Performance Results Achieved in State Fiscal Year 2009 (July 1, 2008 – June 30, 2009)

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## INTRODUCTION

The mission of the Iowa College Student Aid Commission is to advocate for, and provide a continuum of services to support, Iowa students and families as they explore and finance educational opportunities beyond high school. In the more than 40 years of its existence, the Commission has helped make higher education possible for thousands of Iowa students. The agency administers Iowa General Fund appropriations for need-based scholarships, grants, and work study opportunities, and advocates on behalf of Iowa students in the public policymaking process. The Commission administers the Federal Family Education Loan Program for Iowa and serves as the program's designated guaranty agency for the state. Loans made through this program help students and their families pay postsecondary education expenses. In addition, the Commission offers research, outreach, and direct assistance to postsecondary education professionals and to the public. Consistent with the agency's mission, these services relate to college access, financial literacy, professional training, regulatory compliance, and the prevention of student loan defaults. The Commission's services to the public help students and their families plan, prepare, and pay for college.

To leverage its efforts, the Commission has sought and obtained federal grant funding for key projects. The Commission administers *GEAR UP lowa*, a competitively-awarded six-year federal grant which provides academic support and assistance in postsecondary planning to students attending high-poverty middle- and high schools in the state. Grant activities are designed to raise the college-going expectations of low-income students and their academic preparedness for college. In addition, fifty percent of grant funds are used to fund college scholarships for GEAR UP students. Also in fiscal 2009, the agency continued to receive support from the federal College Access Challenge Grant for development and implementation of the IHaveaPlanlowa web portal, and other agency outreach services.

In Fiscal Year 2009, the Commission began implementation of the IHaveaPlanlowa web portal. The web portal helps promote a culture of student achievement and collegegoing aspirations across the state by providing resources related to postsecondary education, financial aid, and career preparation. The web portal promotes awareness of educational opportunities, helps to recruit students into postsecondary options and, by reinforcing academic readiness, ultimately supports postsecondary educational attainment.

The agency continues to expand its capabilities and services to address the needs of students, families, colleges and universities, student loan lenders, and others in the higher education community. The following report provides results of the Iowa College Student Aid Commission goals and results for state fiscal year 2009 (July 1, 2008 to June 30, 2009).


- Education through the administration of scholarship, grant and loan programs

The lowa College Student Aid Commission performance report highlights three areas of effort that help students and parents prepare for and pay for college.


#### **Iowa Tuition Grants:**

The Iowa College Student Aid Commission administers the Iowa Tuition grant program, one of several state programs that help provide access and choice to Iowa families pursuing higher education. Students who receive tuition grants are able to attend private colleges and universities that best serve their individual needs. Two separate appropriations fund grants to students at not-for-profit and for-profit institutions.




#### **Iowa Vocational-Technical Tuition Grants:**

The Iowa Vocational-Technical Tuition Grant program promotes access and choice to Iowa families pursuing higher education; it provides financial assistance to students attending Iowa community colleges. Iowa Vocational-Technical Tuition Grants also encourage students to pursue highly-skilled, technical careers. Some 3,211 Iowa students received such grants in FY 2009. The Iowa College Student Aid Commission administers the Iowa Vocational-Technical Tuition Grant program



### **College and Career Planning**


In Fiscal Year 2009, the Commission began implementation of the *IHaveaPlanlowa* web portal. The web portal provides continued access to the same online college and career planning resources that the Commission has coordinated for several years, as well as to an expanded range of online resources. ## PERFORMANCE PLAN RESULTS

#### **Overview of Performance Plan Results**

The lowa College Student Aid Commission promotes postsecondary education for lowa students and families by administering a variety of scholarship, grant and forgivable loan programs. Postsecondary education is crucial to economic opportunity in the 21st century—the key to competitiveness in an increasingly knowledge-based global economy and the primary source of the skills required for virtually all well-paying careers. Studies of the effect of college attendance suggest that those who have graduated from college experience greater income and more healthy, productive lives. The lowa College Student Aid Commission exists to advocate for and provide a continuum of services to support lowa students and their families as they explore and finance postsecondary educational opportunities.

In 2008-09, the lowa College Student Aid Commission provided scholarship and grant support to 26,686 lowa college and university students, and more than 78,000 student loan borrowers. Although many were served, there were many more students who could have benefitted from assistance. Some 145,000 lowans applied for financial aid for the 2008-2009 academic year. The Commission remains committed to provide sufficient scholarship and grant assistance to promote access to postsecondary education.
