

HISPANIC HERITAGE MONTH: LATINOS IN IOWA SEPTEMBER 2006

In 1968, Congress authorized President Lyndon B. Johnson to proclaim a week in September as National Hispanic Heritage Week. The observance was expanded in 1988 to a month long celebration (Sept. 15-Oct. 15). During this month, America celebrates the culture and traditions of U.S. residents who trace their roots to Spain, Mexico and the Spanish-speaking nations of Central America, South America and the Caribbean. Sept. 15 was chosen as the starting point for the celebration because it is the anniversary of independence of five Latin American countries: Costa Rica, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras and Nicaragua. In addition, Mexico and Chile celebrate their independence days on Sept. 16 and Sept. 18, respectively.

The estimated Latino population of Iowa as of July 1, 2005, making people of Latino origin the state's largest race or ethnic minority. Latinos constitute 3.7 percent of the state's total population.

The numeric change in the Latino population from 2000 to 2005. This is a 32.1 percent increase for the period.

330,420

The projected Latino population of Iowa as of July 1, 2030. According to Woods & Pool Economics Inc., Latinos will constitute 9.8 percent of the state's total population on that date.

The average family size for the Iowa Latino population. The average family size in the state of Iowa is 3.0.

The number of Latino families who reside in Iowa. Of these families, 69.8 percent include their own children under 18 years of age.

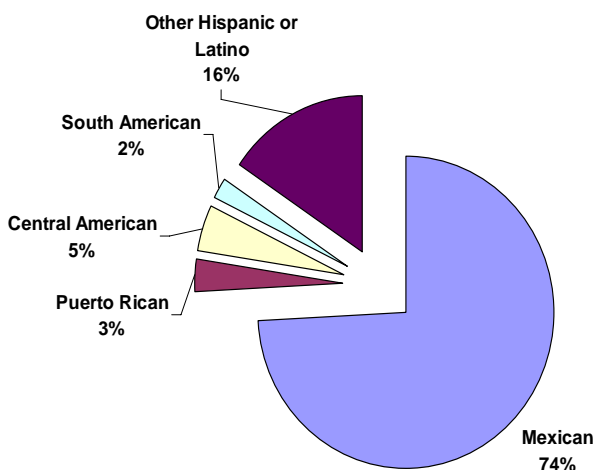

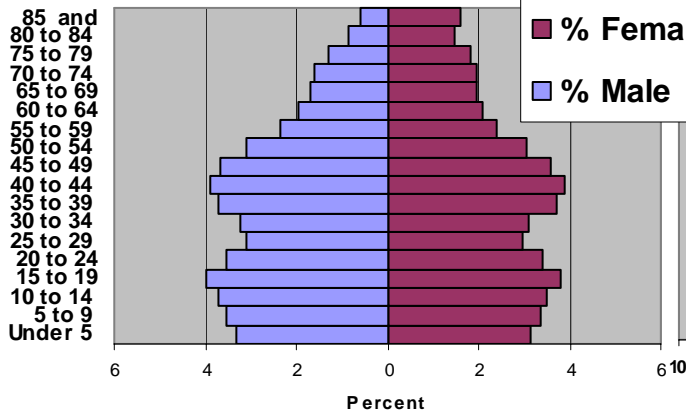
Percentage of Latino population under age 5, as of July 1, 2005. Latinos have a higher concentration of preschoolers among the population than any other race or ethnic group.

Hispanic or Latino Groups in Iowa: 2000

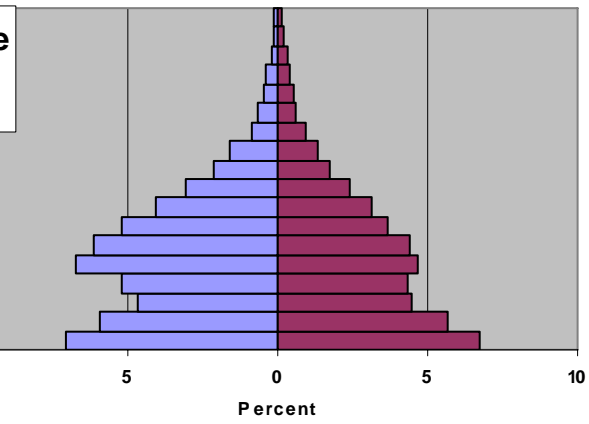


AGE DISTRIBUTION

SPANISH LANGUAGE

The number of Spanish speaking English Language Learners in Iowa's public and non-public schools during the 2005-2006 school year. This represents a 106.2 percent increase from the 1999-2000 school year.

The number Latinos enrolled in the state's elementary and high schools during the 2005-2006 school year.

The percentage of Iowa Latinos age 25 and over, who had at least a high school education in 2000.

The number of foreign-born Iowans who were born in Mexico, by far more than any other Latin American country or any other country in the world for that matter. Other Latin American countries of origin with a large foreign-born population are El Salvador (1,968), Guatemala (1,636), Honduras (537) and Ecuador (447).

Figure 1 - Employment by Industry (Percent of Population)

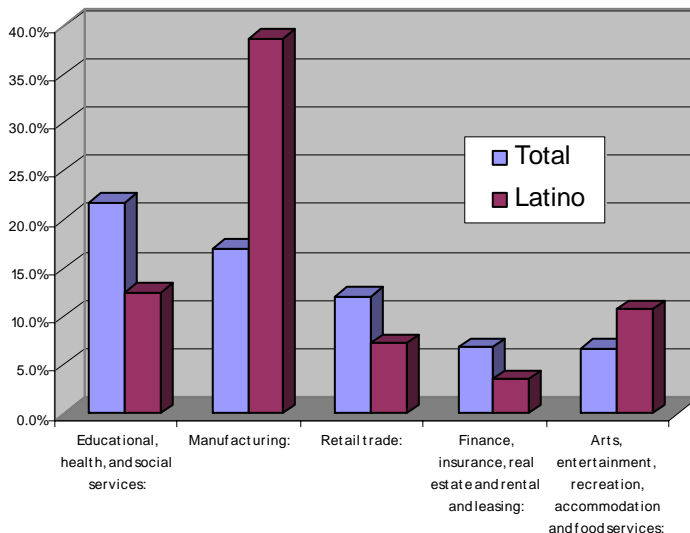


Figure 2 - Employment by Occupation (Percent of Population)

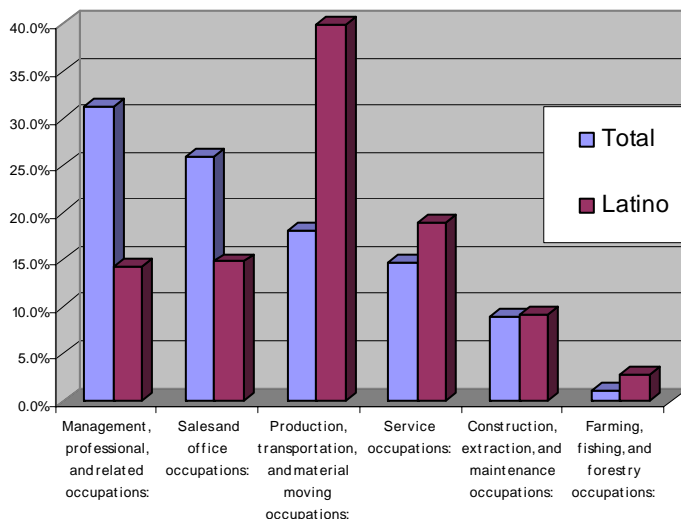

a high percentage of Latinos are Crawford (16.7%), Louisa (14.1%), Muscatine (13.2%) and Marshall (12.7%).

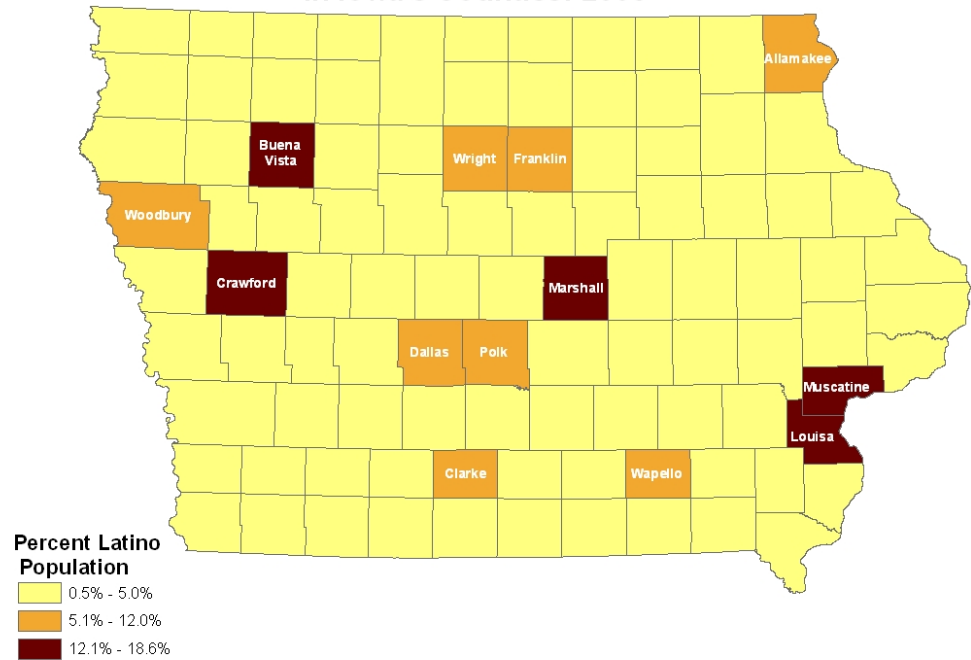

Nearly half of the total Latino population live in Polk, Woodbury, Scott, Muscatine and Marshall counties.

35.4%

Slightly over one-third of the growth in Iowa's Latino population from 2000-2005 occurred in five counties: Polk, Woodbury, Wapello, Marshall and Crawford. The Latino population in Wapello increased by 220.0% between 2000 and 2005.
