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Amusement Park Safety Reminders

Many families will be visiting amusement parks this summer. Amusement parks and carnivals can be a fun and safe experience but only if riders pay attention and follow all the safety rules.

- Take responsibility for your own safety. There are no mandatory child safety regulations on amusement park rides. Iowa does inspect rides but it's up to you to make sure you and your family are following the rules.
- Don't board a ride that looks unsafe - even though parks and carnivals pay attention to safety, exceptions can occur. Make sure to follow your instincts and don't ride something that troubles you.

- Keep your arms, legs, feet and head inside the ride at all times - sometimes, hands and feet that are dangling out of the car can get caught between the moving car or surrounding structures. Make sure seat belts and lap bars are locked tight - ask for help from the ride operator if you need help.
- Parents should be aware many rides approved for children are designed to fit adult bodies and may leave small riders vulnerable to falls or forceful ejections. Make sure you pay attention to the posted weight and height restrictions.

Statewide Unemployment Data

Iowa's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate jumped to 5.8 percent in May from 5.1 percent in April, confirming the labor market's current weakness. The state's jobless rate stood at 4.0 percent for the same month one year ago. The U.S. unemployment rate reached 9.4 percent in May, up from 8.9 percent in April, and 5.5 percent in May 2008.

"A surge in new labor force entrants combined with a drop in employment pushed the state's unemployment rate to a 22-year high in May," said

Elisabeth Buck, director of Iowa Workforce Development. "While unemployment may continue to rise for some time, job losses are expected to progressively lessen in the months ahead."

The total number of working Iowans dropped to 1,583,100 in May from 1,589,900 in April. Total employment was 25,400 higher in May 2008 at 1,608,500.

This is the highest level of unemployment experienced in the state since July 1986, when the number was reported at 97,700.

Community Partnership working to remove employment barriers

Over the last year, Iowa Workforce Development and the Waterloo Commission on Human Rights met with several community sources to address continued divide and gaps in unemployment ratio's between blacks and whites in the Cedar Valley area.

Multiple strides have been made in removing these barrier issues. The task force recently announced the following milestones:

- Career Access Points have been established including the Eastside Ministerial Alliance (EMA), Jubilee Church (the HUB), and other sites are in the works. Job coaches and volunteers have

been identified in assisting the process at the centers. If interested in joining as a volunteer contact the local IWD Office.

- Tax Credits; the task force has identified over 190 employers in the region that have utilized tax credits available to employers for the hiring of ex offenders and welfare recipients. The task force continues to develop instruments and a comprehensive plan to encourage employers in this area.

- The task force worked to identify resources available to fund youth employment projects. Fortunately, the

economic stimulus package included funding for the region to create an estimated 150 youth jobs for this summer. The program is being administered by Hawkeye Community College low@Work.

The task force will continue to meet in order to address ongoing issues, set targets and goal and to implement additional strategies. If you are interest in more information or would like to join the task force, contact the Waterloo Workforce Center at (319) 291-2546.


IWD Proudly Supports Food Bank of Iowa
