First West Nile virus case of the season reported

This year's first confirmed human case of West Nile virus has been reported in Iowa. The case is an adult male (18 to 40 years of age) from Clay County, who is recovering.

Please remind patients to take measures to reduce the risk of exposure to West Nile virus. Key messages include:

- Use insect repellent with DEET, picaridin, IR3535, or oil of lemon eucalyptus. Always
 read the repellent label and consult with a health care provider if you have questions
 when using these types of products on children. For example, DEET should not be used
 on infants less than 2 months old and oil of lemon eucalyptus should not be used on
 children under 3 years old.
- Avoid outdoor activities at dusk and dawn when mosquitoes are most active.
- Wear long-sleeved shirts, pants, shoes, and socks whenever possible outdoors.
- Eliminate standing water around the home because that's where mosquitoes lay eggs. Empty water from buckets, cans, pool covers and pet water dishes. Change water in bird baths every three to four days.

Since West Nile first appeared in Iowa in 2002, it has been found in every county in Iowa, either in humans, horses, or birds. In 2013, there were 44 human cases of West Nile virus and zero deaths.

Reminder of updated rabies materials

As a reminder, IDPH's web page for rabies was updated last year. The page features separate links for the public, health care providers, and veterinarians. These versions should replace older, outdated materials, as information has changed over the years.

Cyclosporiasis outreach to clinicians

Last year at this time IDPH was busy investigating nearly 140 cases of Cyclosporiasis (no cases have been reported in Iowa so far this year). In preparation for future activity, CDC has developed multiple health communication resources for clinicians. The resources discuss testing criteria, treatment, and risk factors.
