#### Study: Girls as young as 6 want to be "sexy"

A strong majority of girls between the ages of 6 and 9 years old want to be "sexy" and associate being sexy with popularity, suggests a new study by psychologists at Knox College in Illinois. In the study, 60 elementary school girls were given two dolls -- one dressed in revealing clothing and the other dressed in trendy but loose clothing -- and asked questions such as which doll they more wanted to look like, and which doll appeared more popular.

# Women, girls light spark to challenge media portrayals

Women need to remain cognizant of the effects media's portrayal of females has on their psyche and that of young girls. Nonprofit organizations have joined with young girls to support the SPARK! campaign to stand against media's sexualization of women and girls, and have already scored a victory with Seventeen magazine.

## SAMHSA Releases Toolkit for Suicide Prevention in High Schools

The <u>Suicide Prevention Resource Center</u> of the <u>Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services</u> <u>Administration</u> (SAMHSA) has released "Preventing Suicide: A Toolkit for High Schools." The toolkit provides strategies to help high schools, school districts, and their partners design and implement strategies to prevent suicide and promote behavioral health among their students. It also includes information on screening tools, warning signs and risk factors, statistics, and parent education materials.

The toolkit is free and available online.

### <u>Depression Rates Triple between the Ages of</u> 12 and 15 among Adolescent Girls

A new report shows that the percentage of girls who experience a major depressive episode in the past year triples between the ages of 12 and 15 (from 5.1 percent to 15.2 percent respectively). The report by the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) also shows that an annual average of 1.4 million adolescent girls aged 12 to 17 experienced a major depressive episode in the past year. In addition, the report reveals that adolescent girls aged 12 to 17 are three times more likely to have experienced a major depressive episode in the past year than their male counterparts (12 percent versus 4.5 percent).

#### National Center for Juvenile Justice Releases Juvenile Court Statistics 2009

The National Center for Juvenile Justice (NCJJ) has released "Juvenile Court Statistics 2009." The report profiles more than 1.5 million delinquency cases and more than 140,000 status offense cases that courts with juvenile jurisdiction processed in 2009. The report also tracks trends in delinquency and petitioned status offense cases over several decades. Data include volume of cases, demographics of juveniles involved, and offenses charged.

### <u>Harrods' new "Toy Kingdom" department is</u> <u>gender-neutral</u>

London's Harrods department store is no longer dividing toys into separate categories for boys and girls. The retail establishment now has a gender-neutral "Toy Kingdom" department, measuring 26,000 square feet divided into "Dreamscapes."

#### Female athletes use sports to change the game

Forty years after Title IX changed U.S. sports programs, game-changing pioneers continue to chip away at the remaining gender barriers that exist in athletics in the U.S., and around the world. Olympic gold medalist Angela Ruggiero will take over as president of the Women's Sports Foundation next year, and Awista Ayub, who founded the Afghan Youth Sports Exchange, will work to use sports as a means of conflict resolution in war-ravaged areas with Seeds of Peace.
