1) Iowa Library Association "Lobby From Home Days:" Calling all library boosters! The lowa Library Association is sponsoring "Lobby From Home Days" on Tuesday and Wednesday this week. For several years, ILA has promoted "Lobby From Home" as an advocacy effort, calling on ILA members and non-members alike to contact area legislators and urge their support of increased library funding.

"Lobby From Home Days" in February is followed by ILA Legislative Day in March, this year on March 18. ILA Legislative Day is held in Des Moines and typically begins with a legislative briefing at the State Library, followed by a reception with Iowa legislators at the Capitol.

For both advocacy efforts, we need your help! Library directors and staff, trustees, Friends and Foundation members, and library patrons—all voices are needed, all voices are critical in communicating the importance of library service throughout lowa: in schools, colleges, and communities large and small.


From ILA's 2015 Legislative Agenda: "...Libraries enrich Iowa. Iowans are turning to their libraries in increasing numbers: more than 51,000 Iowans use a library each day...for Internet access, early literacy programming, homework help, health care information, career development, and much more..."

The ILA Legislative Agenda includes these goals:

- Continue to rebuild the support system for Iowa libraries by returning funding for Iowa Library Services to the pre-merger (2009) level...
- Include an increase of at least \$86,000.00 to allow lowa Library Services to purchase new materials
- Continue to increase funding for Enrich lowa to support the vital role of lowa libraries
- Recognize and stipulate in all official documents that teacher-librarians are instructional staff as defined by the Dept. of Education and that teacher-librarians play a vital role in the educational team in each lowa school district
- Preserve hometown governance in Iowa's public libraries by maintaining autonomy for local public library boards

Today, ILA members can expect to receive an email from ILA's Governmental Affairs Committee with more. From Duncan Stewart, 2015 ILA President "... Our lobbyists Craig Patterson and Amy Campbell do a great job in Des Moines, but they consistently tell us that it is your calls, emails, and conversations about Iowa libraries are the most effective way to inform legislators about the importance of funding for Iowa Library Services, Enrich Iowa, and the ongoing need for teacher librarians in Iowa schools. I hope you will take time tomorrow or Wednesday to look at the GAC email, contact your legislators, and celebrate ILA's 125 years of service to Iowa with your personal advocacy..."

2) Children's Book Festival: This news comes courtesy of Susan Craig, Director of lowa City Public Library. It concerns the 2015 Children's Book Festival in Iowa City. Susan writes: "One Book, Two Book" is back this year, but it has moved from February to

March, so hopefully a little more weather friendly. The big programming day is Saturday, March 7. The keynote author is year is David LaRochelle, author of <u>Mool</u> and <u>The Best Pet of All</u>. A Storytime Skills session at 1:00PM has been approved for continuing education credit. All programs take place at the Sheraton Hotel in Iowa City..."

From the "One Book, Two Book" website: "...Like traditional book festivals, this offers the chance for attendees—in this case children and their families—to hear from published authors about their work. But more important is its second role: to champion writing by children. More than 800 of them, to be exact, all students in the Corridor who submitted one page of original writing. The best of these student writers will be recognized in two major events over the course of our festival, March 6-8, 2015..."

Also on tap during the festival next month:

- New programming this year will give parents some tools for introducing and encouraging reading
- > a workshop about building storytime skills
- a workshop about how to use toys to promote reading
- an author panel that will give aspiring children's book authors the chance to ask questions of the pros.

Young Adult Library Services Association (YALSA) to ensure that teens are competent and ethical users of technology, especially those that are offered through libraries. Teen Tech Week encourages teens to use libraries' non-print resources for education and recreation, and to recognize that librarians are qualified, trusted professionals in the field of information technology.

This year's theme is "Libraries Are For Making..." The focus is on makerspaces, leading libraries to provide teens with spaces to extend learning beyond the classroom, spaces where kids can explore, create, and share their own content. Teen Tech Week is an opportunity to promote the library's digital resources and services to help teens succeed in school and prepare for college and 21st century careers.
