great benefit. Those who oppose labor organizations, for the most part, live in small towns.

VALUE OF LABOR STATISTICS.

The Commissioner has frequently been asked by persons to whom he had handed an "individual statement" blank, "What is the good of all this? Will it raise my wages any, or give me shorter hours or an easier job?" And because assurance could not be given that the direct and immediate effect of filling out the blank would be to gain the workman a shorter work day or an increase in wages, they at once condemned the entire system as a useless and inquisitorial prying into private affairs. Hon. Carroll D. Wright, of the United States Bureau of Labor, in an article in the *Engineering Magazine* for November, 1893, says in answer to the question as to the direct benefits the workingman receives from the existence of labor bureaus: "This question cannot be answered very specifically, any more than could one asked for the direct benefits of the public school. It would be a difficult process to show how a dollar more is made to enter the pockets of the working people through the existence of the public schools, or any other educational institution, and yet all men will admit that the sum of benefits is largely increased by the existence of schools. Personally, I have always contended that the bureau of statistics of labor, wherever it exists, is simply a part of the educational machinery of the community through which it is enabled to know more of itself. 'Know thyself' is an injunction which should be applied to communities as well as to individuals, and it is only through rigid, impartial and fearless investigations that any community can know itself in many directions." Mr. Wright then goes on to state some of the benefits of labor bureaus that have come under his personal observation. It was through the report of the labor bureau that the people of Massachusetts became aware of the wretched condition of the residents of the tenement houses in Boston, with the result that, public sympathy being aroused, a very great improvement in the condition of the people of those sections was soon brought about. It was, too, the report of the bureau of labor in Massachusetts calling attention to the long hours of labor of the employees of the factories in that

state that brought about the first ten-hour law in this country. The improvement in the conditions in factories and workshops in England and America is largely due to the publication of statistics showing the conditions existing in those institutions. Another, and perhaps one of the most gratifying results of the knowledge given the public by the bureaus of labor in this country, is the abolishment or at least modification of the truck store system, by which workmen were "plucked" of the greater part of their wages by being compelled to trade at their employer's store and pay his price for all the necessities of life. Mr. Wright closes his article as follows: "Notwithstanding all that I have said relative to the value and influence of the statistics of labor, I am perfectly well aware that they can be made of far greater value; but that greater value can only be secured through the direct action of the legislative bodies behind the bureaus. They are very poorly equipped. They need more men and more money. They need experience, which can only come through the influence of the executives of the states. With an enlarged tenure of office and an increase in the equipment and means of the bureaus, their future usefulness can be made to far excel that of the past and of the present. The lines of work which they can undertake are numerous and inexhaustible. Knowledge of production is absolutely essential for the adjustment of many of the difficult questions we are facing today, and any contribution, through statistical investigation or otherwise, that will enable both the capitalist and his employe to more closely understand the real conditions of production should be welcomed by all elements of the community. The bureaus must be kept in the future as in the past free from partisanship. The statistician is not a statistician when he is an advocate, no matter how skillful he may be in the manipulation of figures. He must be impartial, he must make his investigations without any reference to theories to be proved or disproved, and give to the world the actual results of his inquiries. This country lacks trained statisticians. We have no means of training them except in the practical work of the statistical offices of the state and general governments. These offices, therefore, become a school for the future, and the statisticians of this country that are to be of service to the governments must acquire their knowledge through the statistical offices; but no work can be accomplished successfully without money and without men. We must look

therefore to the legislative branches of our various governments for the increase of the usefulness and for recognized influence of our bureaus of statistics of labor."

RECOMMENDATIONS.

For reasons which must be apparent to any one who has read the preceding pages of this report, the work of the Labor Bureau has been greatly retarded by the inadequacy of the powers granted the Commissioner, and also by the meagre financial support given it. True, the Commissioner is not limited as to the amount he may expend for postage and stationery, but the gathering of statistics by correspondence is very unsatisfactory. Few of those to whom inquiries may be addressed will pay any attention to them, and of those who do reply, the answers are often so incomplete as to be wholly worthless. If your Commissioner were to be granted in addition to what he already has, the traveling expenses of himself and deputies, the effectiveness of the work could be more than doubled and the expenses but slightly increased. Anything that is worth doing at all is worth doing well; and if the Bureau of Labor Statistics is not worth giving a support which will enable it to do effective work it is not worth maintaining at all. Your Commissioner would most respectfully recommend that the present law governing the Labor Bureau be amended by the passage of something like the following:

A BILL

FOR AN ACT TO AMEND CHAPTER 132 OF THE ACTS OF THE TWENTIETH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF IOWA.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Iowa:

SECTION 1. That section 3 of chapter 132 of the Laws of the Twentieth General Assembly be amended by inserting after the word "for" in the fourth line thereof, the following: "The Commissioner, or any officer or employee, of the Bureau of Labor Statistics, shall be allowed, in addition to their salaries, their actual and necessary traveling expenses while in the performance of their duties; said expenses to be paid out of the general fund of the state upon a voucher verified by the Commissioner."

SEC. 2. That section 6 of chapter 132 of the Laws of the Twentieth General Assembly be repealed and the following enacted in lieu thereof:

SEC. 6. The Commissioner, or any officer or employee of the Bureau of Labor Statistics, shall have the power to issue subpoenas, administer oaths and take testimony in all matters relating to the duties herein required by said Bureau; such testimony to be taken in some suitable place in the vicinity to which testimony is applicable. Witnesses subpoenaed and testifying before any officer or employee of said Bureau shall be paid the same fees as witnesses before a justice court, such payment to be made out of the contingent fund of the Bureau. Any person duly subpoenaed under the provisions of this section, who shall wilfully neglect or refuse to attend or testify at the time and place named in the subpoena shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction therefor before any court of competent jurisdiction shall be punished by a fine not exceeding fifty dollars and costs of prosecution, or by imprisonment in the county jail not exceeding thirty days; provided, however, that no witness shall be compelled to go outside the county in which he resides to testify.

SEC. 3. That said chapter be further amended by adding thereto as section 7 the following:

SEC. 7. The Commissioner of Labor, or any officer or employee of the Bureau of Labor, shall have the power to enter any factory or mill, workshop, mine, store, business house, or public or private work, when the same is open or in operation, for the purpose of gathering facts and statistics such as are contemplated by this act, and to examine into the methods of protection from danger to employees, and the sanitary conditions in and around such buildings and places, and make a record thereof; and any owner or occupant of such factory or mill, workshop, mine, store, business house, public or private work, or any agent or employee of such owner or occupant, who shall refuse to allow any officer or employee of the said Bureau to so enter, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction therefor, before any court of competent jurisdiction, shall be punished by a fine not exceeding one hundred dollars and costs of prosecution, or be imprisoned in the county jail not exceeding thirty days.

SEC. 4. That said chapter be further amended by adding thereto as section 8 the following:

SEC. 8. The expressions, "factory," "mill," "workshop," "mine," "store," "business house," and "public or private work," as used in this act, shall be construed to mean any factory, mill, workshop, mine, store, business house, public or private work where one or more wage earners are employed for a certain stipulated compensation.

SEC. 5. That said chapter be further amended by adding thereto as section 9 the following:

SEC. 9. It shall be the duty of every owner, operator or manager of every factory, mill, workshop, mine, store, business house, public or private work, or any other establishment where labor is employed, to make to the Bureau, upon blanks furnished by said Bureau, such reports and returns as said Bureau may require for the purpose of compiling such labor statistics as are authorized by this act; and the owner, operator, or business manager shall make said returns and reports within the time prescribed by the Commissioner of Labor, and shall certify to the correctness of the same. Any owner, operator or manager of any such factory, mill, workshop, mine, store, business house, public or private work, who shall neglect

or refuse to furnish to the Commissioner of Labor such reports or returns as may be required to carry out the provisions of this act, or who shall make any incorrect or false statement regarding the same, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction therefor before any court of competent jurisdiction shall be punished by a fine not exceeding one hundred dollars and costs of prosecution, or imprisoned in the county jail not exceeding thirty days. In the reports of the Commissioner no use shall be made of names of individuals, firms or corporations, supplying the information called for by this section; such information being deemed confidential and not for the purpose of disclosing personal affairs, and any officer or employee of the Bureau of Labor Statistics violating this provision shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction therefor shall be fined in a sum not exceeding five hundred dollars and costs of prosecution, or by imprisonment in the county jail for not more than one year.

SEC. 6. That said chapter be further amended by adding thereto as section 10 the following:

SEC. 10. No report or return made to said Bureau in accordance with the provisions of this act, and no schedule, record, or documents, gathered or returned by its officers or employees, shall be destroyed within two years of the receipt or collection thereof. At the expiration of the period of two years all records, schedules or papers accumulating in the said Bureau during said period, that may be considered of no value by the Commissioner may be destroyed; *provided*, that the authority of the executive council be first obtained for such destruction.

SEC. 7. This act being deemed of immediate importance shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication in the *Iowa State Register* and *Des Moines Leader*, newspapers published in Des Moines, Iowa.

WAGE EARNERS OF IOWA—STATISTICAL TABLES.

In the individual statement blanks sent out by your Commissioner were a number of questions which experience proved to be needless, inasmuch as those receiving the blanks either ignored the questions altogether or else answered them in such a way as to be of no statistical value; again, the replies to other of the questions are such as from their nature they could not be tabulated, but are given in another place in this report under appropriate headings. The accompanying tables contain all the information given in replies to your Commissioner which it was practicable to tabulate. No attempt has been made to prove anything, and no conclusions have been drawn from the returns made. The tables are given for just what they are worth, and your Commissioner submits them as a fair and unbiased showing of the actual condition of the wage earners of Iowa, as made by themselves.

EXPLANATION OF ABBREVIATIONS USED IN TABLES.

In the accompanying tables the following abbreviations are used, viz: M for male, F for female, in the column denoting sex; M for married, S for single, W for widowed, in the column denoting social condition; D for daily, W for weekly, M for monthly, Bi-w for bi-weekly, Irreg for irregular, in the column denoting periods of payments of wages; T for time, P for piece, B for both, in the column referring to piece and time work.

PIECE AND TIME WORK.

One of the questions asked in the individual statement blanks but the replies to which have not been tabulated was: "Which is preferable, piece or time work, and why?" With the exception of the printers and cigarmakers, the great majority of the wage earners prefer time work; in the two occupations mentioned fully 85 per cent express a preference for piece work "because they can make more that way." Below are given some of the reasons given by the workmen for their preferences:

PREFER TIME WORK.

Machinist: When a man works on piece work he does his best to make time, and the quality suffers. Very soon his employer thinks the men are making too much money, and then one reduction follows another until it gets below living prices.

Machinist: Piece work is too uncertain.

Machinist: Piece work is the root of reductions in wages.

Machinist: Because men are apt to get greedy and hold some man out of work by doing two men's work.

Mechanical engineer: Piece work has a tendency to impair the quality of the product.

Plasterer: It does not give all an equal show.

Cornice maker: Piece work is detrimental to all the workmen in my trade. It cuts wages down and makes a racetrack of the shop.

Common laborer: Piece work makes the sweat-shops.

Laborer in brickyard: Piece work is one day big pay and the next day nothing; time work is sure every day.

Engineer: In time work you always know what is coming to you at the end of the week.

Printer: Piece work encourages inferior workmanship and quantity rather than quality.

Printer: Piece work is not steady, and the employees will alight work for the sake of a "string."

Printer: The piece scale is fixed by what the faster men can make, and hence is unfair to the average workman.

Printer: Piece work is demoralizing in every way; unfair to the workman and of no advantage to the employer.

Lineman: Piece work pays when you work; time work pays all the time.
Cigarmaker: Time work is best, because a workingman cannot figure ahead.

PREFER PIECE WORK.

Machinist: Piece work gives a man a chance to make more.

Tinner: At piece work a mechanic can get work and hold it against apprentices who have not learned their trade.

Egg packer: Piece work commands higher wages for experienced men.

Cooper: At piece work you are your own boss; commence when you want to and quit when you feel like it.

Cooper: Piece work is more satisfactory to both parties.

Harnessmaker: At piece work a man gets a more just compensation for his labor.

Glovesmaker: One is more independent at piece work.

Printer: At piece work a man is paid according to his ability.

Printer: At piece work a man is paid according to his actual ability; it does away with "soldiering," and puts all on the same footing.

Printer: Piece work makes a just discrimination between a competent and an incompetent workman, without injury to either.

Printer: Piece work is a greater incentive to ambition, rewards excellence, and is generally more satisfactory.

Miner: At piece work a man is his own boss.

Wood carver: At piece work the harder a man works the more he can make, and he commences and quits when he likes.

Cigarmaker: At piece work the fast man does not have to help make a living for the slow one.

Cigarmaker: At piece work no man produce more labor for the same amount of money.

Cigarmaker: At piece work no one can find fault with the amount of work you do but yourself.

Cigarmaker: Prefers piece work, because "at our trade if an apprentice was as good a workman as a journeyman he would not receive the same wages as a journeyman."

Broommaker: Piece work gives a man a chance to show his ability and is cheaper for the manufacturer.

LABOR ORGANIZATIONS.

Below are some of the reasons given by workingmen for and against labor organizations:

Cigarmaker: Without them the laborer would work more hours per day and get still less pay than now. Employers will not raise wages or shorten hours of their own accord. They must be forced to do it by the unions.

Miner: Are beneficial, because they enable the men to resist the encroachments of unprincipled capitalists.

Machinist: Beneficial, because they help the members morally and place them upon a better footing to meet their employers.

Machinist: Beneficial, because if the men don't stick together the bosses walk away with them.

Carpenter: The principles of trades unionism are all right and beneficial if carried out correctly.

Blacksmith: Beneficial, because it meets the oppressor with his own weapon.

Machinist: Believes in labor organizations because of the successful strikes on Reading, Union Pacific and Great Northern.

Printer: Beneficial on the same plan that combination of capital succeeds better than where invested singly.

Printer: Beneficial, because they tend to keep up wages on a falling market and improve the craft.

Cigarmaker: They are imperatively necessary, because we could not make a living without them.

Cigarmaker: Beneficial, because it proves educational, decreases hours of labor and increases wages.

Printer: Beneficial, because good wages are secured, money circulated and hence beneficial to everybody.

Cigarmaker: Beneficial, because a member of the organization will not cut under another or accept less wages.

Printer: If organization is beneficial to the capitalist, it is doubly so to the laborer.

Boilermaker: Labor unions, when properly conducted, tend to unity and intelligence.

Machinist (apprentice): Beneficial, because they help keep trades together and wages uniform.

Mailing clerk: When properly controlled, beneficial; when organized for strikes, not beneficial.

Printer: Beneficial, because there is strength in organizations which employers are bound to respect.

Printer: Beneficial: collective presentation of claims has a better effect than individual presentation.

Machinist helper: Beneficial, because they are the only way at present to keep wages near a standard.

Machinist: Beneficial. In properly organized unions, members meet and discuss business for their good, same as business men and corporations and monopolies do; and, I think, have as much right to do so.

Clerk: Beneficial, as they are a check on the downward tendency of wages.

Blacksmith helper: Not beneficial, because "too many laborers think they should kneel down to the capitalist."

Foreman gang of laborers: Organizations are not beneficial, because they can stop a man from work, but cannot put him back again.

Printer: Not beneficial, because they cause strikes, and strikes are something that should be avoided.

Printer: Not beneficial, because they keep up a feeling of discontent that does more harm than good.

Blacksmith: Thinks organizations not beneficial because not organized right.

Printer: Not beneficial, as they spend time and money without getting any returns.

Ship carpenter: Beneficial: "by combining or uniting, labor can command a higher and more uniform rate of wages."

Machinist: Beneficial, as they result in "agitation of labor questions and consequent education of the public and laborer."

Teamster: Beneficial, because if "it were not for fear of trouble, men would have to work cheaper."

Plasterer: Beneficial, "because they are the only friends in this country the working people have."

Baker: Beneficial; they "increase wages, decrease hours of labor, and are imperatively necessary."

Locomotive engineer: Beneficial, because of their "influence and power by discommoding."

Butter maker: Not beneficial, because "competition is the life of trade, and it is also the life of labor."

Teamster: Beneficial, because "one man can do nothing alone."

Coal miner: Beneficial, "the Knights of Labor have done more for the laboring man than all the reform papers in the country, by educating him."

Book-binder: "They tend to bring laborers to a higher standard of workmanship and intelligence," hence they are beneficial.

Coal heaver: Beneficial: "in union there is strength—with good leaders."

Machinist: Beneficial, because "by mutual aid they help to keep up wages and help to educate us to better mechanics."

Laborer: Beneficial. Unification.

Machinist: Beneficial. Cooperation.

Carpenter: Beneficial; a good educator.

Machinist: Mutual protection against corporations.

Shipping clerk: We must meet organization with organization.
 Machinist: Beneficial, because they make the company a little afraid.
 Bookbinder: Beneficial. Where there are trades unions, wages are higher.

Blacksmith: Beneficial, because then capital cannot use labor as a slave.

Cigarmaker: If every man working got union wages, there would not be so many children working in factories, and would be more in school.

Printer: Beneficial, because it causes one to study his condition and because the many are stronger than the one.

Laborer (colored man): A colored man cannot belong to anything here (Jasper county). It seems as if he is barred out from every organization.

Electrician: Doesn't belong and doesn't believe in them, because he has failed to see any good sticking out of them yet.

Tinner: Don't belong, doesn't believe in trades unions, because he doesn't think one should control so many.

Drayman: Does not belong, does not believe in them because they usually end in strikes.

Hardware clerk: Does not belong. Don't think them beneficial, because they are too often managed by men who never work.

Bookbinder: Is a member, but does not believe organizations are beneficial, because it is only the poor workman who is helped.

Painter: Does not believe labor organizations are beneficial on account of lack of sincerity, honesty, knowledge of their business and sterling manhood.

Bank cashier: Not beneficial because there is too much time lost and money expended in supporting them.

Painter: I was formerly a member of the Knights of Labor; M. W. for two years. The order proved an injury to us and prevented the members from getting work, so the lodge disbanded.

Harnessmaker: Opposes labor organizations on the grounds that they cause dissatisfaction among the mechanics themselves.

Farm hand: Not beneficial, because I think they cause men to lose good jobs quite often.

Plumber: Not beneficial. I have always received fair wages and believe in letting well enough alone.

Shoemaker: Not beneficial, because they want too much power.

Painter: Not beneficial, because they are always planning some foot strike instead of looking for something to do.

Teamster: Not beneficial. Supply and demand control wages.

Machinist: The benefits from labor organizations are doubtful, because it is an unequal contest in a strike, and the equal contest at the ballot is ignored. Fools say I.

Common laborer: Is a member, but regards organizations as of very little benefit. If you want a full explanation read "Progress and Poverty," by Henry George.

Printer: Not beneficial; competent, steady men are always in demand.

FOREIGN IMMIGRATION.

Boiler maker (a foreigner): Foreign immigration is all right if you keep the pauper labor out, and not bring ship loads at a time. Such immigration is far worse than slavery ever was. They will never make good citizens.

Machinist: In my estimation the country is overrun with foreign paupers who will not even try to learn the language of the country, and will take a job much cheaper than an American will. If we could overcome that the country would be in a flourishing condition today.

Blacksmith: Immigration has ruined this locality. The Bohemians predominate, and in the shops today they will get a job in preference to a white man. The system takes them into the shop from the yard and packing house and makes blacksmiths and machinists out of them as fast as they can learn. They are like the English sparrow, driving the native birds out of the country. The American mechanic has to go, too.

Locomotive engineer: I am in favor of taxing foreign labor the same as foreign goods when they land here.

Ship carpenter: Believes that foreign immigration should be restricted, and that the government should control the railroads.

Photographer: The immigration of paupers from foreign countries must be stopped or we have not experienced one-half what we will in the near future.

Machinist: Foreign immigration does hurt in this locality as in all others, because foreigners are generally willing to work for almost any wages offered them and live like pigs in a pen, thereby keeping down wages. Any self-respecting American workingman would never consent to do as they do.

Machinist helper: Foreign immigration is the cause of wages being so bad now, as foreigners invariably work for less than an American will.

Machinist: I think it of most vital importance that our government stop immigration at once. The thousands of our citizens who are today roaming the country out of work is sufficient cause. By doing so the government would protect the mechanics, and they ought to be as well as the manufacturers, seeing they have a protective tariff and the freest kind of a labor market.

Machinist: Immigration should be restricted. The labor market is too much overstocked with cheap men.

GENERAL REMARKS.

The following were answers to the question: "What, in your opinion, will most benefit the wage earners of the country generally?"

Tinner: If all mechanics in their younger days would strive to be masters of their trade they would have work at good wages nearly all the time they felt so inclined.

Blacksmith: Believes in protection for the laborer as well as his product.

Cigarmaker: I think it would be a wise act if the state would employ a few more of the idle classes to make times a little better.

Machinist: I think railroads should have an equal share of government "pap" in this state.

Printer: I don't know.

Riverman: A good war.

Patternmaker: Bust the trusts.

Laborer: Eight hours work, ten hours pay; less machine power.

Merchant: Work with, not against, the interests of the employer.

Lithographer: By employers regarding their employees as men and not as machines.

Iron moulder: Take the women out of the stores and factories; stop foreign immigration.

Printer: More wage earners to till the soil, and less in crowded cities and towns and mills and factories.

Printer: Restriction of foreign immigration; proper protection of American industries; settlement of the money question.

Upholsterer: Consolidation of all labor organizations, or placing all railroads and mines in the hands of the government.

Sawmill hand: A national law giving capital a certain per cent on its investments, and divide the balance among the laborers.

Iron moulder: Avoid bad habits and vote as intelligent men ought to vote. Politics is the only remedy for workingmen's evils.

Upholsterer: Restrict foreign immigration, and put men at the head of labor organizations that will look out for the interests of labor.

Machinist: Thorough organization; practice economy, smoke less cigars, consume less liquor, stay at home nights, and don't try to keep up with the changes of style.

Switchman: "Equal rights to all and special privileges to none" should be the motto of our government. Whatever benefits the common people will benefit the wage earners.

Carpenter: For the government to make good roads, to own the railroads, and to have inspectors over all kinds of business; to prohibit foreigners from owning real estate in this country.

Carpenter: No dram shops or places where intoxicating liquors could be had; no credit but from one pay day to another, or none at all; nine hours in summer and eight in winter at living wages to constitute a day's work.

Factory worker: Stop free trade; stop improving machinery; stop foreign immigration; stop children and females from working in factories; stop incorporated trusts; then the laboring classes are bound to work themselves up.

Seamstress: Government ownership of the means of production and transportation; free coinage of silver at a ratio of 16 to 1; the initiative and referendum; rigid enforcement of the law against black-listing; study politics more and politicians less.

Machinist: Stop foreign immigration; government to issue all money and loan it direct to the people; establishment of postal savings banks; free coinage of silver at the ratio of 16 to 1; making it unlawful for any person to hold any kind of property he does not use, especially land.

Printer's "devil": Compulsory education; take the young out of our manufactories and workshops; a humanitarian movement forbidding the marriage of all who are incapable of producing healthy offspring; stop granting patents for labor-saving devices until things come up to a level; the construction of the Hawaiian cable and the Nicaraguan canal.

Ship carpenter, pilot: Reduce the hours of labor to offset for the introduction of labor-saving machinery; woman suffrage; strengthen and enforce the laws against child labor; abolish custom houses and all offices and machinery pertaining to them; and also all taxes except on land values; make all men and women as free as consistent with good morals, and especially teach the iniquity of holding land for speculation, and inculcate the religious belief that suicide is far more creditable than dependence upon public or private charity.

Printer: Everybody strike.

Harnessmaker: Do away with all factory work.

Cigarmaker: Stop tenement house work and foreign immigration.

Common laborer: For the government to control all public works.

Cigarmaker: Free raw material, and a tax on imported manufactured goods.

Printer: A thorough organization of all trades and a general uniting in one central body.

Printer: Kill convict labor, and keep children and girls out of places that ought to be filled by men.

Plasterer: When one has a trade, learn it well; then do as you wish to be done by. Let whiskey alone.

Machinist: A better understanding between labor and capital, for labor is the father of capital the world over.

Machinist: For the laborers to join hands and say to each other: "We will help you if you understand your profession; if not, we will try to get you into something you can do."

Section foreman: Compel railroads and other corporations to give a better percentage of their earnings to the unskilled laborer. I believe

other railroad employees are paid better for the work they do than we who work on repairs of track.

Boilermaker: Complete destruction of labor-saving machinery, and I might also add, their inventors—no sarcasm intended. Making eight hours a day's work, thereby reducing production, and I think wage earners, mechanics at least, would be benefited.

Carpenter: Such condition of things as will afford good wages to all classes of laborers. All hand labor should be well paid for labor well done. What is the use of cheap necessities unless the masses are paid such wages as will furnish them the means to buy.

Wood patternmaker: Reduce the number of working hours; limit the number of immigrants; have a universal money standard; enact a compulsory school attendance law; government ownership of railroads, mines, forests, and all lands that are not being made use of.

Locomotive fireman: A law creating a commission similar to the railway commission, before whom action could be brought against corporations without cost to wage earners. "As it now is, the corporations can law a poor man off the face of the earth." License railway employees.

Baggage master: Protection to home industries. More state and national laws regulating and controlling corporations, and by so doing prevent strikes and labor troubles, and establish a more uniform system of fixing the wages of the laborers. "Six days shalt thou labor and do all thy work," etc.

Cigarmaker: In the first place, the principle of the referendum; second, free coinage of silver; third, government ownership of railroads, telegraphs and telephone lines; fourth, dissolution of trusts; fifth, liability of employers for accidents to employees, and last, but not least, restriction of foreign immigration for at least a period of twenty years.

Common laborer: There should be a supervisor of labor in every township to see that every laboring man gets his full equivalent for labor done. There should be a labor bureau controlled by the government. I am in favor of introducing the system of New Zealand, and decidedly think that it will be for the general weal and benefit of the whole United States.

Printer: We want less protection for monopolies and more for producers; the rich to pay their just share of taxes; all ports closed against foreign immigration for a period of twenty or thirty years; compulsory arbitration; government control of railroads, telegraphs, and all monopolies; election of senators and judges of the courts by a direct vote of the people; and last, but not least, the laying on the shelf of such men as Brice, Gorman & Co., for all time to come.

Clerk: Land monopoly lies at the root of whatever distress prevails among wage workers. There are undoubtedly other evils, but the removal of these would only tend under present conditions to make land in the reformed community more valuable, and the land owner would finally absorb all the advantage gained. The single tax will open land which possesses valuable natural opportunities to earn good wages—more opportunities than there are hands to utilize, and thus wages will go up to their natural level—the full earnings of labor.

Cigarmaker: The abolition of all taxes except those on land values, irrespective of improvements, will go far to settle the labor question, which is now pressing for solution. The competition which forces wages

down to the starvation line is due to the fact that the land monopolies have locked nature's store-houses against those anxious to earn a living in them. The adoption of the single tax would throw open all natural opportunities to those willing to work. Taxing the rental value of land would destroy land monopoly, and thus open all the land to all the workers.

Cigarmaker: I can say, and safely say, that the proposed reduction in the tariff is the cause of all the dull times. Whenever they talk of reducing the tariff there is a set back in business. * * * The great trouble is too many men go to the polls and deposit their votes not knowing what the vote that they cast means. I say again, tariff reform killed business in this country. I used to lay up from \$300 to \$250 a year, but since tariff reform came into power I can hardly make a living.

Machinist: I am of the opinion that we have too much anti-railway legislation. It may be beneficial to the farmers but it has been detrimental to wage earners. The railways should be encouraged, for they have been the making of the country.

Contractor and builder: In my opinion the difference between labor and capital can only be settled by the courts. No use for men to quit work. Let organized labor sue out a writ before any court and make a complaint; let the court have power by law to call witnesses, and to decide the question at issue the same as with debt or other trials at law. Then no one would be inconvenienced and labor would lose no time. Keep at work and they will not have to patronize soup houses.

Cigarmaker: I think it would be a great benefit if we could get people to patronize home industry, for the cheap eastern goods are driving our factories in the state out of the business. The much law will also make a big hole in our trade, for outside goods will surely be recommended.

Common laborer: Labor will never get its just reward until all indirect taxation is abolished and a single tax irrespective of improvements on land values is placed in lieu thereof. All that labor needs is freedom.

Printer: I would suggest a labor commissioner elected by the people to settle all labor disputes and do away with strikes which do no one any good and every one harm.

Electrician: Put the convicts to working the state and county roads and abolish penitentiary labor. Let them keep up the roads as the section men do railroads. Take more guards, but that will give honest men something to do.

Printer: Hours should be reduced to eight in all labor occupations. Wages must go down to a gold standard, or pauper labor of Europe, unless silver is remonetized. Workmen must get into politics for self-defense.

Cigarmaker: The rich are getting richer day by day and the poor poorer. Machinery is made more perfect and new inventions continue to appear and take the place of men. The number of the unemployed is increasing every year. What will all this lead us to? A revolution, a rebellion on the part of the disinherited? Or will the present chaotic, inhuman, un-Christian competitive system evolve peacefully into a more just and Christian one? I hope for the best and my hope lies in the wisdom and growing strength of the trades unions.

Printer: I do not believe the workmen of this country will make any great advance until they enter into politics. By entering into politics I do

not mean they must form a new party, but they certainly hold the balance of power between the two great parties and could use that power so as to greatly benefit themselves if they would but throw aside their intense partisanship. Through their national and state federations of labor they could agree upon means that are beneficial to workmen in general and have such measures incorporated into the platforms of the two old parties. Should the victorious party fail to carry out the pledges made it could not henceforth expect the support of workmen and they, without regard to former party affiliations, should unite to discipline that party.

Machinist: I should think wage workers should be titled to their wages every two weeks with but one day's wages held back. Would like to see foreign immigration restricted.

Horse-collar maker: Our business comes greatly in conflict with convict labor, where they are about all using machinery, and the contractors are nearly altogether monopolizing the trade in the United States, and through such competition are running free hand labor out of existence.

Machinist: I think if a weekly or semi-weekly payment of wages was enforced it would benefit the workmen greatly, as it would render unnecessary running in debt. As it is before the month is gone their finances are low and they contract debts.

Machinist: Wage earners would be greatly benefited if corporations were compelled to pay within ten days after work is done.

Carpenter: Coinage of silver at the rate of 16 to 1 would help the present state of affairs.

Bookbinder: Women should get the same wages that men do when they do the same work.

Common laborer: A strike would be all right if the strikers would let those workers who want to. If men do not want to work let them quit, but let others be.

Bookbinder (side remarks on a blank sent in): If women were paid the same wages that men are we would be better able to fill out these blanks. As it is, our wages are so low that we are ashamed of them.

Machinist: If the truth was told about the United States in the country I came from, there would be no immigrants from there whatever. I have been here seven years and am now a full-fledged citizen. I came here with the belief that men were on an equal footing, but find a greater gulf between people here than in Scotland. I can live here about the same as there, but do not find it so comfortable.

Locomotive engineer: At present workmen should share what work there is to do to as great an extent as possible give all a chance to live; look well to their ballot at elections and vote for the good of their fellow-laborers, and keep away from saloons.

Buttermaker: Believes in laborers receiving what they are worth, and thinks most employers will pay the same if the parties employed take interest in their work the same as if it belonged to them.

Teamster: A good, sound, unchanging money; limit to foreign immigration; a good sound protective tariff; compel all foreigners to become citizens; limit the ownership of land held by non-residents.

Justice of the peace (formerly a shoemaker): I came to Iowa 24 years ago. At that time my trade was good. It got poorer and poorer every year; cause, machinery and concentration of work at factories. At this time

there is no shoemaker in —; they are all cobblers repairing factory work.

Coal heaver: A man with a family needs at least \$2 per day to keep a family as it should be. Sunday work should be abolished by law in every branch of business, so that all workmen could have Sunday, at the least, to rest. I, with plenty of others, work every night in the month. We are supposed to, if we are able, in order to hold our job.

Painter: I am satisfied that both corporate and individual greed among the rich, want of economy among the working people, living beyond their means, induced by the demands of the present day society both temporal and spiritual, to say nothing of the political dishonesty that exists on all sides—to these causes and to others that might be enumerated is due the present condition of industrial affairs in both state and nation.

Baker: I am satisfied that strikes are a dismal failure, and if we ever succeed in accomplishing anything it must be at the ballot-box. Give us a legal eight-hour work day, the nationalization of telegraphs, telephones, railroads and mines, the municipal ownership of street cars, gas, and electric lights, etc.; throw aside all petty prejudices in labor organizations, and all pull together and help shoulder the same burden, and see what we can accomplish. We should all be aiming at the same thing instead of antagonizing ourselves.

Machinist: I believe in the labor organization without the strike; with it I cannot be a member; and what is more, will not. So far as I am able to learn, all labor organizations deprecate the strike, say they do not believe in it; that it will not prove for the best interests of all concerned in the end, and yet I have yet to learn of any who depend upon anything else either defensively or offensively. If the strike is so bad a thing for all concerned, why not abandon it? Briefly formulated, my creed for the workman would read as follows: "Make the strike a criminal offense; enact compulsory arbitration laws; correct our immigration laws so that the pauper, anarchist and criminal would be effectually excluded; revise our naturalization laws so that they would bar every man who cannot read and write the English language, or is an anarchist or professional criminal, and make it a cause for impeachment for any judge to evade the strict letter of the law; allow corporate rights only to actual investment of capital, restricting capital stock to amount actually subscribed at time of application for franchise." If these things could be accomplished, and who says they cannot, would we wish for the return of the strike? If the labor organizations, or an insignificant part of them, would give their support only to those aspirants for political preferment for the accomplishment of these objects, I believe we would be nearer the labor millennium than we ever will be in the paths we are now treading.

Your Commissioner believes that the foregoing pages give every shade of opinion expressed by the working men and women of the state in their replies to questions contained in the "individual statement" blanks. These replies might be multiplied until they filled 100 pages of the report, but no more comprehensive idea of what the wage earners think, talk about and desire would be given than is here outlined.
