Brain Injury DEFINED:

Abrain injury occurs when there is an event that results in damage to the brain anytime during a person's life after birth. Brain injuries are not degenerative, meaning they do not get worse over time. Brain injury may cause changes in a person's thinking, language skills, learning, emotions and behavior. It can also increase risk for epilepsy, Parkinson's disease and other brain disorders.


Brain injuries are often referred to as being either "acquired" or "traumatic."

Acquired Brain Injury (ABI):

Caused by stroke, toxic exposure or poisoning, lack of oxygen or traumatic injury. All brain injuries can be classified as "acquired."

Traumatic Brain Injury (TBI):

Caused by an external force to the head such as a bump, blow, jolt, penetration or blast. Concussions are a type of TBI.



What does the Advisory Council on Brain Injuries DO?

Created in 1989 by the lowa Legislature, the council meets quarterly to discuss policy issues, provide guidance to the brain injury services program, and receive updates from state agencies and stakeholders.

Activities of the council have included:

- → Statewide distribution of bicycle helmets
- → Falls prevention awareness and education
- Development of the State Plan for Brain Injuries
- Creation of brain injury resource materials
- Studying the needs of individuals with brain injury and their families
- Making policy and procedure recommendations to various state agency programs serving people with brain injuries

Members of the public may attend meetings of the Brain Injury Council and serve on its task forces. Meetings are typically held in July, October, January and April on the third Friday of the month in Des Moines. Special meetings to work on specific projects are scheduled as needed. TBI in Iowa:

Nearly 2% of people in lowa are living with longterm disabilities caused by brain injury (CDC, 2008). Leading causes of TBI in lowa are:
