# Early Childhood Iowa State Board Adopts New Population Indicators

At the April 3, 2015 ECI State Board meeting, Ashley Otte, Co-chair of the ECI Results Accountability Component Group, presented the Component Group's recommendation for revising the state-wide ECI indicators. Following the presentation in addition to the current state-wide indicators the Board adopted the following new indicators:

- Dental Services
  - Percentage of Medicaid-enrolled children ages 0 -5 who receive a dental service
  - Percentage of Iowa children entering kindergarten who have no obvious dental problems (based on a valid screening)
- Early Literacy
  - Percent of kindergartners meeting the Fall benchmark for the early literacy universal screening measure requirements of Iowa Code section 279.68
- Educational Attainment of Mothers
  - Number of Woman ages 15 50 with a birth in the past 12 months by educational attainment (less than high school, high school graduation, some college, bachelor's degree or higher)

**Transforming the Workforce for Children Birth Through Age 8: A Unifying Foundation** By Linda K. Smith, Deputy Assistant Secretary of Early Childhood Development

The Institute of Medicine (IOM) and the National Research Council (NCR) released <u>Transforming the</u> <u>Workforce for Children Birth Through Age 8: A Unifying Foundation</u> today, one of the most important studies of the workforce in our nation's history.

This study grew out of a workshop sponsored in 2011 by the Office of Child Care with the IOM and the National Research Council. The <u>workshop</u> was to describe the Early Childhood Care and Education (ECCE) workforce and outline its parameters. Speakers explored issues in defining and describing the workforce, the marketplace of ECCE, the effects of the workforce on children, the contextual factors that shape the workforce, and opportunities for strengthening ECCE as a profession. As a result of that workshop, ACF decided that a full study with recommendations was needed. In conjunction with public and private partners and the staff at the Institute of Medicine, this consensus study was the next step.

This study and its recommendations are not only timely but also necessary. They support the national discussion about child care and the President's Early Learning Plan. Today, there is a recognition that access to high-quality, early childhood care and education is essential to giving all children a strong beginning. It is also understood that the workforce provides the key to this. As we know, the relationship of the adult to the child and the ability of the adult to understand and support the comprehensive nature of a child's development can change the trajectory of a child's life.

This study acknowledges the neuroscience – children are already learning at birth. The science makes clear the complexity of working with children. Health, development and learning in the early years is

rapid and cumulative – and is the foundation for all learning. The report also stresses the need to professionalize the workforce and develop a cohesive plan which puts all segments of the workforce (from family child care providers to Pre K teachers) on the pathway to higher education. It stresses the need for a unified foundation based on sound child development and early learning principles.

Fifteen years ago, a committee was set up under the auspices of the <u>Institute of Medicine</u> to study the broad knowledge base that we have about development in the early years of life—both the research on brain development and the behavioral and social sciences. <u>From Neurons to Neighborhoods: the Science of Early Childhood Development</u> came out in late 2000 as a report to use to bring science to the public policy arena and to those who work with children. Just as we continue to use that study, <u>Transforming the Workforce for Children Birth Through Age 8: A Unifying Foundation</u> will guide our public and private conversations and investments in the decade ahead.

We will be carefully reviewing and considering the recommendations in this report. I look forward to working with our public and private partners in the future as we learn from this study and begin to work to build a better system of support for our early learning teachers.

#### **CCDF Reauthorization Frequently Asked Questions**

The Office of Child Care (OCC) has posted responses to a selection of frequently asked questions (FAQs) related to the Reauthorization of the Child Care and Development Fund (CCDF). The FAQs can be found on <u>this page</u> of the OCC Web site.

Since the law was reauthorized in November, many questions have been submitted, including through the OCC CCDF Reauthorization e-mail address, through OCC Regional Offices, and during meetings and webinars. We know that the FAQs that we have posted do not address all the questions that have been raised, but they cover a wide range of topics; we believe that they will help CCDF grantees as they continue the work of implementing the new law.

#### Welcome the New (Federal) Office of Head Start Director
