Governor Thanks Iowans at "Fun in the Sun"

Governor Chet Culver and Lt. Governor Patty Judge thanked those involved in the winter and spring disaster operations at an event on Saturday, June 23, in Des Moines.

The "Fun in the Sun" event was held on the lawn of Terrace Hill. The Governor and Lt. Governor offered their heart-felt thanks to all who had worked to help citizens who were affected by the disasters.

"Clearly, the Governor and Lt. Governor understand the efforts made by everyday Iowans to help protect their communities," said Iowa Homeland Security and Emergency Management Division Administrator David Miller.

Hundreds of Iowans, including county emergency management coordinators, first responders, and staff from utility companies and government agencies, along with their families, were treated to plenty of food, music, crafts, games, and dancers.

Federal Disaster Assistance Request Denied

On Friday, June 22, federal officials notified Governor Chet Culver that a request for a Presidential Disaster Declaration for Louisa and Muscatine Counties was denied. Denial of a disaster declaration means FEMA federal programs will not be available to residents and public entities affected by the June 1 tornadoes in those counties.

"I am very pleased with local and state cleanup efforts and assistance to those affected by the tornadoes. Iowans always come together and help each other during difficult times, and the response to the tornadoes in southeast Iowa was no different," Culver said. "With many Iowa families still a long way away from rebuilding their homes, I am disappointed that FEMA has denied our request for disaster relief. However, we will do everything we can at the state and local level to continue offering assistance to those in need," he emphasized.

Assistance for May Storms Reaches \$3.9 Million

Activity for the May severe weather and flooding in southwest Iowa is winding down in some areas, but remains at a hectic pace in others.

A request to add Audubon, Crawford and Monona Counties to the Presidential Disaster Declaration for Individual Assistance was approved by FEMA on Friday, June 22. These three counties were already covered for Public Assistance under an earlier declaration. Damage assessments in Guthrie, Adams and Ringgold Counties were completed but eligible damages were not high enough to request a Presidential Disaster Declaration.

Individual Assistance Recap

As of June 21, a total of 1,348 Iowans have requested Individual Assistance in the 12 counties that had been, at that time, designated for this program. A total of \$1,944,604 has been approved which includes housing assistance and other needs assistance. The Small Business Administration has approved \$1,625,399 in low-interest loans.

The Disaster Recovery Center (DRC) in Atlantic has been closed because of low levels of activity. The Mobile DRC is open in Shelby County through Wednesday, June 27. Public Assistance Recap

It is estimated that there will be just over 600 project worksheets, which estimate the scope and cost of projects, for this disaster. Most of the preliminary work has been completed and now the government agencies eligible under this program are completing the worksheets. As of June 21, \$358,329 has been obligated for the 18 counties eligible under the declaration.

Enhanced Mitigation Plan Pays Off

Because Iowa has an approved enhanced mitigation plan, the state is going to receive additional mitigation dollars. Iowa is one of 11 states with an approved enhanced plan and that will mean the state will receive an extra 25 percent, or some \$5 million dollars, in mitigation funds.

Presidential Disaster Declarations Trigger Plan Review

Counties that received a Presidential Disaster Declaration for severe storms, flooding and tornadoes that occurred May 5-7 must review, update, and recertify their Part B mitigation and Part C recovery plans.

The Iowa Administrative Code requires Parts B and C of countywide emergency operations plans to be reviewed, updated, and recertified by the county emergency management commission, and then submitted to HSEMD within 180 days of the formal closing of the disaster incident period. This is important because Iowa law says state participation in financial assistance in a presidentially-declared disaster is contingent upon the local government having on file a state-approved, comprehensive, countywide plan. November 3, 2007, is the deadline for declared counties to submit their recertified Parts B and C plans.

Marshall County Exercises Mass Casualty Response

Marshall County Emergency Management assisted in the planning and execution of a full-scale exercise of the county's new mass casualty incident response system on June 10.

The exercise, sponsored by the Marshall County Emergency Medical Services Association (MCEMSA), simulated a school bus accident involving 30 students and five adults. County volunteer first responders participated in the exercise.

"Working in the incident command structure simultaneously was a learning experience for many of the participating agencies," said Marshall County Emergency Management Coordinator Deanna Bachman. "This exercise also helped our responders see how all the NIMS training can be put to use in real situations."

"The responders did a great job practicing incident and medical command," said MCEMSA President Kim Elder. "Community volunteers also helped tremendously by playing victims and members of the media."

A total of 117 people participated in the exercise. Volunteers ranged from Boy Scouts to children and friends of responders.

HSEEP Train-the-Trainer Course Well Attended

Twenty-nine local and state responders attended the Homeland Security Exercise and Evaluation Program (HSEEP) Train-the-Trainer course held June 6-9.

The course provided attendees background on HSEEP, a recently updated federal methodology for the design, conduct and evaluation of exercises. The four-day course covered exercise-specific materials as well as teaching techniques. This was the only HSEEP Train-the-Trainer course Iowa expects to hold.

The attendees for the course represented varied backgrounds, including a retired fire chief, paramedics, emergency managers, the Civil Air Patrol and various state and regional government staff. Each of Iowa's CDC/Hospital Preparedness Regions also sent regional staff to the training to develop a joint exercise methodology between emergency management, public health and hospitals. In addition to the Iowa attendees, the State of Nebraska sent a participant to take the training back home.

More details on the rollout of the new HSEEP will be shared at the Governor's Homeland Security Conference July 16-18, and later at regional homeland security meetings. The goal is to start rolling out the new training course in early fall across all disciplines.
