


State Center Used Future Ready Iowa Grant to Build a Peace Officer Pipeline



McKenna Link always admired police officers. But for a long time, her status as a 5-foot, 2-inch female with a high-pitched voice kept her from seriously considering law enforcement as a viable career opportunity.

"It's something that I completely wrote off, but it's something that I always wanted to do if given the chance," she said.

Link, at the urging of some female law enforcement acquaintances, decided to take that chance when she learned last year of a reserve peace officer training program operated though the State Center Police Department. Funded through a Future Ready lowa Grant, the two three-month academies in 2021 provided more than 50 would-be officers with free training, lodging, and in some cases child care to attend classes from across lowa.

lowa has opened another round of funding opportunities for employers, nonprofits, and educational and community groups seeking to provide high school youth with internship opportunities.

Now available for the fourth consecutive year, Future Ready lowa's Summer Youth Internship Project grants are designed to help youth explore and prepare for high-demand careers while gaining work experience the agency is involved.

"At the end of the day, we are and have been working hard to help lowans by helping them find a good job, file for unemployment benefits, helping them find workers, or helping them pay their taxes,"

Townsend said. "Keeping it simple means it's easier to recall as we go through our days."

and developing the personal attributes necessary to succeed in the workplace.

A total of \$250,000 will be available for programs this summer. **Applications must be submitted through www.lowaGrants.gov by March 2, 2022.** (See "Upcoming Events" below for a webinar link.)

Priority for funding will be given to programs that provide internships to high school youth who are at risk of not graduating, from low-income households, from communities under-represented in the lowa workforce, or who otherwise face barriers to success and upward mobility in the labor market.

Grant funds may be used for services and resources to support costs of program participants, including for example: internship wages, training resources, transportation of the participants, clothing, program staff time and indirect costs.

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
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Video: STEM in Iowa Classrooms

RCM by the Numbers



lowa Workforce Development launched its Reemployment Case Management system earlier this year to add a new sense of urgency to getting unemployed lowans back into the workforce. The new program provides most unemployment claimants with weekly assistance from an IWD Career Planner to help them assess their skills and match those skills with in-demand jobs.

IWD career planners have had more than 2,000 meetings with clients since the program started, while more than 450 claimants have left unemployment because of new careers. Click here-for-more information about RCM.


Nancy Mwirotsi sees the potential in making connections. But her drive is to make *you* see it, too.
