Governor recommends increase for Enrich Iowa; status report submitted

Governor Tom Vilsack highlighted several educational proposals earlier this month to be presented to the lowa legislature, including an \$800,000 increase in state funding for Enrich lowa. The increase would bring total FY2001 funding for Enrich lowa to \$1,500,000.


On January 15, 2000, the State Library submitted a status report on Enrich Iowa funding to the Governor and the Iowa General Assembly. The report included a summary of the Enrich Iowa program, an overview of how libraries used the funding, as well as a compilation of the reports from

521 public libraries.

As stated in the report, the Enrich Iowa program strengthens library services for all Iowans.

Public libraries are a part of lowa's rich heritage of quality education, supporting both formal and informal education over a lifetime. Public library boards of trustees and librarians are to be commended for their thoughtful, conscientious use of the Enrich lowa funding received in FY00. By combining these funds with local funds, grants, or donated funds, the impact was much greater than \$700,000.

Traveling displays available on loan

Three, full-color traveling displays are available from the Center for Energy and Environmental Education (CEEE) to give libraries an innovative way to promote materials in their collections.

The three-panel tabletop exhibits, developed by the CEEE at the University of Northern Iowa, are targeted at adult audiences. One is titled "Is stuff taking over your life?" The other displays are titled, "Are you in control of your money?" and "You are what you eat...What are you eating?"

"Is stuff taking over your life?" asks viewers to determine the amount of clutter in their lives and gives tips on reducing clutter. It also provides an example of how one person simplifies her life by evaluating future purchases.

"Are you in control of your money?" asks viewers to think about how they use money, includes a quiz about financial control, and provides tips for wisely saving and spending.

"You are what you eat...What are you eating?" reminds viewers that healthy lives begin with healthy foods. It provides tips for healthier eating,

including how to buy and eat more locally grown foods and how to share cooking responsibilities with friends.

The displays have been exhibited throughout the country, including California, Kansas and Iowa. Jim Rubis, director of the Fairfield Public Library, says the exhibits generate public interest.

Each display fits on a standard eight-foot table; includes handouts and other information, and is available for three weeks. The shipping and photocopying of handouts, if necessary, are the only costs for exhibiting. Master copies of handouts are provided. The shipping cost is estimated at \$15-\$25.

Census Bureau hiring now

The Census Bureau is hiring enumerators to follow-up with households that do not return their 2000 Census forms. The jobs are temporary and part-time from April to June.

Census enumerators work in their own neighborhoods or communities. In order to find people at home, Census takers need to be able to work evenings and weekends. They are trained to locate addresses, explain the purpose of the census to residents, ask questions as worded on census forms, and record data on census forms. A census enumerator meets with a Crew Leader daily to submit completed assignments.

The hourly wage may vary depending on the position, but enumerators start at \$10.75 an hour. Crew leaders start at \$12.25. Both

positions are paid for training and mileage (at \$0.31/mile).

To qualify, you must be at least 18 years old, pass a written test of basic skills, and pass a security background check. You cannot be currently employed as a law enforcement official, tax collector or tax assessor, and you must agree not to engage in any partisan political activity within 24 hours of performing census work. A reliable vehicle is required for most positions.

A complete Census count is important to every community for fair political-representation and allocation of federal and state funds. You can help make every lowan count. Please tell anyone interested about Census jobs!

lowa Commission of Libraries - Minutes December 7, 1999 State Library of Iowa

1.0 Set Agenda

4.0 A.2-Census 2000 report moved to after 2.0-Approval of Minutes. 5.0-Public Comment, and 6.0-A Evaluation of State Librarian moved to after the 3.0-Financial Report; 4.0 A.1-Orientation was moved to 4.0 B-Commission Reports. Agenda approved as amended.

2.0 Approve Minutes Minutes approve. Motion made by N. Ross, seconded by Huston

4.0 Communications

A. Special Reports

2. Census 2000 - Beth Henning Henning reviewed activities over the past two years in preparation for Census 2000. ICN presentations and meetings with local groups have been held throughout the state. Exhibits at the State Fair, the Cattle Congress, Clay County Fair and the Pork Expo, the Iowa League of Cities conference were seen by more than 1 million people. With the \$50,000 cut in the Census 2000 budget, the State Library must identify what planned activities can still be accomplished. After discussion. Bennett suggested that D. Ross write a letter asking for reconsideration on the Census 2000 budget cut because of the statewide impact of a complete count on April 1, 2000. After further discussion D. Ross will write a letter to the Governor on behalf of the Commission

3.0 Financial Report

Brinker reviewed the financial report for November 30th. At this time, on average, 40% of the budget should be spent. Open Access is 99.52% spent and will be totally distributed before the end of the year. Access Plus shows 0.00% spent, since funds are distributed only in January and July. Central Office shows only 25.81% spent because of delayed billing. The rest of the accounts are on target for this first half of the year. After discussion, Huston moved acceptance of the financial report. Second, N. Ross.

Smith distributed a news release from Governor Vilsack announcing the proposed budget cuts for the FY 2000 budget. In addition to the specific budget cuts within state agencies, a 25% cut in out of state travel is required as well as salary savings from vacancies.

5.0 Public Comment There was no public comment. A letter received from Bert Wagoner concerning creastionist materials will be included with the

6.0 Action Items

A. Evaluation of State Librarian - Personnel Committee. N. Ross and Huston met with Smith prior to the Commission meeting. The Commission is pleased with her work and encourages her to take advantage of professional growth opportunities. The Commission accepted the report of the Committee and requested assistance from State Library staff in completing and submitting paperwork.

4.0 Communications

Special Reports

3. Professional Advancement - Christie Brandau, Brandau advised the Commission. that pending Michigan legislative approval she has accepted the position of State Librarian of Michigan. She expects to tender her resignation within the next two to three months.

B. Commission Reports

1. Orientation meeting - Mary Wegner. Wegner state her pleasure at being appointed to the Commission. She and Smith attended the Governor's orientation program for new board and commission appointees. She felt the program was very good. She passed around a copy of the agenda and copy of the Vilsack/Pederson Leadership Agenda for FY 2001. D. Ross asked if there were any other reports. D. Ross - Gina Millsap is working on a pre-conference for ILA on how to deal with difficult people in the library. Bennett - lowa City Public Library is a step closer to a library expansion with an affirmative vote of city council.

C. State Librarian's Report.

- 1. Iowa Excellence Program The State Library is considering participation in this initiative this year. Eventually all agencies will be required to participate. As an initial participant, the State Library will receive more assistance and will have input into the process. The program is consistent with State Library goals.
- 2. Urban Library Council Smith is participating on an advisory committee for a grant to measure the impact of the Internet on libraries.
 - 3. Vacancy Timothy Gatti accept a

position in New York leaving a Librarian II vacancy in the Law Library. The position must be filled immediately with the legislative session approaching.

- 4. Governor's Budget Hearings -Governor is holding hearings in public libraries around the state. Each hearing will focus on one of the seven areas on the Governor's Leadership agenda. Education will be discussed on December 8th at the Davenport Public Library.
- 5. Status Report Enrich Iowa State Library has received 211 status reports thus far. State Library's report is due to the Governor and Legislature by January 15th. Regions will follow up on those libraries not responding by December
- D. Iowa Regional Library System Report - Katherine Von Wald, Central Region, Von Wald discussed the Metanoia Report on Regional Library consulting and continuing education services. The report was positive, but showed areas for improvement in each region. The Regional Trustees are working on a revised funding formula for the Regions. Once the Regional Library Trustees have determined an equitable plan, a recommendation will be made to the Governor's Office and the Legislature.

7.0 Discussion Items A. First Lady's Millennium Project - Sharman Smith. The First Lady's Millennium Project is to promote reading, libraries, and a sense of community. Five focus groups of public and school librarians were held around the state to hear what is already being done, and what needs to be done. Mrs. Vilsack hopes to begin project by the end of March or first of April. There will be six pilot communities. B. Partnership Grant Awards - Christie Brandau. Committee met to review the 18 partnership grant applications received. Ten grants were awarded ranging from Books for Babies programs to public library/school library technology to museum and library project.

Next Meeting - February 22, 2000 - State

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned at 1:40 p.m.
