U OF I POISED TO LEAD WITH \$120 MILLION BIOMEDICAL CENTER.



THE UNIVERSITY OF IOWA

Plans to build a \$120 million biomedical research institute at The University of Iowa are sure to bolster the institution's prestige within the national and international biomedical research community. Named the Institute for Biomedical Discovery, the new facility will serve as an interdisciplinary research center while combining faculty from engineering, medicine and biological sciences into one building.

The new research arm will be the final piece of an aggressive three-building drive to expand the university's health science program, which includes the Carver Biomedical Research Building, completed in 2005, and the Medical Education and Research Facility, completed in 2002.

The Institute for Biomedical Discovery will involve research that could lead to discoveries in neurosciences and regenerative medicine, including such areas as stem cell research, Alzheimer's disease and muscular dystrophy. According to Steve Maravetz, director of health science relations, the state-of-the-art research facility will help the university compete more successfully for funding from the National Institutes of Health.

The ambitious project has drawn equal support from key sources, including \$30 million each from federal contributions, the state, The University of Iowa and donations. State Sen. Robert Dvorsky, D-Coralville, is a supporter of the project, saying it will have lasting benefits around Iowa. "The Institute for Biomedical Discovery will lead to endless research benefits that could find cures for disease, better procedures for health professionals and better training," he said. "This is going to make the university among the national leaders."

WIND INDUSTRY A WINDFALL FOR IOWA WORKERS.

Newton, Iowa, will soon welcome a new company to its town when TPI Composites of Warren, R.I., opens the doors to a new manufacturing facility for blades used on wind turbine electrical generators. The company plans to employ 500 people in its 316,000-square-foot factory that will manufacture the blades needed by GE Energy for its line of wind energy generators.

The new facility, which will be built at an estimated cost of \$56 million, is the latest addition to Iowa's growing wind turbine manufacturing industry. Other industry leaders with operations in the state include Clipper Windpower, Acciona Energy, and Siemens Power Generation.

TPI Chief Executive Steven Lockard said blades made at the plant will be up to 150 feet long and weigh up to 20,000 pounds. The blades will be transported by truck to wind farms within 500 to 600 miles from Newton. TPI liked Newton's workforce potential and Iowa's location in the upper Midwest, a prime location for wind energy generation because of its naturally windy conditions.

GOOGLE GEARING UP IN COUNCIL BLUFFS.



Google is proving it can process the work necessary to move and open a gigantic new data center very quickly. Since its announcement in June that it would open a new \$600 million data center in Council Bluffs, Iowa, the company has moved swiftly with both new construction and refurbishing an existing building to prepare for the start of operations. Situated on 55 acres, the building will be completed in 2009 and stocked with rows of computer servers. In addition, company officials continue to plan what to do with 130 acres near the data center site and have finalized plans to purchase another 1,000 acres south of the city.

Google is even taking an active role in joining Iowa Governor Chet Culver's efforts to recruit residents back to the area. The company is sending letters to past Iowa Western Community College graduates that express, "Google's hiring. Come on home." Said Google executive Ken Patchett, "Google's part of Iowa. Google's part of Council Bluffs. We want to move here and be a good neighbor." Prior to its 2009 opening, the company will staff up, hiring as many as possible from the Council Bluffs area. What can new employees expect to find at Google? The company is famous for a culture that is loose, informal and spontaneous. A culture Patchett refers to as "bottom-up." As he proudly stated, "It's the #1 place to work in America." The #1 place to work in America is about to draw a large number of workers to Council Bluffs.

➤ GENERATION IOWA COMMISSION CREATED.




The state of Iowa has established the Generation Iowa Commission to advise and assist the state in activities designed to attract and retain young professionals. The 15 voting members were appointed

by the governor and represent a diverse mix of age, geographic location within the state, education, and multicultural diversity. The commission produces annual reports with their findings and recommendations. The commission has held numerous open forums across the state to get input from young people on what the state can do to improve and attract people like themselves. 

Peggy Whitson Commands International Space Station. Iowa-born astronaut Peggy Whitson made history in October when she became the first woman to command the International Space Station. Whitson, 47, hails from Beaconsfield and is an accomplished biochemist with a Ph.D. from Rice University. She joined NASA as a researcher in 1989 and became an astronaut in 1996.

Her first space mission was a 185-day orbit during the Expedition 5 space flight. Whitson isn't a fan of the spotlight and prefers the attention be placed on the accomplishments of the space station. "I think the legacy of the space station will be that it is an international project and that we have built it with 16 different counties in a peaceful way," Whitson said.
