#### **Quality Rating System for Iowa**

A collaborative effort is underway to develop a proposed voluntary Quality Rating System (QRS) for child care in Iowa. A work group has developed an initial draft of criteria describing each of the levels of the rating for both child care centers and child development homes. There will be a number of ways input will be collected. First, parent input will be sought through focus groups convened across the state by the State Public Policy Group (SPPG).

Secondly, in August, the SPPG will facilitate five meetings using various ICN sites to gather broad community input. The third way input will be solicited is through an on-line survey, for both child care professionals and parents. #### The State Agency Liaison Team

The State Agency Liaison Team includes management representatives from the Departments of Public Health, Human Services, Human Rights, and Education, Governor's policy staff, ISU Extension and Child Health Specialty Clinics. Their role is to provide leadership within state government to promote and implement system changes for early childhood supports and services based on the recommendations of the Early Childhood Iowa Stakeholders Group. The group also advises this stakeholders group on the development and implementation of Iowa's Early Care, Health and Education System.

The State Agency Liaison team members recently met. They felt it was very important that they are part of the system building at a level where they could see how decisions would affect their agency. They see this as a key point in moving towards an early care, health, and education system and being proactive to those system building efforts within their individual agencies.

During the recent meeting, the group expressed the need for the Stakeholders to produce an inventory (map) of what is currently happening in early childhood. This would help with knowing what is happening or to better align efforts. This product is currently in development.

From a governance perspective, the group identified the important benefits both directly and indirectly that impact their agencies. Being strategic about prioritization of the identified strategies is key to the next steps in system development.

#### Update on the Iowa Department of Public Health's Early Childhood Comprehensive Systems (ECCS) Building Grant

We are happy to announce that the Notice of Award was received this month and the second year in the planning phase of Iowa's Early Care, Health & Education system has been fully funded! Planning is already underway to move to the implementation phase next fiscal year.

#### Update on the work of Early Childhood Iowa Stakeholders

Early Childhood Iowa Stakeholders continue to meet to move the early care, health and education system building initiative forward. This groups serves as an advisory body to the ECCS Grant. Much work is being conducted through the system component workgroups.

Representatives from the Governance Component group are attending an Early Childhood Governance Workshop in North Carolina in August. The Quality Services and Programs Component group is working on bringing together leaders at the state and local level in the field of family support later this fall. At the August Stakeholders meeting, we are looking forward to hearing about the early childhood "financing the system" study in which Charlie Bruner, UEN, and the Resources and Funding Component group have been collaborating their efforts. Leslie Anderson, Smart Start Consultant from North Carolina, will be working with the Early Childhood lowa Stakeholders to prioritize the goals and strategies of the early care, health, and education system. This is an exciting time for the future of children 0-5 years and those who serve them in Iowa!

#### Public input is needed Iowa Early Learning Standards Update

The work of the Writing Committee for the lowa Early Learning Standards continues. In this update, we would like to share with you their progress. In order to make sure we are all thinking about the same "standards" these are the "child" standards that describe what children should know and be able to do.

As a part of the development of the lowa Early Learning Standards, the process of seeking public input on the **draft** standards is in progress. Focus groups continue to be held throughout the state, thanks to our Head Start Association and Child Care Resource and Referral partners, as well as many others hosting these opportunities for input! In October, the information from the focus groups and surveys will be analyzed so that the Writing Committee can utilize the feedback to make any necessary changes to the standards.

The online survey also offers a mechanism to provide in-depth feedback for each of the standards and benchmarks per area. In addition, please encourage your colleagues to complete the survey or attend a focus group! We have extended the timeline for completing the survey to October 1. # New Kindergarten Assessment Tool Announced

## Children Ready to Succeed in School Moving to a New Assessment Tool in Kindergarten

At the lowa Empowerment Board meeting in July, the lowa Department of Education (DE) presented information about a new tool that DE is proposing to be used to measure the progress toward the result, "Children Ready to Succeed in School." Beginning in the fall of 2004, the DE will no longer be using the Kindergarten Perception Survey to measure the developmental gains in children. While the survey provided a perception of the students' skills upon entering kindergarten, the DE continued to explore alternative methods of assessment in order to provide more precise information of individual students.

After much study and discussion with experts in assessment, the DE is ready to move forward with a new assessment tool this fall called the "Dynamic Indicators of Basic Early Literacy Skills" (DIBELS). This is a standardized, individually administered measure of early literacy development. By using the DIBELS, lowa will be able to monitor the development of pre-reading and early reading skills that are indicators for early reading success. Kindergarten teachers will have access to individual student results and state and Community Empowerment Areas can aggregate the data.

There are some cautions and limitations for using this tool. DIBELS isn't a comprehensive assessment but solely an indicator of literacy skills. Multiple assessment approaches will be needed at the local level to monitor the various aspects of children's development (i.e. motor, social-emotional, self-management). Local districts and empowerment areas are encouraged to use more comprehensive assessment procedures at the local level for the purpose of making decisions about teaching and learning. The lowa Empowerment Board will take action on adopting the DIBELS as a tool to track the statewide indicator that states, "Children entering kindergarten are ready for school" at the next Board meeting in September.

### **Community Empowerment Iowa Empowerment Board Meeting Site Invitation**

  - Options of lodging accommodations near by;

  - Information on field trip options (at least 4) to local empowerment-supported programs the afternoon of the meeting date.
- 3. Once selected, the top two applicants will work with the Community Empowerment Community Liaison to finalize the schedule and details.
- 4. Notice of this process, as well as the awardees, will be posted on the State Empowerment website.
- 5. Community Empowerment Areas wishing to apply are encouraged to submit an application of not more than three pages in length, along with 4 copies.



# DEALING WITH BULLIES AND CHILDREN WHO ARE OUT OF CONTROL

# What's A Parent To Do? Helping Families Deal With Bullying and With Kids Who Are Out Of Control

Studies reveal that aggressive behavior problems are prevalent in approximately 10% of preschool and elementary age children. In socio-economically disadvantaged children, this figure is close to 25% (Rimm-Kaufman et al., 2000; Webster-Stratton, 1998). Without early intervention, these behaviors become risk factors for academic problems, school drop out and anti-social behaviors (Snyder, 2001; Trembray et al., 1996). Preventing and reducing aggressive behaviors early on is a cost-effective means to preventing early conduct problems from becoming more serious issues. Strengthening children's capacity to manage their emotions and behaviors and make meaningful friendships help position children for school success (Webster-Stratton & Reid, 2004) and prevent aggressive behavior problems.

Bullying is a form of aggressive behavior and affects children every day - as victims, victimizers, or bystanders- and can have long-term effects. Approximately 15% of students are either bullied regularly or are initiators of bullying behavior (Olweus, 1993). Children who are bullied have lower self-esteem and greater incidents of depression, and loneliness that affects them, as they become teens and adults. Even as young as kindergarten, children are bullied, and can develop negative feelings about school and themselves. As children get older and experience bullying they may become even more fearful and feel bad about themselves – this may lead to dropping out of school. Children who bully are more likely to engage in criminal behavior, have lower grades, and drop out of school – all of which affect the child's later life.

#### **Faith-based Outreach Update**

Covering Kids and Families has been working in collaboration with the Health Care Coverage for Kids Coalition to provide faith-based outreach. Our combined goals include informing families of the faith-based community about the availability of low-cost and free health care coverage through hawk-i and Medicaid. We have been developing partnerships with the faith-based community to achieve our outreach efforts.

#### SHOUT (Student Health Outreach) Project

In February 2004 the Health Care Coverage for Kids Coalition (HCKC) collaborated with Confirmation students from Visitation Catholic Church to form a SHOUT (Student Health Outreach) project. SHOUT is student-run and strives to ensure access to health care coverage for all children.

The Confirmation students were educated on the importance of health care coverage and how they could help decrease the number of uninsured children in Polk County. Through brainstorming sessions with HCKC staff, the students and their teacher, several outreach project ideas were developed.

Approximately 20 of the 30 students decided to hand out *hawk-i* brochures after their individual masses and distribute them to their schools, neighbors, friends and family. Several students chose to also participate in outreach efforts at three local grocery stores. These stores included La Tapatia, La Favorita, and Dahl's. Grocery bags were stuffed with *hawk-i* brochures and a *hawk-i* information table was set up.

The SHOUT project at Visitation was very successful with over 1000 *hawk-i* brochures distributed. The majority of the students stated they would like to participate in a SHOUT project again, while all students provided valuable feedback that will help better future outreach efforts.

#### Future Faith-based Outreach Ideas Include:

- Distribute hawk-i fliers at church events, services, and meetings.
- Insert hawk-i fliers into mailings and church bulletins
- Hand out hawk-i fliers and hawk-i applications in church congregation areas
- Print an announcement about *hawk-i* in the weekly church bulletin
- Download the hawk-i newsletter insert from www.idph.state.ia.us/coveringkids/common/pdf/newsletter.pdf and place into the church newsletter or bulletin
- Include health care coverage in a sermon/homily or in adult small group discussion classes
- Distribute health care coverage information at events such as: health fairs, holiday bazaars, ice cream socials, family dinners and spiritual breakfasts
