It is a day of surpassing importance to the peoples of the United States and of the world. In the midst of war and in the midst of our celebrations of this important occasion, let each liberty-loving, true American take time to pause and reflect upon the tremendous sacrifices which the men and women of this generation, have made and are making, in order that man might be free. Let us rededicate our thought and our effort toward the preservation of every American's most precious heritage - FREEDOM - and resolve that we shall individually, and as a Nation, endeavor to bring its Light and its Blessings to mankind everywhere.

IN TESTIMONY WHEREOF, I have hereunto set my hand and caused to be affixed, the Great Seal of the State of Iowa.
