

SENATE APPROPRIATIONS COMMITTEE PASSES HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES APPROPRIATIONS BILL – HF 2734

HHS Approps. Bill



The Senate Appropriations Committee passed HF 2734 (FY 2007 Health and Human Services Appropriations Bill) on April 4. The Bill appropriates a total of \$1,194.9 million from the General Fund, a net increase of \$167.1 million compared to estimated FY 2006. This includes:

- \$3.6 million for the Department of Elder Affairs, an increase of \$799,000 compared to estimated FY 2006.
- \$27.6 million for the Department of Public Health (DPH), an increase of \$1.7 million compared to estimated FY 2006.
- \$1,149.5 million for the Department of Human Services (DHS), an increase of \$169.2 million compared to estimated FY 2006.
- \$14.1 million for the Commission on Veterans Affairs and the Iowa Veterans Home, a decrease of \$4.7 million compared to estimated FY 2006.

Non-General Fund

The Bill also appropriates \$299.0 million from non-General Fund sources, a net decrease of \$54.2 million compared to estimated FY 2006. This includes:

- \$6.0 million from the Gambling Treatment Fund, which is no change compared to estimated FY 2006.
- \$146.3 million from the Temporary Assistance to Needy Families (TANF) Fund, an increase of \$3.5 million compared to estimated FY 2006.
- \$49.8 million from the Senior Living Trust Fund, a decrease of \$60.0 million compared to estimated FY 2006.
- \$379,000 from the Pharmaceutical Settlement Account, an increase of \$294,000 compared to estimated FY 2006.
- \$90.2 million from the IowaCare Account, a decrease of \$3.0 million compared to estimated FY 2006.
- \$9.4 million from the Health Care Transformation Account, an increase of \$2.2 million compared to estimated FY 2006.



Bill Passage

The Committee passed the Bill without recommendation and without amendment.

HOUSE PASSES INFRASTRUCTURE APPROPRIATIONS BILL – HF 2782

Infrastructure Bill

The House passed HF 2782 (FY 2007 Infrastructure Appropriations Bill) on April 4. The Bill appropriates a total of \$2.3 million for FY 2006, \$261.6 million for FY 2007, \$39.6 million for FY 2008, \$32.6 million for FY 2009, and \$6.7 million for FY 2010. The table below provides the total appropriations by funding source.

House Action

The House amended the Bill to include the following:

- Appropriates \$2.0 million from the Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund (RIIF) for construction and improvements to a veterinary laboratory at Iowa State University.



- Appropriates \$6.2 million from the RIF for renovation and repairs to facilities at Regents institutions.
- Appropriates \$5.0 million from the RIF to provide an endowment for professor salaries at Regents universities.
- Appropriates \$1.0 million from the RIF to the Board of Regents to provide a grant for costs associated with the construction and equipping of a protein processing facility.
- Increases the appropriation to the Department of Transportation for the Railroad Assistance Program from \$35,000 to \$235,000.
- Appropriates \$1.7 million from the Restricted Capital Fund to the Department of Public Defense for the STARCOM Project.
- Appropriates \$4.3 million from the Restricted Capital Fund to the Department of Public Safety for Regional Emergency Response Training Centers.

Ending Balance Transfer

The amended Bill transfers \$2.8 million from the FY 2006 General Fund ending balance to the Board of Regents to provide additional funding to the Regents universities in FY 2007.

Statute Changes

The House amended the Bill to include the following:

- Language prohibiting the Department of Administrative Services from spending more than \$1.0 million of appropriated funds for a construction project if the return on investment of the project is less than 5.0%, unless approved by the General Assembly. Requires the Department to submit a business plan related to the construction of a new State office building.
- Language establishing 12 Regional Emergency Response Training Centers and specifying the locations and the public agencies that will operate the centers, as well as statutory provisions related to training of emergency responders.
- Language allowing the agencies within the Department of Commerce to jointly provide for the construction of a building to house the Department of Commerce agencies and requiring the building to be a model energy-efficient building located on the Capitol Complex.

**SENATE APPROPRIATIONS COMMITTEE PASSES
INFRASTRUCTURE APPROPRIATIONS BILL – SF 2400**

Infrastructure Bill



The Senate Appropriations Committee passed SF 2400 (FY 2007 Infrastructure Appropriations Bill) on April 4. The Bill appropriates a total of \$236.1 million for FY 2007, \$30.7 million for FY 2008, \$25.3 million for FY 2009, and \$19.5 million for FY 2010. The following is a summary of the appropriation by funding source:

- \$65.0 million from the Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund (RIIF).
- \$35.0 million from the Environment First Fund.

- \$21.7 million from the Restricted Capital Fund.
- \$5.0 million from the Vertical Infrastructure Fund.
- \$104.4 million from the Endowment for Iowa's Health Restricted Capitals Fund.
- \$5.0 million from the Endowment for Iowa's Health Account.

New Funds

The Bill creates the following new funds:

- The Water and Wastewater Treatment and Community Development Financial Assistance Program to be administered by the Iowa Finance Authority. The purpose of the Program is to provide loans to enhance water quality and community development projects in Iowa.
- Establishes 12 Regional Emergency Response Training Centers, specifies the locations and the public agencies that will operate the centers, and includes statutory provisions related to training of emergency responders.
- The State Aviation Fund for the purpose of funding airport improvements. For FY 2008, 50.0% of the aircraft registration fees and 100.0% of the excise taxes on aviation fuels are deposited into the State Aviation Fund. Beginning in FY 2009, all of the aircraft registration fees and excise taxes are deposited into the Fund.
- Establishes the Marine Fuel Tax Fund and deposits the excise tax on motor fuel for watercraft into the Fund.

HOUSE PASSES BRAIN INJURY SERVICES PROGRAM BILL – HF 2772

Brain Injury Services Bill

The House passed HF 2772 (Brain Injury Services Program Bill) on April 3. The House adopted an amendment regarding the cost-share of services to consider, in lieu of requiring, financial eligibility guidelines from the Healthy and Well Kids in Iowa (*hawk-i*) Program. The Bill allocates a previously enacted appropriation for the services.

Bill Requirements

The Bill provides for implementation of the Program within the Department of Public Health and requires an eligible person to pay a cost-share for services. The Bill also requires the use of resource facilitators for Program services to link individuals to existing services and maximize private and public funding.

Mental Health Appropriation

The Bill amends the appropriation for FY 2007 Mental Health Allowed Growth funding that was contingent upon enactment of legislation establishing a Program. House File 882 (FY 2006 Standing Appropriations Act) provided \$2.4 million for the Program. The Bill reallocates the funding to the Department of Public Health for State cost-share of services, resource facilitator services, reimbursement for needs assessments, and matching federal funds and administrative costs.



Emergency Rules

The Department of Public Health is permitted to adopt emergency administrative rules to implement the Program.

HOUSE PASSES REAL ESTATE EDUCATION FUND BILL – HF 2773

Real Estate Education

The House passed HF 2773 (Real Estate Education Fund Bill) on April 3. The Bill maintains the Real Estate Education Program at the University of Northern Iowa through June 30, 2007, which is funded with approximately \$120,000 from the Real Estate Education Fund.

Committee Established



The Bill requires the Real Estate Commission to establish an Ad Hoc Committee to develop suggested curriculum for regional real estate programs to be offered through Iowa community colleges and other Iowa colleges and universities. The Committee is required to submit the suggested curriculum to the Commission by December 1, 2006, and the Commission is to submit a report to the General Assembly by December 15, 2006.

Appropriations

The Bill appropriates \$5,000 from the General Fund for Committee expenditures relating to curriculum development. Committee members may be reimbursed for actual and necessary expenses incurred but will not receive a per diem payment. The regional real estate education programs that utilize the curriculum developed by the Committee may be funded from the Real Estate Education Fund beginning in FY 2007.

HOUSE PASSES JUDICIAL BRANCH FEES AND COSTS BILL – HF 2789

Judicial Fees Bill



Revenue Impact

The House passed HF 2789 (Judicial Branch Fees and Costs Bill) on April 5. The House adopted an amendment that increases all simple misdemeanor court costs and filing fees from \$30 to \$50 and increases all indictable misdemeanor filing fees from \$30 to \$100.

The following table outlines the estimated revenue impact of increasing simple misdemeanor court costs/filing fees and indictable misdemeanor filing fees.

Fiscal Impact

House File 2789 directs the State Court Administrator to allocate \$6.0 million to the Judicial Branch for salaries and \$2.8 million to the State Public Defender's Office for indigent defense case increases of \$5 per hour. The remaining \$486,000 will be deposited into the General Fund.

SENATE PASSES HUMAN TRAFFICKING BILL – SF 2219

Human Trafficking Bill



The Senate passed SF 2219 (Human Trafficking Bill) on April 5. The Bill creates a new chapter in the Code of Iowa to outlaw human trafficking. The Bill imposes a graduated system of criminal penalties for human trafficking, ranging from a Class D to a Class B felony. The Bill requires the Iowa Law Enforcement Academy to provide training related to human trafficking to local law enforcement and to set curricula to include cultural sensitivity. Senate File 2219 states that victims of human trafficking have the same rights as other victims of crime, regardless of immigration status.

U.S. Data

According to federal estimates, there may be 18,000 to 20,000 victims of human trafficking in the U.S. each year. The number of victims in Iowa is not estimated. The U.S. Department of Justice initiated prosecutions against 59 human traffickers in FY 2004, which is the most current data available.

Correctional Impact

Senate File 2219 is not anticipated to have a significant correctional impact. It is anticipated that there will be 10 or fewer convictions under the provisions of the Bill in the next five years. These convictions will more than likely be for Class D felonies.

Fiscal Impact

The annual fiscal impact is estimated to be \$58,000. Multiple funding sources are available, including federal, State, and county funds.

HOUSE APPROPRIATIONS COMMITTEE PASSES LITTERING BILL – SF 2319

Littering Bill

The House Appropriations Committee passed SF 2319 (Illegal Dumping Fines Bill) on April 5. The Bill increases the fines for littering and illegal dumping of solid waste by the following:



- Increases the civil penalty for illegally discarding solid waste from \$500 to \$1,000.
- Increases the fine for littering or highway littering from \$35 to \$70.
- Increases the fine for littering grounds from \$15 to \$30.

Fine Distribution

The civil penalty fines will be deposited into the General Fund, with 50.0% appropriated to the Department of Transportation (DOT) for cleaning up litter and 50.0% to the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) for the Solid Waste Alternatives Program. The littering penalty fines will be deposited into the General Fund, with 50.0% appropriated to the DOT for cleaning up litter and 50.0% remaining in the General Fund.

Fiscal Impact

The estimated fiscal impact of SF 2319 is an increase of approximately \$49,000 per year to the DOT and \$44,000 per year to the DNR, with a decrease of \$93,000 to the General Fund.

HOUSE PASSES CIVIL COMMITMENT BILL – SF 2362

Civil Commitment Bill



The House passed SF 2362 on April 5. The Bill permits the court to waive, for good cause, the presence of the physician or professional at the hearing for a respondent under Chapter 125, Code of Iowa (Chemical Substance Abuse Civil Commitment Proceedings).

The Bill also requires the physician or professional to be present at the hearing for the respondent under Chapter 229, Code of Iowa (Hospitalization of Persons with Mental Illness) and provides a waiver of this requirement. The Bill permits the court to allow the physician to testify by telephone for either type of civil commitment proceeding.

Fiscal Impact

There may be savings to the counties and the Department of Human Services (DHS) under the amendment to Chapter 125, Code of Iowa; however, the potential savings cannot be estimated due to a lack of data.

Impact on Counties



The amendment to Chapter 229, Code of Iowa, carries a potential cost increase to the counties and the DHS. Currently, doctors are not required to testify at the hospitalization proceeding, either in person or by telephone. The fiscal impact on the counties ranges from zero, if waivers are granted at every hearing, to \$1.5 million, if doctors are required at every hearing.

Impact on the DHS

The General Fund impact on the DHS ranges from zero, if waivers are granted at every hearing, to \$300,000 if a physician is required to be in attendance.

HOUSE PASSES PUBLIC PENSION OMNIBUS BILL – HF 729

Public Pension Bill

The House amended and passed HF 729 (Public Pension Omnibus Bill) on April 4. The Bill makes several changes to the Iowa Public Employees Retirement System (IPERS) and the Iowa Judicial Retirement System.

IPERS Fiscal Impact

Under the Bill, the current regular employee contribution of 3.70% and employer contribution of 5.75% will begin to increase in FY 2008 as follows:

The estimated total for employer increases is \$17.0 million for FY 2008 and \$35.3 million for FY 2009, as shown in the table below.


Judicial Retirement Impact

The Bill also makes various changes to the Judicial Retirement System. Under the Bill, the State will be required to contribute \$5.3 million (23.7% of covered payroll), and the Judges will contribute \$1.3 million (6.0% of covered payroll). Of the total funding, the State will contribute 80.3% and the Judges will contribute 19.7%.

If the General Assembly notwithstanding the 23.7% contribution rate and the State continues to contribute \$2.0 million, this will be 9.16% of covered payroll. The Judges will be required to contribute \$506,000 (2.28% of covered payroll), and the State will contribute 79.81%. If this occurs, the Judges will be contributing 20.19% of the total funding.

Years of Service

The Judges' contributions will increase by an estimated \$222,000 annually, due to increasing their contribution from 5.0% to 6.0%. Reducing the number of years of service a judge must have in order to receive an unreduced retirement allowance from the current 25 years to 20 years will have an estimated negative annual impact on the System of \$559,000.



Increasing the multiplier that is used to determine the retirement payment from 3.00% to 3.25% per year of service and increasing the maximum percentage of the Judge's salary that payments are based on from 60.0% to

65.0% will have an estimated negative annual impact on the System of less than \$1.5 million.

If the State makes the required contribution to the System, that will add an estimated \$3.3 million annually. The net benefit to the Judicial Retirement System will be an estimated \$1.4 million annually.

**HOUSE PASSES HEALTH CARE LICENSING BOARD
FUNDING BILL – HF 2748**

License Fee Bill



The House passed HF 2748 (Health Care Licensing Board Funding Bill) on April 3. The Bill provides for the retention of fees collected by the Boards of Dental, Nursing, Medical, and Pharmacy Examiners, the Boards under the Professional Licensure Division, and the Bureau of Radiological Health within the Department of Public Health, beginning in FY 2008.

The Bill also requires that appropriations from fees charged for birth registrations for primary and secondary child abuse prevention programs and for the Center for Congenital and Inherited Disorders Central Registry not be transferred, used, obligated, appropriated, or otherwise encumbered.

Current Law

Under current law, the health care and professional licensure Boards collect and deposit licensure fees into the General Fund, with the exception of amounts permitted to be retained for rent costs or other purposes. Each Board then receives a percentage of the fees deposited into the General Fund through the annual appropriation for Public Protection to the Department of Public Health to support the Boards' operations and activities.

The Boards do not receive 100.0% of the amounts deposited into the General Fund; therefore, there is a net benefit to the General Fund each year, which pays for indirect Board costs and other State government activities.



The Bureau of Radiological Health charges fees for the registration of radiation machines and to those who hold a radioactive materials license to inspect radioactive materials and machines. Under current law, the Bureau deposits the majority of these fees into the General Fund and retains and receives a total of 97.8% of the fees back through the annual appropriation for Public Protection to the Department of Public Health to support the Bureau's operations.

Fiscal Impact

House File 2748 will result in an estimated net decrease in General Fund revenues of \$1.3 million beginning in FY 2008.

HOUSE APPROPRIATIONS COMMITTEE PASSES STATE EDUCATION STANDARDS BILL – HF 2792

Education Standards Bill

The House Appropriations Committee passed HF 2792 (State Education Standards Bill) on April 5. The Bill requires the Department of Education to conduct a study of the advantages and disadvantages of existing statute and administrative rule related to K-12 content, performance, and graduation standards, and to make recommendations for policy adjustments.



The Bill further requires the Department to determine methods for supporting and coordinating the efforts of school districts in implementing the core curriculum and to develop language to explain current K-12 education standards in a statewide context. The Bill requires the Department to submit a progress report to the General Assembly by January 1, 2007, with a final report and recommendations due by July 1, 2007.

Fiscal Impact

The cost of implementing HF 2792 is estimated to be \$130,000 in FY 2007, which includes 2.0 FTE positions for an education consultant and support staff. The Bill does not include an appropriation for this purpose. Without additional funding for the Department of Education, the Bill will result in a reallocation of resources within the Department's budget.

AGING SERVICES CABINET MEETING

Cabinet Meeting

The Aging Services Cabinet met on March 31.

Gov. Proposals

Josh Mandelbaum, Governor's Office, provided an update on the status of the Governor's FY 2007 budget proposals.

Medicaid

Eileen Creager, Department of Human Services, provided an update on the Medicaid Health Transformation Initiatives.

Health Initiatives

Director Mary Hansen, Department of Public Health, provided information on the Fit for Life State Plan, Healthy America Initiative, and the Healthy America 2010 Plan and how these initiatives impact senior health through fitness, nutrition, and healthy lifestyle choices.

DIA Initiatives



Director Steve Young, Department of Inspections and Appeals, reported that more than 80 stakeholders and long-term care providers attended the second DIAlogue forum in December to discuss regulatory oversight issues.

Director Young also discussed Green House Projects, which are a new model of long-term care for seniors. Green Houses are group homes that use a social model of care and maximize staff empowerment to serve those needing skilled care.
