MIDWESTERN STATES EDUCATIONAL INFORMATION PROJECT P.L. 89-10, TITLE V, Section 505 STATE OF IOWA DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC INSTRUCTION As greater and greater demands are being made upon our Nation's schools, the need for pertinent and accurate statistical information about our schools becomes increasingly important and at the same time increasingly time consuming and burdensome.

Nevertheless, in order to make sound decisions, often of tremendous importance to the Nation and to the Nation's youth, educators must obtain vital information. And the form of this information, its accuracy, its availability, its timeliness, will influence educators and school administrators in the decisions reached and the policies enacted.

Also, as education emerges as one of the Nation's big businesses, and as the Federal Government assumes a more active role through financial aid, states' responsibilities for gathering and reporting educational information continue to increase the complexity of information handling.

In response to this urgent need for timely, accurate, pertinent information, the Midwestern States Educational Information Project (MSEIP) was conceived through the combined efforts of the Chief State School Officers of thirteen midwestern states: Colorado, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Michigan, Minnesota, Missouri, Nebraska, North Dakota, Ohio, South Dakota, and Wisconsin.

The Project was outlined in detail, giving thorough attention to objectives, methods, and testing. These plans were submitted to the U. S. Office of Education in December, 1965. Under the provisions of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 (P.L. 89-10, Title V,


Section 505) funds were granted and work on MSEIP began early in 1966.

The purpose of this brochure is to acquaint the reader with the basic philosophy and methods of the Project; more comprehensive material is available and will be supplied on request.



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OBJECTIVES

Specific Objective

The Midwestern States Educational Information Project's specific objective is to develop an integrated, educational information system for 13 State Education Agencies (SEA's).

Such a system will:

- be applicable to the overall administration of SEA's
- include information systems of all SEA areas
- provide for integration of information of all SEA areas
- lessen duplication in educational information reporting, processing and dissemination
- be compatible among the 13 participating SEA's and all SEA's that chose to adapt the system

Related Objectives

An integrated, educational information system will also:

- provide basic data for SEA information systems
- provide feedback to local school districts
- provide report information for the U. S. Office of Education
- provide a means for integrating information from each of the five information areas, Facilities, Finances, Instructional Programs, Personnel, and Pupils
- provide quantitative information that can be applied by the user for qualitative purposes
- be consistent with USOE Handbooks and Committee on Educational Data Systems (CEDS)
- communicate with and relate to other educational and research projects, agencies, and institutions



THE MSEIP OPERATIONAL SYSTEM

The research and developmental activities of participating SEA personnel produced the MSEIP Operational System. The specifics of input, processing, and output, necessary to an integrated, educational information system, were developed by Project personnel of the 13 participating states. Work of the various MSEIP committees produced the component parts of the MSEIP Operational System.

Adaptation by States

Adaptation of the MSEIP Operational System is appropriate for each participating SEA. Any state may choose to apply the System or parts of it to that state's current information system. Modifications can be made for specific states' needs without loss of compatibility among the states.

States adapting the MSIEP Operational System can expect these results:


- Increased availability of timely, accurate information needed for educational decision making
