IDPH among leaders in death data collection

IDPH is among 37 states and jurisdictions participating in the Electronic Verification of Vital Events (EVVE) Fact of Death system. This is a database for approved entities to verify birth, marriage and death documents to ensure the document is not fraudulent. Electronic inquiries from authorized users can be matched against more than 250 million birth and death records from state and jurisdiction-owned vital record databases nationwide.

Stop the Bleed

Statewide "Train the Trainer" sessions of the Stop the Bleed program are underway. The national initiative, spearheaded in Iowa by the IDPH Bureau of Emergency & Trauma Services, teaches emergency bleeding control through the ABCs of bleeding: Alerting 911, finding Bleeding injuries, and using Compression to stop bleeding. Local public health success story

The 2014 Iowa Immunization Annual Report indicated only 18 percent of Dickinson County 13-15 year olds had received the recommended immunizations, compared to the state average of 39 percent.

A Quality Improvement initiative used Iowa's Immunization Registry to track quarterly adolescent immunization progress, with a focus on HPV vaccination rates. A grant from the Prevention and Public Health Fund was used to send immunization education and pamphlets to all adolescent parents. Partnering with county schools, mass emails about immunization were sent and immunization clinics were scheduled. The local hospital used social media to promote immunizations.

As of December 2016, these efforts paid off with the rate of adolescent immunizations, ages 13-15, rising from 18 percent to 59 percent and the HPV immunization rate of complete doses rose 17 percent to 35 percent.

IID proposes stopgap measure

The <u>Iowa Insurance Division</u> has proposed a Stopgap Measure to the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) to ensure all Iowans have access to health insurance in 2018. Details of the plan are available <u>here</u>.



IDPH bureau spotlight Substance Abuse



The 20 fulltime and temporary employees of the <u>Bureau of Substance Abuse</u> lead IDPH efforts related to substance use disorders, problem gambling and suicide prevention. The bureau coordinates the <u>Iowa Youth Survey</u>,

licenses and regulates about 125 substance use disorder and problem gambling treatment programs, and funds more than 100 local contractors who provide identified needs and services.

Staff is actively involved in efforts to reduce overdose deaths from heroin and prescription drugs. Toward that end, the bureau has launched a public awareness campaign, developed an opioid overdose recognition and response brochure, begun efforts to expand insurance coverage for medication-assisted treatment, and has increased the number of doctors credentialed to provide medication-assisted treatment from 31 to 49.

Bureau chief DeAnn Decker has been with IDPH for 11 years, previously working with Magellan Behavioral Health. She is kept busy outside the office with four kids – one of whom just made the Iowa State Cyclone Dance Team. In her spare time, DeAnn loves to golf.
