Flu update

Influenza incidence activity in Iowa has increased from regional to widespread. For this reporting week, the State Hygienic Laboratory (SHL) confirmed a total of 118 cases of seasonal influenza from Iowa's sentinel system, including 63 influenza A (H3), 48 influenza A (subtyping pending), and seven influenza B. The percent of both influenza and respiratory syncytial virus (RSV) rapid tests that tested positive increased from previous weeks. The number of influenza-associated hospitalizations also increased and there were 23 cases reported from sentinel hospitals for this reporting period.

The State Hygienic Laboratory has identified three strains of influenza - influenza A (H3N2), 2009 H1N1, and influenza B - circulating in Iowa. The increasing number of flu cases is a strong reminder that it is time to get vaccinated. All Iowans over 6 months of age are encouraged to get vaccinated against the flu to protect themselves and those around them from illness.

To ensure protection from influenza during the holidays, get vaccinated now. Because of travel and socializing with family and friends, the holidays can be a time of high risk for getting the flu. Because it can take up to two weeks for full protection to develop after vaccination, now is the time for anyone not yet immunized to be vaccinated.

The "stomach flu" is NOT the flu

Currently, both norovirus and influenza activity are ongoing across the state. Norovirus is the major cause of gastrointestinal illness and outbreaks in Iowa, and is often mistakenly referred to as "stomach flu." While these two illnesses are completely different and caused by unrelated viruses, people often expect the influenza vaccine to prevent norovirus, complaining that "I had the flu shot but got the stomach flu anyway."

Please help the public understand the difference between norovirus and influenza and let's all stop using the term "stomach flu."

Carbon monoxide exposure during winter weather

Carbon monoxide (CO) is an odorless, colorless, poisonous gas that can cause sudden illness and death. Risks of CO poisoning may increase during severe winter storms, since power outages occur and alternative sources of heat (such as charcoal grills) may be used indoors. Risk of winter CO poisoning can also occur when cars are idled in attached garages to "warm them up." Before idling a car to warm it up, back out of an attached garage.

Symptoms and signs of carbon monoxide poisoning include headache, dizziness, weakness, nausea, vomiting, chest pain, and altered mental status. The Iowa Statewide Poison Control Center (800-222-1222) offers 24/7 consultation to the public and physicians on CO treatment.
