

ASIAN/PACIFIC AMERICANS IN IOWA: 2013

MAY 2013

In 1978, a joint congressional resolution established Asian/Pacific American Heritage Week. The first 10 days of May were chosen to coincide with two important anniversaries: the arrival in the United States of the first Japanese immigrants (May 7, 1843) and the completion of the transcontinental railroad (May 10, 1869). In 1992, Congress expanded the 10-day observance to a month-long celebration.

The average family size in the state of Iowa is 2.97.

The number of Iowa residents in 2011 who say they are Asian or Asian in combination with one or more other races. This group comprises 2.2 percent of Iowa's total population.

The percent change in population for native Hawaiian and other Pacific Islanders from 2000 to 2011. This is a numeric increase of 984 for the period.

The percent of Iowa's foreign born population in 2011 who were born in Asia.

76.4%

The percentage of Iowa's Asian foreign-born who entered the United States since 1990.

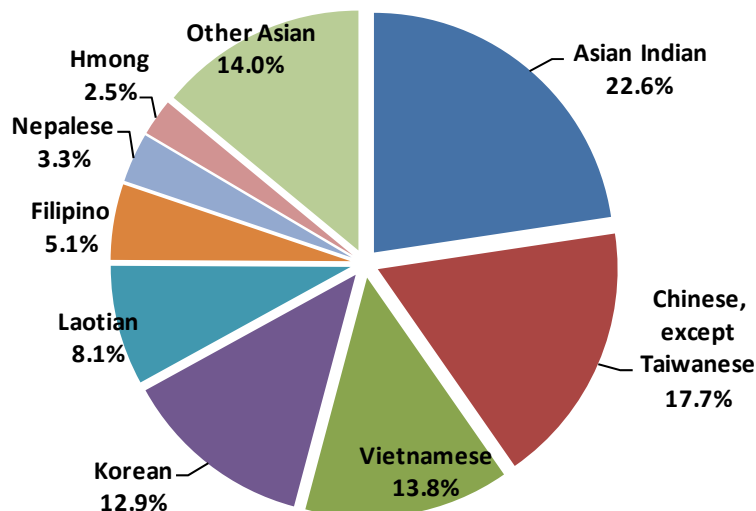
34.3%

The percentage of Iowa's foreign-born in 2011 from Asia who are naturalized citizens. The corresponding rate for the foreign-born population as a whole is 30.8 percent.

9,774

The estimated number of foreign-born people from India in 2011. After Mexico, India is the leading country of birth for the state's foreign-born. Also among the top 10 countries of birth for Iowa's foreign-born population are China, Korea, Vietnam, and the Philippines.

The number of Asians in Polk county in 2011, which has the largest population of this race of any Iowa county. Polk county has both the largest population and the largest numerical increase (4,797) of people in this group between 2000 and 2011.

Jefferson county is where Asians make up the highest proportion of the total population (8.6 percent).

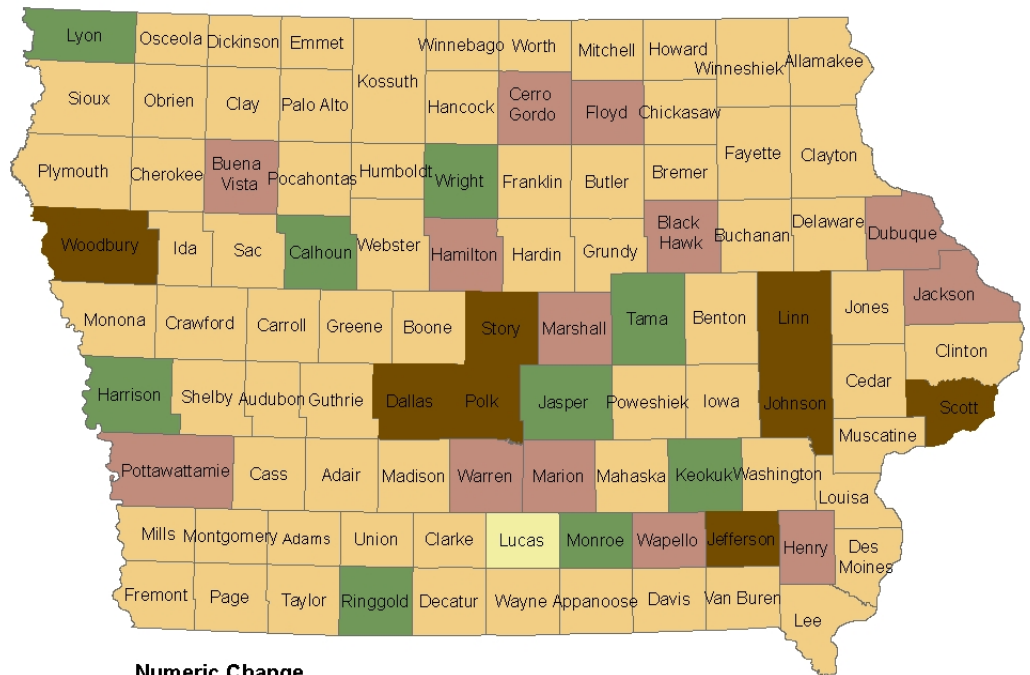

Buena Vista county is where native Hawaiians and other Pacific Islanders make up the largest proportion (0.6 percent) of the total population.

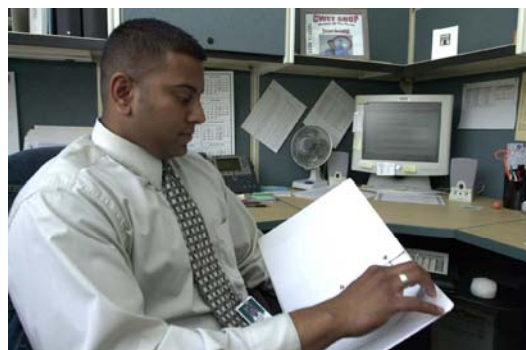
The percentage of Asians in 2011, age 25 and over, who have a bachelor's or higher degree education. Asians have the highest proportion of college graduates of any race or ethnic group in the state. The corresponding rate for all lowans in this age group is 25.8 percent.

The percentage of Asians in 2011, age 25 and over, who are high school graduates. The corresponding rate for all lowans in this age group is 90.6 percent.

31.8%

The percentage of Asians in 2011, age 25 and over, who have a graduate degree (e.g., master's, Ph.D., M.D. or J.D.). The corresponding rate for all adults in the age group is 8.1 percent.



Languages

The number of people who speak Chinese at home in 2011. Chinese is the most widely spoken Asian language in the state. Also among the top 10 most frequently spoken languages are: Vietnamese (5,660), Hindi (4,339); Korean (4,268); Laotian (3,471); and Tagalog (2,638)
