Need help?

When a Governor's Disaster Proclamation is made in an Iowa County, the <u>Iowa Individual Assistance Grant Program</u> can be activated at the request of local officials to help those Iowans adversely affected. The IA Grant Program provides grants up to \$5,000 for household incomes up to 200 percent of the Federal poverty level. Claims must be submitted within 45 days of the proclamation.

Today, we celebrate the life of Ellen Failor, who served as administrative assistant for the lowa Commission on the Status of Women for 17 years. Ellen passed away in her home in Marshalltown in June 2018. Her legacy is a remarkable record of service to others - serving several years with Vocational Rehabilitation and 17 with the ICSW, plus playing a vital role in many volunteer programs. "Count the Kicks" program is seeking participants

Nationally, 1 out of 167 pregnancies end in stillbirth. Women of color are at higher risk for stillbirth. Black women, for example, experience stillbirth at a rate of 1:94 pregnancies. Count the Kicks is committed to preventing stillbirth and eliminating racial disparities.



<u>Count the Kicks</u> is seeking pregnant African American, Asian, and Hispanic

women to participate in a video encouraging women of color to track fetal movement in their third trimester and to contact their provider if they have a concern about their baby's well-being.

Count the Kicks is an evidence-based stillbirth prevention public health program of the nonprofit Healthy Birth Day, Inc. Since its inception in 2013, Iowa's stillbirth rate has decreased 26% and went from the 33rd worst to the 3rd best stillbirth rate in the country.
