Iowa e-Health Plan Receives Federal Approval

The Iowa Department of Public Health (IDPH) has received notice the Iowa e-Health Strategic and Operational Plan has been approved by the federal Office of the National Coordinator for Health Information Technology (ONC). This releases \$8,375,000 in funding over the next four years to implement a health information exchange (HIE) in Iowa.
