## Ross, Runge presented ILA awards

Dale Ross. chair of the Iowa Commission of Libraries and member of the Central Iowa Regional Library Board, was presented the Iowa Library Association's (ILA) Outstanding Trustee Award at the



ILA Fall Conference in October. Nominators called Ross "one of our most effective communicators with legislators at the local, state and federal levels. He speaks eloquently and is knowledgeable about issues affecting libraries." Another nominator noted that Ross is the "quintessential trustee...an expert in all areas of trustee responsibilities including policy-making, library finance, planning and advocacy...who generously shares that knowledge with other trustees."

Kay Runge, Davenport Public Library Director and President of the Public Library
Association, was named ILA's Member of the Year. It was noted that Runge "has served on many committees and task forces, and has been especially involved in advocacy and legislative activities." "She is our spokesperson for libraries because it is a passion with her, and she makes herself available to communicate with anybody, anywhere about that passion."


# ILA / IEMA complete public relations project

## First Lady announces new website

The following is a message from lowa's First Lady Christie Vilsack:

At a news conference November 21, I announced my new web site (christievilsack.org). At this site, anyone can find out about Stories 2000, my cookbook, Terrace Hill, and other projects I'm involved with.

I'm most excited about the new format for my book club, which will reappear at this site. One month, I will introduce a book or author, explain my choice, and suggest five questions. The next month I'll feature *Book Briefs*, which will mention three books briefly. For instance, one month I may suggest a mystery, a book by an Iowa author and a children's book. Another month, I might suggest the Governor's choice, a classic, and an adolescent book.

## Mixed results in library votes

With a 67 percent approval rate, Iowa City voters recently approved an \$18.4 million bond referendum for a new library addition. The new addition will add 37,000 square feet to the original library.

In Burlington, voters defeated an bond issue referendum for a new \$11.5 million, 59,248-square-foot library. The final vote 2,235 to 4,378.

I'm wondering if libraries would download a copy to make available at the circulation desk so that patrons can make a copy to take home. Patrons may use them as they wish--to share with a hometown book club or to send to a friend. I hope that's not too much trouble.

The Terrace Hill Cookbook will be out just after Thanksgiving. The cookbook is part of my Stories 2000 campaign to encourage people to read and tell their family stories. The proceeds benefit educational opportunities at Terrace Hill, including a CD-ROM virtual tour we are creating which will be available to schools and libraries. Fresh from Terrace Hill has great recipes from cooks all over the state, but it is also a storybook. The color photography makes me want to grab a fork and eat while I read. Anyone who wants an order blank can get one from the web site as well.

# Mississippi River CD-ROM available to public libraries

Iowa Public Television's Interactive-Media division is producing an educational multimedia CD-ROM for middle school students centered on the virtual experience of traveling and exploring the Mississippi River.

"Earth Trails: Mississippi River CD-ROM" is an innovative approach to computer-based instruction. Users navigate through virtual environments, gathering sounds, images, and information to create multimedia portfolios.

Users travel from the headwaters of the Mississippi River in Lake Itasca, MN, all the way to the mouth of the river in the Gulf of Mexico.

The curricular focus of the program is for students to be engaged in Social Studies, Science, Math and Language Arts.

**2.0 Welcome and Introduction**Mary Wegner introduced Pam Bradley the newest member of the lowa Commission of Libraries.

Vicki Hibbert welcomed the Commission, gave a brief overview of the new Clive Library, and announced plans for a grand opening ceremony January 25, 2001, with First Lady Christie Vilsack as the featured speaker.

Marie Harms explained the library's technology and network management software and the Pharos desktop management system.

Sharman Smith introduced Carol Simmons, secretary to the State Librarian.

#### 3.0 Approve Minutes

Motion made by Huston; seconded by Carlson to receive minutes for June 27, 2000. Motion carried.

Motion made by Bennett; seconded by Van Ekeren to receive minutes for August 22, 2000. Motion carried.

#### 4.0 Financial Report

Brinker reviewed the FY01 financial report to date. The financial report was received as presented.

#### 5.0 Communications

#### A. Commission Reports

1. Libraries for the Future - Dale Ross reported that lowa was one of

eight states that received a grant from Libraries for the Future. There will be four trustee training sessions on library advocacy around the state in May 2001.

2. ILA Conference - Huston said the conference was very good. He attended the business meeting and census update. Smith reported that Beth Henning, State Library's Census Data Coordinator, was asked to go to Washington, D.C. to check the lowa data. Mr. Huston also reported that D. Ross was named ILA's Trustee of the Year. Mary Wegner reported that a series of posters are being produced by ILA and IEMA. The first poster features Governor and Mrs. Vilsack. D. Ross reported that the American Library Association is on the verge of a five year public relations campaign.

B. State Librarian's Report - Smith reported on the building move. The east wing is not finished, but the move to third floor has begun. Smith reported that the building project is about three months behind schedule. Smith also shared a letter from General Services regarding art work and her response. She also discussed her appointment by the Governor to the lowa Technology Council. Smith was elected chair. Discussion of the purpose and responsibilities of the council followed.

Wegner reported on the Gates Foundation meeting in Seattle. Wegner also reported that 17 Library Services and Technology Act Partnership Grant applications were received and seven were selected for funding. Discussion of the selection process followed.

C. Iowa Regional Library System Report
- Jim Sixta, Northeast Iowa Regional
Library (NEIRL) represented the
Regional Libraries. He reported how
NEIRLS is using innovative ways to train
librarians for certification. Sixta
commented about the town meetings
and how much they are enjoyed by
librarians in his Region. The increase in
insurance and the impact on the
Regional Libraries budgets was
discussed. Sixta received a Governor's
Volunteer Award this year.

#### D. Special Reports

1. Stories 2000 - Mary Cameron, Youth Services Coordinator reported that seven communities are involved in the pilot project: Algona, Ames, Bayard, Belle Plaine, Cherokee, Independence and Oskaloosa. First Lady Christie Vilsack visited each pilot community, and plans to include 200 libraries in the project next year.

#### 6.0 Public Comment

Kay Elliott welcomed the Commission to the Clive Public Library and suggested they tour the facility. Elliott reported that the lowa Library Association is looking into insurance coverage for members.

#### 7.0 Action Items

A. Appointment of ILA Foundation representative - Ross will continue to serve as the Commission's representative.

B. Sub-Committee to evaluate State
<u>Librarian</u> - Ross asked that Van Ekeren,
Bennett and Huston serve on the
committee and to report at the December
meeting..

#### 8.0 Discussion Items

A. Library Services Task Force - Sandy Dixon reported on the membership of the task force and the newsletter. Dixon provided a draft of the table of contents for the final report and asked for comments. Huston and Carlson reported on their involvement as members of the Task Force.

B. FY2002 Budget Request - Smith reported on the FY2002 budget request. She discussed changes in the budget presentation and reported that state funds do not look promising in FY02. Discussion followed.

Ross moved to adjourn. Huston seconded. Adjournment at 3:00 p.m.

Cooperative Library and School Services (CLASS). Norelius Community Library, Denison Community School, St. Rose of Lima School, Zion Lutheran School.

To maximize access to library resources in community via the Internet. \$25,000.

#### <u>Collection Enhancement for Kids</u> <u>and Those Who Care for Them.</u> Northeast Iowa Community College, Calmar Public Library.

To increase resources for early childhood students, parents and children at the public library and NICC Wilder Library. \$10,117.

Partners in Literacy: Reaching Children in the Latino Community.

Marshalltown Public Library, America Reads/ISU Extension, Woodbury Elementary School, Marshalltown Community School District ESL program, St. Mary's Catholic Church Hispanic Ministry, Iowa Valley Community College Adult Continuing Education.

To establish a Latino Collection and Services Advisory Committee and increase resources and services provided to Latino youth in the community. \$6,000.

LSTA grant requests were reviewed by the LSTA Advisory Committee. The grants are intended to assist libraries in pioneering innovative service with new partners, and to provide a mechanism for sharing their experiences with other libraries.

## New information on Iowa Workforce Development Web Site

The Iowa Workforce Information Network (IWIN) on the Iowa Workforce Development's website contains a wealth of economic information that is continually updated as new and more recent data becomes available.

IWIN provides timely, accurate data to job seekers, employers, economic developers and other persons interested in labor market trends. The system allows individuals to select a geographic region for which information is needed. Data on population, occupational wages, commuting patterns, labor supply and more is available for a selected geographic area.

Persons interested in moving to lowa can also obtain current information on employment conditions from this system.

### Decorah library receives \$264,100 grant

The Decorah Public Library was recently awarded the Community Technology Centers Program Grant. The three-year grant, funded through the U.S. Department of Education, will total \$264,100 and be used to establish a technology resource and computer information center for area citizens.

Other goals include advancing the library's role of supporting family literacy, English as a second language and adult basic education; establishing an ICN point of presence; broadening the library as an educational, cultural and activity resource center for school-

age youngsters and for families proving home-school education; and sharing educational resources more fully between K-12, college and public libraries, and outside organizations and agencies. The grant will also allow for expanded career and job preparation classes, working cooperatively with Iowa Workforce Development.

The library will use in-kind matching funds consisting of existing budgetary funds and volunteer assistance that will match up to 50 percent by the end of the third year of the grant.
