They were very complimentary of the services being provided to the residents living in Heinz Hall, the staff are to be commended to their dedication and service and making Heinz a Home for the Veterans living there. The residential division of DIA, is to complete a thorough survey of all residential care facilities at least every 30 months. They last visited Heinz Hall in March of 2012, we are certified for 113 Residential beds, and are the largest residential care facility in the state.

David Kreimeyer was born in the family farm house near Dumont on August 30, 1931. His brother Richard was 6 years old when David was born. His little sister Janice came along when David was 14. David said, "She was a surprise for us, but a nice one." David helped on the farm all of his growing up years. He and his brother helped with milking cows, taking care of chickens and raising the crops and all the other chores that are done on a farm. David graduated from high school and worked with his Dad on the farm and also was a day laborer for other farmers in the area.

In 1952 a recruiter came to the farm to talk to David. David states he ended up in the Air Force, and that the recruiter told him that he could pick his occupation after Basic Training. David learned that this "...wasn't quite accurate..." as he later learned that you could pick your occupation IF you had 4 or 5 top choices to pick from. David had wanted to become an aircraft and engine mechanic but that area was full and his request was denied. One day they were told that anyone that wanted to try out for the Air Force Band could do so. David had one year of high school band so figured "Why not?" and thus began his service years of being in the 583rd Air Force Band. He was stationed for a time in Denver, Colorado and his band was used in a Jimmy Stewart movie, for the military scenes. He also was stationed overseas and performed in England and Paris. David was honorably discharged in August of 1956. When he returned home he helped his Dad on the farm until he was hired in a music store called Music Corner in Waterloo. David began as the band instrument repairman. He later became a full-time piano tuner and tuned many pianos in the Waterloo area, including many at the University of Northern Iowa. David moved to the Veterans Home in 2011, initially in Malloy 4 North and then moved with that unit to Dack 4. He now lives in the Amos Fox Building. David has an IT job folding washcloths in the Malloy Building.

David enjoys going to the casino and states he used to enjoy playing pool. He was in a pool league in Waterloo for years but due to vision loss, he can no longer play pool. David has used the VADM Low-Vision Clinic and has found that helpful. He is on the waiting list to go to the Hines VA for assistance with vision-related activities.

David states he enjoys living in the Fox Building, loves his room and his friends here. However, he has asked to be on the waiting list to move to the Malloy Building. David states the walk back and forth to the Fox building is becoming too long for him. We at Amos Fox wish David all the best in his Rehab at Hines VA and will hate to lose him to the Malloy Building someday!

Some examples are families not wanting to move away from loved ones, older people may have more living options such as more senior housing development, death and a high cost of nursing care.

The Iowa Veterans Home continues to set the example for long term continuum of care for Iowa's Veterans and Spouses. Along with its highly skilled 24/7 Medical & Nursing staff, our residents enjoy many more opportunities just right here on campus. Our services are set apart from competitors as we provide that extra piece of mind with full time, part time employees to include many volunteers.

The *Led by Choice* initiative from Telligen is wrapping up. Telligen is working on completion of a *Led by Choice* implementation guide which will be available on their website sometime in July. There is a recognition ceremony for all participating nursing homes in Des Moines July 10, 2014. The performance improvement project we completed during this initiative was on the Resident Satisfaction (Quality of Life) Survey. The project question was "How Can We Improve Our Resident Satisfaction (Quality of Life) Survey?" Using the Patient Family Centered Care methodology we have a final survey tool that was developed using input from residents. Following a review of literature, we found research documents core domains for resident satisfaction surveys. We were pleased that the current survey tool used included questions from nearly all domains.

- Facility Environment
- Clinical Care
- Staff interaction
- Privacy/Autonomy
- Security

- Activities
- Food
- Personal Care
- Non-clinical Staff Services

Next, we used a questionnaire to determine what is important to the residents we serve and what they believe is important for us to know. There was opportunity for residents to give feedback on wording of questions so the questions would make sense to them. We also incorporated questions using proven survey tools and then we tested the new survey tool. After testing we made further adjustments in wording of questions as recommended by our residents. One of the most significant findings during this entire process was our residents identified satisfaction domains that they want us to ask about more often than just during the annual survey. The work remaining for this project includes communicating the project process and survey tool outcomes to residents and employees. Additionally we still need to develop recommendation guidelines for more frequent questions to ask from the satisfaction domains identified by residents.

IVH FY15-17 Budget Development

Recently, IVH completed the budget development process for FY15, 16, and 17. Division Administrators, Bureau Chiefs and Budget Managers met with the Financial Services Division Administrator and Finance Bureau Chief to discuss fiscal planning and resource allocation decisions during the budget development process.

The IVH strategic plan was used to guide the budget development process and determine how the budget will be used to focus its human, financial, and physical resources to maximize progress toward the achievement of its mission.

The primary goals of this process were to develop a budget that can be used as a financial plan and be used as an operational guide throughout the fiscal year. The budget that was developed indicates what services IVH will provide to residents, where resource allocations are made, and what revenue appropriations were made for IVH operations. The budget outlines how much IVH services will cost and how they will be funded; the number of authorized FTE positions; the expenses for the provision of resident services, equipment, and capital improvements.

For fiscal year 2015 starting July 1, 2014, our state appropriation is the same as FY2014, which is \$7,594,996. The remainder of our revenues come from the VA, Medicaid, Insurance, Resident billings, and other miscellaneous revenues. Our entire budget for FY15 is \$80,292,076, and our personnel budget expense line is \$65,518,119 for 878.56 full-time equivalents (FTE).

VA Celebrates 70th Anniversary of the Original 'GI Bill'

The Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) is celebrating 70 years of investment in the education and economic prosperity of America's Servicemembers and Veterans. The Servicemen's Readjustment Act of 1944, better known as the 'GI Bill' was enacted on June 22, 1944. The law provided a wide range of benefits for Veterans returning from World War II, including low-cost home loans, education and vocational training. The original GI Bill was heralded as a success and major contributor to America's stock of human capital that sped long-term economic growth across the Nation. Today, a new group of Veterans is accessing the Post-9/11 GI Bill and other education benefits, following in their footsteps.

What is Pain? Pain is whatever the person says it is, experienced whenever they say they are experiencing it (Pasero & McCaffery, 2011). At the end of life many veterans cannot communicate their pain related to delirium, dementia, aphasia, motor weakness, or language barriers. Some veterans past pain experience can be due to trauma or violence witnessed on the battle field. Some barriers to pain control include: Lack of education for both the nurse and the veteran, fear of side effects, fear of addiction/tolerance, fear of respiratory depression and fear of hastening death.

Some veterans may not use the word pain..... they may use words like discomfort, ache or hurt. The military has made our soldiers STOIC. It is not stoic to complain, Veterans do not want to be seen as weak or difficult to care for.

At end of life we need to make sure that the veteran/resident is comfortable and that their end of life journey is good. Non verbal signs & symptoms of pain are an important part of the assessment.

Movement- restlessness, fidgeting, rubbing body parts

Emotion- tears angry, anxious/irritable

Verbal cues- moaning, groaning, crying

Facial cues- grating teeth, grimacing, drawn around mouth and eyes

Positioning - guarding, splinting or fetal positioning

PLEASE remember that pain is <u>Exhausting</u> and it is possible for the resident to appear to be sleeping while they are still experiencing pain. It is important that pain control happen around the clock so that the vet/resident is not playing catch up for the next 8 hours. We would like to make families and staff aware that a booklet called "<u>Managing Your Pain Resident and Family Guide</u>" is located on IVH Sharepoint. Under Clinical resources tab then go to Hospice resource tab.

History is a Greek word meaning a study of the past, inquiry and having knowledge of a particular event. Organizations use history to define their past, present and future continued success to better the future of the operations. History is not what you thought. It is what you remember. Our history at the Iowa Veterans Home dates back to December 1, 1887 when Amos Fox, a Civil-War veteran, was the first veteran to be admitted to the Iowa Soldiers Home. Amos Fox, the Home's first resident, was buried in March 1916 after having been admitted to the Home December 1, 1887. A farmer from Humboldt, Iowa Fox first enlisted in the Civil War as a private in Company D of the 47th Illinois Infantry on August 14, 1861. He re-enlisted January 9, 1865, and was discharged in August of the same year.

The history of our home begins when Governor Samuel J. Kirkwood made his suggestion at a committee meeting of members from both branches of the General Assembly of Iowa who were considering orphan homes for children of some 13,001 Iowans killed during the Civil War. The proposal for the erection of orphan asylums was adopted and such institutions finally erected but it was not until later, in 1886, that the first concerted effort was put forth for the erection of a soldiers' home.

Initiating the movement for an Iowa Soldiers Home was the Grand Army of the Republic, led by Philip M. Crapo of Burlington, Iowa. This movement resulted in the 21st General Assembly passing an act, which on March 31, 1886, appropriated \$75,000 for the purchase of ground and the erection of suitable buildings and another \$25,000 to maintain that home for one year. Today we are proud to say that facility has expanded to 150 acres and 6 Nursing units and 1 Residential/Domicilary unit over the 126 years.

In 1975, the Iowa Legislature changed the name from the Iowa Soldiers Home to the Iowa Veterans Home.

On March 4, 1865 on a muddy Pennsylvania Avenue near the U.S. Capitol, President Abraham Lincoln presented his second inaugural address. With the words, "To care for him who shall have borne the battle and for his widow, and his orphan," President Lincoln affirmed the government's obligation to care for those injured during the war and to provide for the families of those who perished on the battlefield. These immortal words that were spoken that day became the VA motto in 1959.

World War I will celebrate its 100th Anniversary by Michael Hines, Staff Assistant



United States entered the war on April 6, 1917

When war erupted in 1914, the United States attempted to remain neutral. It was supposed to be the war to end war. For over four years World War I raged on, leaving in its wake a toll of death and destruction such as the world had never seen. The casualties and losses mounted over the years in the range of approximately 22,477,500 KIA, WIA or MIA for the Allied Forces. The war in Europe affected many Iowans from the very beginning as many foreign-born people in Iowa were of German ancestry. Several Iowans had migrated from Germany and still had family members there.

Soldiers from Iowa and other surrounding states set sail for Europe to fight on the side of Britain and Europe. One of the first Iowans that was killed in combat in World War I was Merle Hay, from Glidden. A monument was erected in his honor in the city of Glidden. A street and a mall (Merle Hay Mall) were named in his honor in Des Moines, Iowa. Merle Hay may perhaps been the first American serviceman to die during WW I. The first U.S. women to die of injuries in a combat zone was also an Iowan. She was Marion Crandall. Crandall was a former French teacher at the St. Katherine's School in Davenport. She died from her wounds from an artillery shell while working in a canteen.

The war had an effect on Iowa in more ways than one. Iowa's agriculture production was effected as well. Since the beginning of the war in 1914, Iowa farmers had experienced economic prosperity. Along with farmers everywhere, they were urged to be patriotic by increasing their production. Farmers purchased more land and raised more corn, beef, and pork for the war effort. It seemed that no one could lose as farmers expanded their operations, made more money, and at the same time, helped the Allied war effort.

Germany surrendered on November 11, 1918, and the war ended. Peace negotiations would drag on even longer, but the war was over and Iowans were eager to get back to their routines. The official records show that 114,242 Iowans served in the armed forces during World War I. Of those, 3,576 lost their lives. **World War I - 28 July 1914 to 11 November 1918 (Armistice).**
