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Michael Scott talks about becoming State Librarian

Michael Scott was selected to become Iowa's 28th State Librarian on September 17 by the Iowa Commission of Libraries. He will take over his new post on Monday, November 17. Scott is currently assistant director, Southeastern Libraries Cooperating (SELCO), Rochester, MN. SELCO is one of twelve regional library systems in Minnesota. He has been with SELCO since 2008.

Said Scott, "I'm very excited and humbled to become the next State Librarian of Iowa. I look forward to working with the Iowa Library Services staff to provide leadership to Iowa libraries, and to working with libraries all across Iowa as they provide great service and increased access to information for all Iowans."

Scott noted that it's an exciting time to be in libraries because of the many new ways of connecting with library users in their communities.

"The future is filled with challenges, such as ample funding and the need for everyone to be digitally included," said Scott, "However, the future is also bright with the many opportunities libraries have to collaborate to ensure the needs of library users and the community are being served. It's time to move forward together."

Iowa Commission of Libraries Chair Dan Boice expressed his confidence in Scott.

"The Commission noted that Michael brings great experience in coordinating activities with all sizes and all kinds of libraries that should be especially helpful as collaboration becomes more important in continuing to strengthen Iowa's libraries."

Some of Scott's other responsibilities as part of the leadership team include working with SELCO's multi-type library members in the areas of continuing education, advocacy, and resource sharing. He is also the point person for the current strategic planning process. Earlier, Scott was manager of Corporate Library Services, Orlando Regional Health Care, FL. He served as the 2011 Minnesota Library Association Legislative Chair.





New certification program for non-directors and support staff

In November, Iowa Library Services is starting a new certification program specifically for non-directors and library support staff, "Public Library Staff Certification." The new program is an option for library staff seeking an alternative to pursuing and maintaining director certification.

The current certification program will be re-named "Public Library Director Certification." Other than the new name, nothing about the current certification program is changing. No action needs to be taken by staff and directors participating in the current program. Must either have Master's in Library & Information Science (MILS) OR pass Public Library Support

Valid for 3 calendar years

30 continuing education credit hours to recertify

Not a required standard for staff at libraries participating in Accreditation program

Public Library Director Certification

Must either have Master's in Library & Information Science (MLIS) OR pass Public Library Management 1 & 2

Valid for 3 calendar years

45 continuing education credit hours to recertify

Required Tier 1 standard for directors at libraries participating in Accreditation program

What's the difference between Public Library Support class and Public Library Management classes?

Public Library Support (PLS)

Required class for non-MLIS library staff seeking Staff Certification

Public Library Management (PLM)

Required class for non-MLIS library staff seeking Director Certification

ILS Commissioner Boyd elected to national board

David K. Boyd, Iowa State Court Administrator and a member of the Iowa Commission of Libraries, was recently elected president of the Conference of State Court Administrators (COSCA). The position also makes him vice chair of the Board of Directors for the National Center for State Courts (NCSC). Both positions are one-year terms.

COSCA is comprised of the chief executives of the court systems in each state, the District of Columbia, and the U.S. territories. The conference is committed to strengthening the judicial branch by improving the quality of state courts and increasing the public's trust and confidence in the justice system.

NCSC, headquartered in Williamsburg, Va., is a non-profit court organization dedicated to improving the administration of justice by providing leadership and service to the state courts. NCSC was founded in 1971 by the Conference of Chief Justices and Chief Justice of the United States Supreme Court Warren E. Burger. It provides education, training, technology, management, and research services to the nation's state courts.

"We are honored that David has moved into a leadership role with the National Center and in the nation's court community," said Mary C. McQueen, NCSC president. "He's an outstanding leader and positive force, and his knowledge and experience are invaluable to the National Center."

Said Boyd, "One personal highlight for me will come in November when the NCSC hosts an awards dinner at the U.S. Supreme Court. The dinner is held in what's called the Great Hall just outside the courtroom in the U.S. Supreme Court building, and my wife and I will be sharing the head table with Chief Justice John Roberts and his wife."

Boyd has served on the Iowa Commission of Libraries since May 2003 when he was appointed State Court Administrator, a position which holds a permanent seat on the Commission.



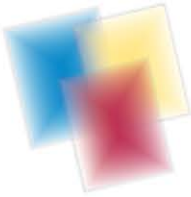

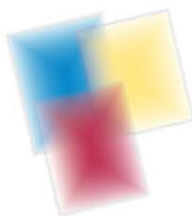

Iowa represented at Association of Rural and Small Libraries Conference

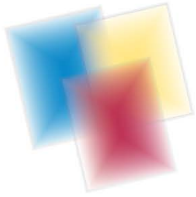
