Unemployment Services

Iowa Workforce Development offers assistance for workers who have been laid-off. From unemployment benefits to job search workshops, Iowa Workforce offices are here to help during this time of uncertainty.

Employees who are laid-off may be entitled to unemployment benefits after any severance package runs out.

In addition to unemployment, regional workforce offices offer a wide-range of workshops on a rotating basis. These workshops help to meet the immediate needs of Iowans in transition. The topics include dealing with job loss, financial management,

applying for financial aid, résumé development, job search methods and tips on keeping a job in today's environment.

Many IWD offices have resource centers that provide information on how to create different types of résumés and cover letters. Word processing software and IWD staff are also available to assist you with the preparation of a résumé or cover letter. Services are designated for beginners and for more advanced users. Job seeking and skill videos and career information are available to help prepare the job seeker for the process of finding and landing that new job.

Statewide Unemployment Data

Iowa's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate edged up slightly to 6.7 percent in November from a revised October rate of 6.6 percent. The state's jobless rate was 4.3 percent one year ago. The U.S. unemployment rate fell to 10.0 percent in November from 10.2 percent in October, as employers cut the smallest number of jobs since the recession began.

"Iowa's labor market continued to show signs of stabilizing with the November numbers," said Elisabeth Buck, director of Iowa Workforce Development.

"However, it will take some time before Iowa can achieve a healthy and sustainable recovery."

The statewide estimate of unemployed workers rose to 113,100 in November from 112,000 in October. The level of unemployed was reported at 72,800 for the same month one year ago.

The total number of working Iowans decreased to 1,570,200 in November from 1,573,400 in October. The year ago figure of 1,604,900 was 34,700 higher than the current estimate.

My Iowa UI: An Updated Unemployment Tax Filing System

Iowa's Unemployment Insurance Tax program is getting a new online filing system, called My Iowa UI. The development of My Iowa UI was based in part on feedback we have received from staff, employers and other 3rd party filers. This new system will improve on the functionality of the Unemployment Insurance Tax System and replace a system that is approaching 40 years of age.

My Iowa UI gives employers, accountants

and other 3rd party filers the power to manage their tax account securely and conveniently. Some of the functions include:

- Submission of Quarterly Reports
- Making and Scheduling Payments
- Viewing and Updating Account Information
- Viewing Historic Information
- Adding Multiple Users

My Iowa UI will be available to all employers for 1st quarter 2010 filing in April. You may register by going to www.myiowaui.org.

Important registration instructions and information regarding unemployment insurance tax changes will be mailed to all Iowa employers in March 2010.
