From fall, 2016 to fall, 2017, the number of students growing in reading increased by 9%. That means 78% of our 3rd – 11th grade students are gaining ground in reading. Students showing growth in math increased by 14%, which means 81% of these 3rd – 11th grade students are also improving their math skills. Results are from tri-annual Measures of Academic Progress scores.

re two languages better than one? Iowa School for the Deaf preschool staff are working with Gallaudet University researchers in the field of American Sign Language (ASL) and English Bilingual Bimodal programming. The collaboration began fall, 2017 with plans to create a classroom environment that builds on the development of ASL and English. Components of the pilot program include individual, classroom and home plans, all of which are data-driven and research-based.

Favorable outcomes include:

- 1. Safeguarding language development in both modalities
- Making best use of the young brain's capacity for language acquisition
- Building upon a child's strengths and abilities

What's next? ISD continues to work with Gallaudet, slowly and carefully building, implementing and monitoring the bilingual bimodal program.



These students are always on the go- to college classes, jobs or field trips through the 4PLUS student center.

Some of the jobs 4PLUS students held during 2017/2018 were at Menards, AMC Theaters, HyVee, Kohls, Nebraska Furniture Mart, Best Quality Countertops, Grease Monkey, Goodwill, Ameristar, Olive Garden and Blue Beacon.

Classes both 4PLUS and high school students took through Iowa Western Community College ranged from information technology and design technology to accounting and workplace readiness.

4PLUS at Iowa School for the Deaf (Post-senior Learning for Ultimate Success) is Iowa's only transition program exclusively for students who are deaf or hard of hearing. Students benefit from tutoring for their college classes, job skills and activities of daily living. Students exit the program when they turn 21 or have met their transition goals. 4PLUS is open to lowa's high school students who are deaf or hard or hearing, who will pursue independent employment, and have completed their senior year. Prior enrollment to ISD is not required.

- Numerous campus renovations took place, including new work areas for traveling staff and records storage in the administration building basement.
- ISD administration began working with outside agencies to expand its emergency operation plans. A national school crisis prevention and intervention training curriculum continues to be implemented.


