### National Listeria outbreak update

To date, 123 persons from 26 states have become ill with one of the four outbreak-associated strains of *Listeria monocytogenes*. Five more cases were identified in the past week, including the first reported case in Pennsylvania. Colorado has the highest number of known cases with 34. Only one case has been reported in Iowa.

*Listeria* contamination can occur in a wide variety of foods including soft cheeses, unpasteurized milk, ready-to-eat deli meats, hot dogs, undercooked poultry, and unwashed raw vegetables. Last week, a voluntary recall of 2,154 cases of bagged salads due to *Listeria* contamination was announced. No cases of illness have been reported related to this recall.

Earlier this year, the National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health (NIOSH) performed an investigation of workplace exposures to acrolein, carbon monoxide, and chemotherapy drugs in an inpatient oncology unit.
