# The Advocate - April 2020



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**COVID-19** has now impacted every state in the nation. Our way of life has changed. One month ago, who would have dreamed we would not be able to get a haircut or go out to dinner with friends. But these are among the many things we must forego to mitigate this virus. These mitigation practices are also impacting long-term care.

Residents/tenants and loved ones feel the impact of visiting restrictions. New ways of facilitating communication must be utilized to lessen negative impacts of these restrictions. Media has covered many stories of friends and relatives visiting with nursing facility residents through windows while talking on the phone. If you know of a resident/tenant that may be in need of a phone please check out the <u>Safelink website</u> to determine if the resident/tenant can qualify for a free phone.

Other media stories share out-of-the-box ideas to help residents deal with the temporary reality that all of us are trying to navigate. Examples include: In Algona, one gentleman walked around the facility playing the bagpipes click to view <u>KCCl's video</u>. Another KCCl <u>story</u> captured how school teachers created an Amazon wish-list for residents and tenants at two long-term care facilities in Knoxville. KCCl news segment <u>This is</u> <u>lowa</u> shows how a nursing facility in Newell received a drive-by parade of cars (*starting at 42 seconds*). KTVO showed how staff assisted a resident in a Keosauqua nursing facility to hold a <u>visit</u> via telephone call with the visitor on other side of window. KCRG showed how one assisted living program in Anamosa received <u>videos</u> addressed to tenants from out of state loved ones and community members. One nursing facility in Onawa gave a husband of a resident a room free of charge to continue visits, see the <u>Siouxlandnews</u> <u>story</u>.

The Office of the State Long-Term Care Ombudsman encourages residents, tenants and caregivers to stay well during this public health emergency. #### Communicating with residents and families about COVID-19

CMS is restricting visits due to COVID-19. This might be the perfect time to start a Family Council group to engage the families during this pandemic. You may want to start by offering a Family Council meeting via conference call or another platform like Skype, Google Duo, Google Hangouts or ZOOM. Offering information about how everyone is doing (generically), and how the facility is keeping residents safe, entertained and cared for would be great topics to cover. Another facility offered an Infection Control program via

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a Skype call and it went over so well, the Family Council group requested a second program on the same topic! Families are struggling with a way to stay connected, and using technology to make this happen is an easy solution.

Discussing the realities of COVID-19 with families and residents is a scary and daunting task, but it does not have to be difficult. This <u>link</u> provides excellent tips and suggestions for communicating with residents/tenants and families about COVID-19.



Our office recently sent each long-term care facility a check-in survey in order to gather innovative ideas for <u>six-feet apart activities</u> and <u>online activities</u> about how you are meeting your residents/tenants' needs. Thank you to all of you who took the survey! It was pleasing to hear how many long-term care facilities are utilizing social media and other virtual means to ensure residents/tenants are connected to their families during the COVID-19 pandemic. Additionally, it was heartwarming to hear how many long-term care facilities have hired additional activities staff to ensure 1:1 time is given to each resident/tenant. All departments can have a hand in 1:1 support as well. When finished with your task, share an extra minute or two with the resident or tenant. Share a joke, or just ask how they are doing. These moments mean the world to the residents/tenants.
